**GREATEST DRY DOCK.**

To Be Built at Newport News at a Cost of \$1,000,000.

C. B. Orcutt, president of the Newport News Shipbuilding Co., has informed Secretary Long that he intends to begin immediately the construction at Newport News of the largest dry dock in the world, capable when completed of accommodating at once two of the largest battleships or three small cruisers.

The dock will be without an equal, and for length and breadth surpass all of the great docks of the British Government and others controlled by private parties. Work on this big basin begins at once, the site having already been selected. In length it will exceed 900 feet or be at least 250 feet longer than the biggest of the transatlantic liners. It will have a beam double that of almost any battleship, and when completed will have cost \$1,000,000. The fact that Newport News will be protected by the defenses of Fort Monroe makes the dry dock of additional value to the United States navy. The new graving dock at Glasgow, of a length of 880 feet, is the next largest in existence in the world. The projected dock improvements at Liverpool include, however, a graving dock of 900 feet, the same length as the projected dry dock in Newport News.

**Drew a Crowd.**

Kahahawai, a young Hawaiian, was arrested last night and held for investigation. He walked into the house of a Japanese and, after making himself at home for a little while, walked upstairs and began looking about for what he could find on the premises. The Japanese became tired of this kind of thing and called in the police. Bicycle Patrolmen Jackson and Gardner went to the place in Chinatown and found the native upstairs. He waxed very insolent and would not submit to arrest. He caught Jackson by the throat and tried to throttle him, but Jackson was acquainted with that part of the business himself and it was not long before the native was safe in a cell in the police station. Kahahawai was slightly under the influence of liquor. He told the story that he had been inveigled into the upper room by the Japanese and had been held there. He declared that a job had been set up on him. However, when he was searched at the police station, some fine silk handkerchiefs were found on his person. A crowd of some 200 Japanese and Chinese gathered around the police station after the arrest.

**Cyclomere.**

Manager Chas. F. Murray stated last evening that the opening of Cyclomere for a bicycle race meet had been postponed till the 30th, one week from Saturday evening next. The reason for this is the uncertainty of the light supply. The Hawaiian Electric Works expects to be able to furnish the current by the date given. If not, an arrangement will be made by the track people with the Government for a temporary service. Most of the wheelmen are glad that there has been a postponement, for only a few of the riders have done as much training as they desire.

**Wells for Molokai.**

Kimo (J. S.) McCandless, left by the Wilder steamer Helene yesterday afternoon for Kaunakakai, Molokai. Mr. McCandless took along a complement of men and a complete artesian well boring outfit. This is for the purpose of filling an order of the new Molokai Ranch Company. Work will be commenced at once for a well near Kanakakai. If this is a success a number of others will be bored and cane planting in an extensive manner, with a Molokai mill to follow. Mr. McCandless is confident that he will strike a flow of good water near Kaunakakai at a reasonable depth.

**Grieg Concert.**

One of the rarest musical treats of the season will be the "Grieg" concert by the Musical Circle of the Kiloahua Art League at the league rooms this evening, beginning at 8 o'clock. The circle has taken particular pains with the program and has provided something very much out of the ordinary. The hall at the corner of Fort and Hotel streets will be decorated in the style of the Norwegians, and the music will be Norwegian throughout. The people who have the affair in charge wish it stated that any of the members of the league who wish to, may bring a friend.

**Not the Kaena.**

The Inter-Island Co. denies the story published in one of the afternoon papers to the effect that the Kaena will go to Laysan Island with provisions. The Kaena could not go. However, negotiations are now pending for sending one of the Inter-Island steamers. This, according to a man who knows about the affairs of the company, will undoubtedly be the steamer Naeau.

**Case of A. A. Crozier.**

Friends of A. A. Crozier called at this office last evening and expressed indignation over the manner in which that gentleman's visit to Honolulu had been depicted in an evening paper. Mr. Crozier has been a professor in the Michigan State Agricultural University. That he was here ill was about the only correct statement in half a column of grossly indelicate comment upon the incident. Mr. Crozier had means sufficient for his needs and found friends here. He was not turned out of the Queen's Hospital. He was not at any time an inmate of the institution. He was not turned out of a hotel or a boarding house. He was not a hermit lying down on Diamond Head awaiting the end. He took up his abode in a tent there because he thought it best for his health. Mr. Crozier is a quiet, cultivated gentleman and will be most deeply pained by such cruel publicity as has been given him.

**Heavy Salvage.**

Some time during Saturday night the launch from the bark Highland Light broke loose from her moorings and drifting down the bay was picked up by some boatmen. It was run on the beach by them and is now held for \$100 salvage. The Highland Light was in this port some months ago.
