A WHALE IN THE HARBOR

SEATTLE MAN HAS AN EXCITING HUNT FOR AN OCEAN MONSTER WHICH WAS A MENACE TO SMALL VESSELS IN THE BAY—THE WHALE WAS WOUNDED WITH RIFLE SHOTS—A DANGEROUS HUNT.

SEATTLE, August 4.—The Post-Intelligencer says: The tramp whale which for the past several days has been something of a menace to the smaller vessels of the mosquito fleet, came near meeting its Waterloo yesterday morning. W. L. Dudley, manager of the Seattle & Alki Point Transportation Company, which owns and operates the little steamer Dix, engaged it in a running naval battle over a six-mile course. Dudley shot the whale five times with a Sarsage 45-90 rifle. His marksmanship was good enough, but his missiles were wanting in steam. Nevertheless he drew blood. The second shot brought a copious flow of the crimson. It covered the surface of the salt water and was easily visible to Dudley and his attendants during the battle.

The whale came into the bay Tuesday evening and took up a position off the Flyer dock. It was seen by people on this and adjacent wharves and by passengers on the return voyage of the Dix from Alki Point at 6 o'clock in the evening. At this time the whale made its appearance at a point about 2,000 feet out and directly west of the Flyer dock. Dudley watched the antics of the deep-sea monster and determined that he would give battle on the morrow.

Yesterday morning he chartered a gasoline launch, with Charles Frank as engineer. Dudley, Frank and his assistant were the only occupants of the craft when he pulled out from Budlong's boat house in quest of the whale. This was about 10:30 o'clock, and half an hour later they sighted the whale, which was then 3,000 feet west of the Arlington dock. The launch moved to within 200 feet of the whale, when Dudley fired.

Instantly the whale dived and a few seconds later came to the surface about 200 yards distant. This time the launch moved up to within fifty feet of the whale, when Dudley again let drive with his rifle. The second shot had a telling effect. Apparently the ball penetrated the forehead. At all events the whale lifted its head out of the water and executed almost a somersault. For a second the entire massive frame was visible, with the head down and the body standing perpendicular. Down it went, apparently maddened by pain, and fully fifteen minutes elapsed before the whale came to the surface again. It had scooted along under the water with remarkable speed and came to the surface fully a mile further out in the Sound.

The launch set out again and got within firing distance. Three more shots were discharged into the body, but none apparently did any damage. Mr. Dudley is confident that everyone of the five shots hit the monster, though only one, the second, seemed to have any effect. It was with the discharge of the second shot, and frightened by the frenzied antics of the whale, that Frank, the engineer, suggested to Dudley that he wanted to go back to the boat house.

DILLINGHAM'S CASE BETTER

BELIEF IN SAN FRANCISCO THAT FOUR CENT SUGAR MEANS PROFITABILITY FOR HIM.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 5.—The Examiner says: Raw sugar has gone beyond 4 cents a pound and as a result of this favorable condition of the market the creditors of the "Monte Cristo of Hawaii," Benjamin F. Dillingham, are more confident than ever that his business will resume its former prosperity. Sugar at this price means much to Hawaii in general, as well as to the Dillingham properties. The latter are mainly the Oahu Sugar Plantation Company and the Oahu Railroad and Land Company.

A number of months ago Dillingham collapsed from nervous strain and was brought to this city for treatment and rest. He is still living in this vicinity trying to get his health back, while his creditors and friends have been straightening out his affairs. His creditors have all along had confidence in the ultimate strength of his business ventures. It was to the interest of his creditors to stand by him and keep him on his feet and they have done so.

Dillingham owes practically every bank in San Francisco. He has borrowed a total of \$4,000,000 for his projects, and of this indebtedness \$2,000,000 is represented in this city. He is said to owe the Bank of California \$500,000. It being his largest individual creditor. It has therefore taken the lead in the conservation of his properties during the past few months of his sickness.

Dillingham has lived in the Hawaiian Islands thirty years and comes from an old New England sea-faring family. He was ship-wrecked near Honolulu on his first trip to the island and got ashore with a broken leg. His early life was filled with hard experiences before he laid the basis of his present fortune. Some of his creditors here assert that Dillingham, if he regains his health, can clear off his debts and be worth several millions of dollars.
