can citizens who are able to look after their own affairs."

Atkinson referred to the establishment of county government and said that the next legislature would probably decentralize the government of the islands even more. Reference was also made in the acting governor's speech to the need of fortifications here. "Hawaii is more important to the United States," said the acting governor in this connection, "than the Philippines will ever be."

Atkinson closed with a very warm welcome to all the guests of the day. The visitors, amid much music, proceeded to enjoy an elaborate luncheon. The secretary of war, the acting governor, Miss Roosevelt and Mrs. Atkinson, occupied the table at the front of all, and from this table Secretary Taft delivered an address in response to a toast to "The President."

SENATOR WARREN GOT FIRST FLOWERS

BIG BOUQUETS OF ROSES FOR MISS ROOSEVELT WERE THE FIRST AT THE MANCHURIA.

Senator Warren of Wyoming was one of the visitors of the day who had friends awaiting him. District Attorney Breckons was one of those who went to the Manchuria in the custom launch, and he had two large bouquets of roses, which the senator had spoken for, with intimation that he didn't want his flowers to be second in getting aboard. As it was they were the first and the Wyoming Senator therefore had the first Hawaii bouquets to reach the steamer. They at once became the property of Miss Alice Roosevelt. Postmaster Pratt is another local friend of the Wyoming senator and Warren was Pratt's guest at a reception.

MRS. J. ELLEN FOSTER HERE

A NOTABLE AND EFFECTIVE SPEAKER AND A CAPABLE ORGANIZER.

Mrs. J. Ellen Foster who is on her way to the Philippines and around the world to study the industrial condition of women and children, was a guest of Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Wadman during the stay of the Manchuria in port. She also brought letters of introduction to Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Brown.

Mrs. Foster is a notable woman in temperance and reformatory work. She is a most effective public speaker, and was capable organizer. The credit for carrying Utah and other Rocky mountain states, by such handsome majorities, for Roosevelt and Fairbanks was largely given to her by the National Committee.

WHY CARTER RESIGNED

The San Francisco Call of July 5 has the following interview with Governor Carter, given at the St. Francis Hotel in that city:

"The result of the election did not please me, I will admit," said Carter yesterday, "but that was only one little incident and taken by itself would never have suggested any thought of retirement. The full reason for my sending in my resignation is a long story and one I do not feel at liberty to tell at this time. I will say this much, however, as territorial Governor I represented in Hawaii the President of the United States. The President is a man of decided views. I have views of my own in regard to Hawaiian matters and I felt that in some things my views differed from those of President Roosevelt.

"I am going to Washington to have a long talk with the President and my real reason for placing my resignation in his hands was to avoid any embarrassment in the event of his deciding to place somebody else at the helm in Hawaii."

WILL NOT ADMIT ANY MORE COOLIES

"There is no intention to allow any more Chinese of the coolie class to enter the United States," said Secretary of War Taft this morning, in discussing the matter of the exclusion law. Secretary Taft and the President have ordered a change in the enforcement of the law, by which the Chinese will be given more courteous treatment and in some sections of the country it is claimed that this is a beginning of letting down the bars against Chinese immigration.

"The idea is simply to treat the Chinese who have a right to enter with more courtesy than they have been given," said the secretary of war. "There is not any intention to allow coolies to enter, any more than heretofore."

The secretary's attention was called to the fact that Hawaii would like to have some coolies as laborers under certain conditions, but he did not discuss the matter, his only observation being that there was no intention to allow any coolies to enter America.
