THE KUOKOA MEETING THE RACE MEETING

PRINCE CUPID AND OTHERS SPEAK.

The Prince Enthuses His Friends by a Spirited Address—A Good Legislature The Great Need.

The Home rule mass meeting in the Orpheum last night was well attended. Prince Cupid's address was frequently interrupted by applause. His friends were very enthusiastic over Cupid's oratory. "If he'll make speeches like that all over the Islands," said Emmeluth, who stood the stage with his stamps of approval, "he'll be elected to Congress easily."

The keynote of the Prince's address was the remark that he was out for men in the Legislature who will do the right thing. He declared that he didn't want anything himself for the sake of money of his own, without trying to make money in politics. He had been asked to join the Home Rule party and had done so, believing that it was for the benefit of the country. He had found out differently, and had bolted in the hope of electing a good legislature. Wilcox, Kalaupokalani and the tramways bill were referred to by Cupid, who closed by saying that the Kuokoa would nominate men of all parties.

Prince Cupid said that he had joined the Home Rule party to help secure government control for the benefit of his people. He had found out that two men controlled and were determined to control that party, Wilcox and Kalaupokalani. These two dictated all nominations for the legislature refusing to give the voters any say in the matter. Kalaupokalani was actuated by a desire to get something from the Tramways company, and Wilcox by his desire to retain his salary of \$5,000 and mileage as a member of Congress.

Emmeluth said that in the last legislature he had worked steadily and honestly to carry out the program of the party. In this he had been thwarted largely by Kalaupokalani who had not wanted to carry out the party program. Meheula called the meeting to order and J. K. Nakao, the first speaker read the famous Laie letter of Senator Kalaupokalani, in which his secret opposition to Cupid had been exposed. Addresses were also made by John Emmeluth, Senator Kamaha, Kaloa and Kahauleua.

THE PORTUGUESE CLUB.

Organization Completed and Officers Elected.

The Portuguese Political Club completed its organization last night in San Antonio hall. There was a lively election, resulting in the choice of the following officers: President, J. M. Camarao; 1st. vice-president, M. A. Silva; 2nd. vice-president, A. G. Correa; secretary, Louis R. Medeiros; treasurer, M. C. Pacheco; executive committee, Frank Andrade, M. T. Furtado, J. F. Durao and Alfredo C. Silva.

The following are the stated objects of the club: "The objects of this organization shall be to obtain a decentralization of the governmental power and to obtain legislation vesting the administration of public works, local laws and government in officers to be elected by the voters of the various judicial districts and who owing their official positions to the votes of the people shall thus be directly responsible to the people."

To procure the naturalization of all Portuguese who are now or shall hereafter become eligible to become American Citizens and by thus increasing number of Portuguese voters to enable our people to express and exert the influence in public affairs to which our numbers and interests entitle us.

"In order to obtain the best and most advantageous representation, the club shall, at a special or regular meeting, endorse, by a two thirds vote of all members enrolled, a candidate for the Territorial Legislature, who shall be placed and run on such ballot as the club shall designate and deem to be the best interests of the Portuguese voters in this Territory, without permanent party affiliation, provided such party shall place said candidate on their ballot."

"Any male Portuguese over eighteen years of age can become a member. It is desirous of educating the young people to a knowledge of American politics so that when they become of legal age they can cast their ballots intelligently. The club also sets forth that in order to obtain the best and most advantageous representation, the club shall, at a special or regular meeting, endorse, by a two thirds vote of all members enrolled, a candidate for the Territorial Legislature, who shall be placed and run on such ballot as the club shall designate and deem to be the best interests of the Portuguese voters in this Territory, without permanent party affiliation, provided such party shall place said candidate on their ballot."
