WAR DEPARTMENT PLAN TO PREVENT DELAYS OR SEIZURES OF CARGOES FOR PHILIPPINES.

WASHINGTON, August 5.—The War Department tonight has under discussion the ways and means of preventing the delay of commercial steamers and will be obliged to resort to the expedient of shipping all goods from San Francisco on Government vessels or transports so as to avoid friction with Russia. They will interfere for some time with the trades of ports north of San Francisco and to the advantage of San Francisco.

The Commissary-General of the Army has suggested that stores going to Manila from San Francisco or New York on the regular steamship lines may be confused with stores for Japan and China and he has recommended that this liability of seizure by the Russian fleet be avoided by arranging for the shipment of the material in transports from San Francisco. In the case of shipments from New York he suggests that they could be so arranged as to make use of the transports when they leave that port for the Philippines.
