Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu. Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 0 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, WEATHER BUREAU.

The following data, covering a period of 30 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Month—July, for 30 Years.

TEMPERATURE (1870-1904.)

Mean or normal temperature, 78 deg. The warmest month was that of 1900, with an average of 79 deg. The coldest month was that of 1894, with an average of 76 deg. The highest temperature was 88 deg. on July 28, 1900. The lowest temperature was 63 deg. on July 1, 1899.

PRECIPITATION (rain) (1877-1894.)

Average for the month, 1.48 inches. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 14. The greatest monthly precipitation was 6.03 inches in 1880. The least monthly precipitation was 0.34 inches in 1882. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 3.17 inches on July 12, 1880.

Average number of clear days, 13; partly cloudy days, 17; cloudy days, 1.

WIND (1875-1904.)

The prevailing winds have been from the northeast.

ers will continue around the world after completing the trip to the Philippines.

Charles Clark of Hartford, Conn. is the publisher of the Courant and Atherton Brownwell is the publisher of the New York Public Opinion. W. J. Johnson represents the American Exporter of New York; Life Young is the publisher of the Des Moines, Capital. Burr McIntosh goes as the official photographer of the party. He was a war correspondent and photographer during the Spanish war and was formerly an actor.

Professor Coolidge is a professor of Harvard and is well known to the younger element of that university.

Mrs. T. H. Shirley is the mother of Representative Shirley of Kentucky.

General Bliss was former administrator of customs in Cuba after the American occupation of that country. He is going out to the Philippines to take command of a department.

Colonel Edwards of the Insular Service has charge and general direction of the party.

J. G. Schmidlapp is the personal friend of secretary Taft and accompanied him on his mission to Rome where the Secretary held a conference with his Holiness regarding the Friar Lands in the Philippines and effected a settlement of that serious problem in the affairs of the Archipelago. Miss Charlotte Schmidlapp accompanies her father and accompanying her is Miss Mignon Critten of Staten Island.

James A. Leroy who is American consul at Durango, Mexico is going with the party for general information. He was a class mate of Acting Governor Atkinson.
