TREASURE ON THE NIPPON.

The steamer Nippon Maru carries treasure valued at \$48,475 including \$2,864 in Mexican dollars, \$46,000 in gold coin, \$207,096 in gold bullion and \$200,000 in silver bullion. All the gold bullion goes to Kobe, \$230,000 in silver bullion to Bombay and all the Mexican dollars, gold coin and \$30,000 in silver bullion to Hong Kong. The shippers were Wells, Fargo & Co., Yokohama Specie Bank, Limited, Hong Kong and Shanghai Banking Corporation and Chinese merchants.

ROSECRANS WILL CARRY OIL.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17.—The army transport Rosecrans, which has been purchased from the Government by the Matson Navigation Company for \$50,000, is to be converted into an oil burner and will be fitted up as a tank steamer and used to carry oil between here and Honolulu. With the increasing use of oil as fuel by ocean-going steamships, the necessity has arisen for the establishment of fuel oil depots where coaling stations have hitherto flourished. The Matson Navigation Company has established the first of these depots at Honolulu, and the Rosecrans will be used to keep the tanks at this depot well filled with liquid fuel.

MAY YOHE.

NEW YORK, July 23.—May Yohe, whose broken heart has been pretty well repaired since the family of Putnam Bradlee Strong made good the amount which she says she lost through over-confidence in the former Army Captain, spent this morning packing trunks at her home in Hastings and in the afternoon came to town, had a talk with her lawyer, Emanuel Friend, and then disappeared for the day. She got back to Hastings tonight.
All signs point to the speedy departure of Miss Yohe for Japan. She will not admit that she is going there. The steamer Peru leaves San Francisco for Yokohama August 1st, and the Empress of India leaves Vancouver on August 4th. If Miss Yohe decides to go back to Japan, she will probably leave on one of these steamers.
Mrs. Strong and the Shattucks left the Hotel Grosvenor today and went

back to Lenox. From a reliable source it was learned that \$15,000 was the amount given to Miss Yohe. Strong has become a renegade man. His family make him a small allowance on condition that he keep entirely away from Yohe.

LOST.

Hamburg, July 24.—Up to last night the names of 71 survivors of those who were on board the steamship Primus of this port when she was sunk on Monday in a collision on the River Elbe with the tug Hansa had been received by the authorities. It has been ascertained that 112 of the passengers of the Primus are missing.

FOR THE COMMISSION.

At a special meeting of the Builders' Exchange last night a committee consisting of L. E. Pinkham, F. J. Amweg, W. W. Harris and President Gartley was appointed to draft a memorial to the coming senatorial commission, setting forth the need of harbor improvements, public buildings, etc., in Hawaii. The Exchange also passed a resolution declaring the Merchants' Fair a success and recommending that a similar fair be held every two years.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

Kalihi Residents Want To Fish In the Harbor.
The Board of Health yesterday received a protest from residents of Kalihi, against the recent order prohibiting them from fishing in harbor waters. The protest, together with one from E. H. Wodehouse, representing Mrs. Victoria Ward, was referred to a committee consisting of Dr. Sloggett and Dr. Moore, who will confer with Dr. Cofer. As the health conditions in the Orient are not much improved, the order preventing fishing is likely to be continued.
The Medical Examiners reported for recommendation for license to practice the name of G. W. Clark. The petition of Kaiko for permission to bring his wife to the Settlement as his koku was denied. Supt. McLaughlin reported that he was not in need of help. Beach road residents complained of a cesspool near the long bridge, which they asserted was a menace to life and health. The matter was referred to the sanitary officer, Dr. Monsarrat was granted two months' leave of absence with pay and J. I. Shaw will act in his place during his absence on the Coast.

SETTING ASIDE VERDICTS.

Judge Humphreys Says Why It Is Done.
The case of Chee Kit vs. Lee Lung, a suit for \$1,000 damages for assault, was concluded yesterday before Judge Humphreys. In instructing the jury, some of whom were on the jury whose verdict he summarily set aside a few days ago, Judge Humphreys discussed the question of setting aside jury verdicts. He said that it was very rare for a court to set aside a verdict on account of error by the jury. The reasons for such action might be in an error of the court, in giving instructions or in ruling on motions during the course of the trial.
The jurors returned a verdict awarding the plaintiff \$300.
Judge Robinson yesterday granted a writ of ne exeat in the case of T. Ahung vs. Chang Lee Yun et al. Lee Yun was arrested to prevent his leaving on the Nippon Maru.

AGAINST UNCLE SAM.

A Fusion of European Powers Is Proposed.
VIENNA, July 23.—The Journal Die Information predicts a fusion of the dual and triple alliances to meet "the American invasion."
BERLIN, July 22.—The Keuz Zeitung, dealing with Great Britain's position in the world, maintains that she is not economically independent of other nations.
"The colonies," says the Zeitung, "are rapidly severing themselves from the mother country, which will finally be absorbed by America, inasmuch as the rise of the United States means the political and economic downfall of Great Britain."
LONDON, July 22.—The Committee of the Federation of Master Cotton-spinners' Association of the Southeast Lancashire announces that the recent circular to the trade advising a reduction of the output in order to meet the emergency created by America's raising of the price of cotton has failed to receive the necessary 80 per cent of favorable replies.
The matter will be discussed at the annual meeting of the Federation tomorrow.
