## HE SHOT A PAKE

### "Jim" Sharin Does Injury With His Rifle.

Fired Wildly and a Chinese Shop-  
keeper Was In Line—Wound  
Dressed and Sharin Jailed.

Jim Sharin, his N. G. H. rifle and a  
wounded Chinaman, blood dripping to  
the cement floor from the face of the  
aged hawle and the right leg of the  
Pake, all made a scene at the Police  
Station last night.

Sharin was drunk. He said he had  
fired a shot. "And that's all I know  
about it," he concluded with a mandarin  
grin. The Pake winced in pain. Offi-  
cer Neeley, a smart emergency sur-  
geon had made a tourniquet. This was  
snug and besides the heavy bullet from  
the military piece had made an ugly  
mark. Dr. N. B. Emeron came and  
dressed the Pake's hurt and the wound-  
ed man was taken to his home by  
friends he had caused to be summoned.

Officers Neeley and Espinda had  
been sent in a hurry to lower Queen  
street on their wheels. They found  
about the cottage and Sharin and the  
little store of Tai Lung a crowd of  
500 to 600 people—Portuguese and na-  
tives. The Chinaman was crying out  
that he had been killed. Sharin, swing-  
ing his rifle about was making all  
sorts of war and killing talk. The  
officers, knowing Sharin of old, were a  
bit careful. They made a rush on him  
after some maneuvering. He resisted,  
but was quickly downed. It was then  
found that there was only an empty  
shell in the gun. While Sharin was  
being arrested the Chinaman was  
taken to the Police Station in a car-  
riage some foreigners had called.

Sharin did not shoot at the China-  
man at all. A number of Portuguese  
and native boys were teasing the old  
fellow. These amateur hoodlums find  
game in the old man every time he is  
in his cups. He ordered them away,  
brought out his gun and declared he  
would shoot. The boys yelled at him  
and dared him to shoot. At last he  
fired. The shot was a wild one, but  
the Pake was in line, sitting in the  
doorway of his store, and received the  
bullet in the calf of his right leg.  
There is not much flesh on that part  
of the average Chinaman and Tai Lung  
will have a trouble on his hands for  
some time. He grinned a little when  
he happened to think and remarked that  
it might have been worse.

It was necessary to send the tempo-  
rary patrol wagon out after Sharin.  
The old fellow did not take kindly at  
all to being hauled from his home by  
the police.

Sharin is a stableman in the Govern-  
ment yard near the Judiciary Building.  
He is a capable and faithful man when  
sober and has been in the service a  
long time. He has always been more or  
less of a drinker and lately his spree  
have been very frequent. On a number  
of occasions he has done some shooting  
and about a year ago his rifle was  
taken from him. He behaved for some  
months and on his promise to be order-  
ly and careful had the gun returned  
to him. He has probably now seen  
the last of a military rifle for his use  
in this country.

## KAHULUI COMPANY.

### Ruling In Its Favor In the Maui Railway Case.

A decision by Judge Perry sustains  
defendant's demurrer in the case of the  
Hawaiian Commercial Company against  
the Kahului Railway Company. The  
court says:

"After careful consideration I am of  
the opinion that the bill does not state  
facts from which the Court can find  
either that the complainant will suffer  
irreparable injury, or that a multipli-  
city of suits will necessarily result if  
this Court does not take jurisdiction of  
this suit, and that the complainant  
has a plain, speedy and adequate  
remedy at law. For these reasons the  
demurrer is sustained."

The ruling is in favor of the Kahu-  
lui Railway people. The Commercial  
Company wanted the Court to place an  
injunction against the Kahului Com-  
pany to the end that there should never  
be any interference with the new cross-  
ing made by the Commercial Company.

## Another Play.

In a few weeks now the St. Louis  
College Literary Society will present  
another play in the cosy theater on the  
grounds of the institution. Against the  
time of the entertainment, improve-  
ments are being made to the stage and  
scenery will be added. The hall is one  
of the most attractive and best equip-  
ped in the city. The literary society is  
composed of students and graduates of  
the college and has some fine stage  
talent that has been seen to good ad-  
vantage in the past. A play somewhat  
more ambitious than any yet given has  
been selected and the first rehearsal  
has been held.

