UPPER NUUANU FOREST RESERVE
2500,000 TREES PLANTED IN THE COURSE OF NINE YEARS.

METHODS OF WORK THAT ARE PURSUED.
The World Searched for Varieties That Are Suitable to the Conditions Existing—Some of the Varieties Planted.

The reforesting of the upper Nuuanu valley is going on at the rate of planting 30,000 trees a year. Since 1893 when the work began there have been planted about 250,000 trees in that valley. These trees are of almost innumerable species. The world is being searched for varieties which are suitable for the conditions that prevail there. Already the change from the barren condition that prevailed there a few years ago is apparent and expert Forester Griffiths who was here some time ago and made a report on forest conditions of Hawaii speaks of the work done and being done in terms of the highest praise.

The work is being done under the immediate direction of Forester Griffiths. He has a force of nine men who are kept constantly at work. The seeds are first planted in propagating frames. When they have germinated and grown up a few inches they are placed in small "pots" made of ti leaf. When they have grown large enough in these to be planted where they are expected to grow they are planted in "pots" and all the ti leaf soon rotting away and adding its substance to the fertility of the soil.

On days like yesterday when the rain prevents work out of doors, the force of men is employed in the propagating house making the ti leaf pots and placing the little seedling trees in them. The work of making 30,000 of these little "pots" in the course of a year, is in itself not inconsiderable. Of the varieties of trees planted, many of course are of a purely experimental nature, as it cannot be foretold with certainty which will thrive and when will not. Experiments are being made among other varieties, with the sandal wood tree, which in the early part of the century was the chief export of the Islands. So far the experiments with this tree have only been fairly successful. A sort of pseudo sandal wood, a variety of which has been found to thrive much better. A tree known as Koa Melanoxylon, or foreign koa has been found to thrive excellently. The Ironwood tree does well. It grows straight up notwithstanding the terrific winds which blow through the pass in the Fall and sweep nearly every other tree. Cork oak trees are doing fairly well, and a tree known as the silk oak is being experimented with. The Eucalyptus in a number of varieties is being planted and thrives.

Experiments are being made with all the indigenous trees from the other islands which are thought to be of value. Among these are the Ohia, the Kou and the Kukui. The Kou does not thrive very well, being peculiarly liable to the attacks of insects. The experience with the Kou is thought by some to be added proof of the theory that the Kou is a tree which is becoming extinct in the natural process of evolution.

A tree of which considerable is anticipated is called the turpentine tree. In addition to propagating and planting trees, the forester's force have to look after the growing trees, straightening them up where the wind bends their roots, loosening the soil about their roots, and generally giving them such culture as will secure the best results. Another line of work is keeping down the lantana on the government reserves. The upper valley is now practically clear of lantana and is kept clear by a rule which directs all employees to cut down and burn every sprig and branch of lantana they find. Experiments with Panicum and other grasses are being carried on. The panicum is found to be able to kill out the Hilo grass and there is a constant and growing demand for the grass by the public to plant for forage.

The government reserves extend, generally speaking, from the reservoirs up to the pass, and the general aim is to make it a forest that will conserve the rainfall of the region making the water supply for the city, constant and perennial.