## Will Be a Great Concert.

Since the announcement yesterday  
morning of postponement and change  
of hall, several new features have been  
secured for the native church benefit  
concert, to be given on Saturday even-  
ing next, at the opera house. This  
promises now to be the musical event  
of the year. The committee expects to  
sell about 1,200 tickets before the doors  
are opened. The churches to be reliev-  
ed and assisted are at Kalihi, Moanalua  
and Kaimoiliili.

## IT WAS MORRIS.

### The Question as to Who Saved the Life of Little Brito.

An investigation into the matter of  
who saved the boy Brito from drowning  
a week ago Thursday, was held yester-  
day. The spectators of the incident  
have signed their names to a paper  
testifying that Morris jumped in and  
rescued the lad. This was the state-  
ment made in this paper the next  
morning. The sum of \$10 has been  
given by Marshal Brown to the deserv-  
ing hero. There seems to have been  
fraud in the claim for the first \$10, as  
the boy reported to have saved Brito  
cannot swim.

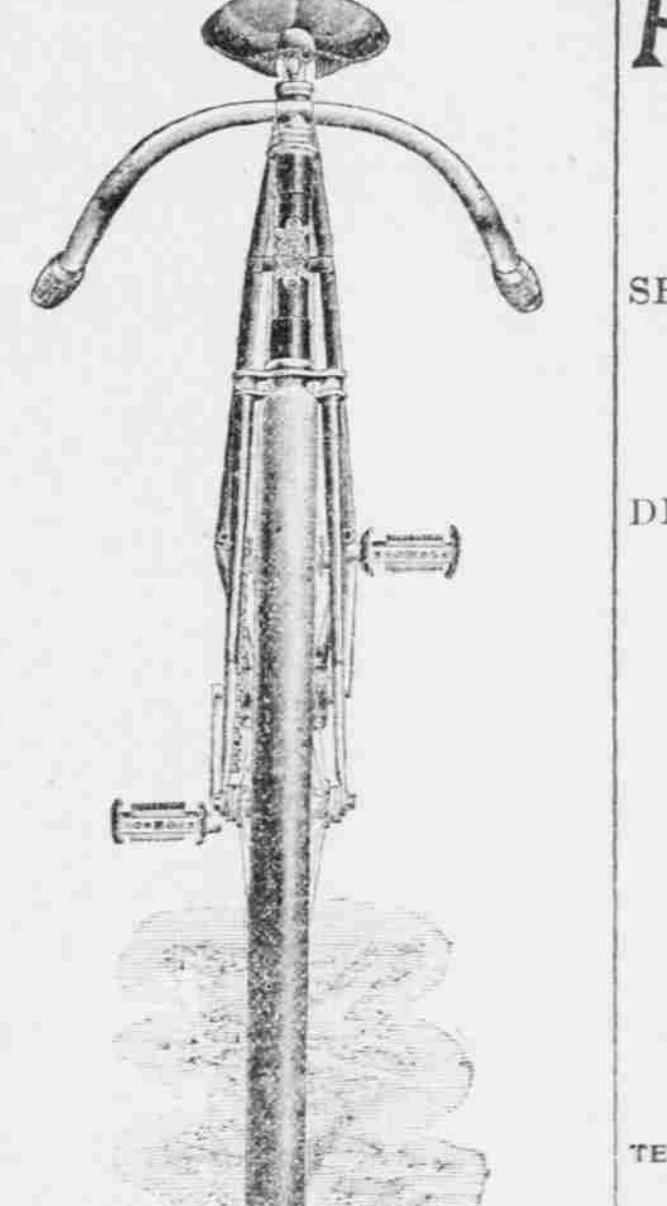

chased from you is giving us satisfaction. We  
are using it to plow under a crop of lupins. They  
are three feet high and very thick. Your plow  
turns them completely under, at the same time  
plowing the land fourteen inches deep.

I feel satisfied that with this plow the draft  
for the same quantity and depth of work is as  
6 to 8. That is, with the old plow, to do the same  
work, it takes 8 good mules; with your plow it  
takes only 6, and they are less tired at night.

Please send me another plow by first schooner  
leaving for this.
