**WHARF AND WAVE.**

**DIAMOND HEAD SIGNAL STATION,** May 4, 10 p. m.—The weather is cloudy; wind, fresh, N. E.

The steamer Iwa came in from Oahu ports last night.

The S. N. Castle hauled over to the Oceanic wharf yesterday and took sugar from the Helene.

The bark Himalaya now in port, was built in Sunderland, England, in 1863. She will get her register as soon as she has discharged her cargo of coal.

The Lehua is expected in from Hilo at the latter part of the week. She will be placed on the Mokohi route and the latter steamer will be laid up for repairs.

The Veritas sailed from Newcastle for this port with a cargo of 993 tons of coal on April 7th. At that time there were no other coal vessels to load for this port.

The schooner Kekauikeaouli will start out at 4 p. m. today for Waipio, Hawaii. After discharging her general cargo there she will return to Paauilo, Hamakua for a load of sugar.

The Mokohi came in from her usual ports yesterday morning and sailed again in the afternoon. She has been very busy of late with freight for the Molokai ranch and the leper settlement.

The American bark Ceylon, Calhoun master, arrived in port yesterday forenoon, 29 days from Seattle with a full cargo of lumber for Allen & Robinson. She is now at the wharf of that company.

The ship A. J. Fuller will finish discharging on Friday and will take in her stiffening on the same day. When she has finished this she will haul over to the railroad wharf to take on 1,900 tons of Ewa sugar.

The Helene came in from Hawaii ports yesterday afternoon. On her way across the channel Tuesday afternoon, a native sailor fell overboard but was rescued by quick work on the part of Captain McDonald and his corps of worthy assistants.

The James Makee arrived in port yesterday morning from Kapaa with a full cargo of sugar which she discharged and then proceeded on her way back to Kapaa in the afternoon. Purser Christian reports as follows: Sugar left on Kauai, 26,230 bags divided as follows: Kilauea, 2,600 bags; Kapaa, 9,000; Hanamaulu, 5,000; Lihue, 600; Koloa, 2,300; Makaweli, 4,000; Kekaha, 5,000; 4,000 at the mill in Kekaha. When the Makee left Kauai the Kauai was at Elelee discharging freight. An abundance of rain on Kauai is reported.

**A March of Rats.**

After the old fish market was demolished there remained in the neighborhood an old mark of almost equal size and unsightliness. This was the large two-story building occupied by Japanese as a lodgings and living establishment. It was built many years ago and was for a long time a combination boat building establishment and sail loft. It has been a favorite place for Japanese, being handy for them on leaving quarantine. The old place was infested with rats. A number were seen when the carpenters were at work tearing down. The grand march of rats was when water from the dredger reached the building. The rodents left in troops.

**Suicide Perhaps.**

The sudden death of Ah Wai, a Chinese lad about 10 years old, was reported to the police at 1:30 o'clock this morning. Drs. Cooper and Howard were summoned. The boy and his mother and 12 years old sister have been living at Ah Swan's. The father died a short time since and the other occupants of the house say that all three have been eating opium ever since. Too much of the drug is supposed to have caused the lad's death. An inquest will be held.

**NATIVE DEAF MUTE.**

**Feculiar Situation When Arraigned in Court.**

Yesterday morning a Chinaman arrived at the police station with a native boy aged about 14 years, in his charge. The boy was found to be deaf and dumb. He complained that the boy had thrown a rock at him which struck him in the head. The case came up in the Police Court almost immediately after the arrival of the Chinaman and his charge. The boy pleaded not guilty. His mother who had been summoned made signs to her son and then explained to the Court that the Chinaman had thrown water on the boy who had become infuriated and tried to get even. The boy was discharged.

At the conclusion of the case many questions were asked back and forth by the people who had been present at the trial. What if the native boy had been arrested on the charge of murder and, by circumstantial evidence, had been found guilty? Would he necessarily hang? The deaf and dumb people among the natives are not educated like the people of the same stamp in the United States and can only speak by signs which are understood only by people who have been with them from infancy. Not being able to offer one word in defense except perhaps a shake of the head, would such a person be condemned to the gallows? The law on the matter as found in Article 6 of the Constitution (Right of Trial), reads as follows: "Section 2. Except in case of impeachment or offenses within the jurisdiction of the District Magistrate, or in summary proceedings for contempt, no person shall be held to answer for any offense except upon indictment, information of complaint, describing such offense; and he shall in all cases have the right to meet the witnesses who are produced against him, face to face; to produce witnesses and proofs in his own favor; and by himself or his counsel, at his election, to examine the witnesses produced by himself and cross-examine those produced against him, and to be heard in his own defense."

The question is, "where does the deaf and dumb native come in?"

**For New Wharves.**

The Government dredger is just now pumping off Lime Kiln Point. A filling in being made almost to Nuuanu stream and on a line with the newest wharf. This line may be slightly changed. Lime Kiln Point, as well as the old lime kiln have entirely disappeared. Considerable stone wall has been made as part of the support for the proposed new long wharf. Some piles have been driven and there are marking for three rows of piles. The dredger is working in soft mud and is making a big showing.

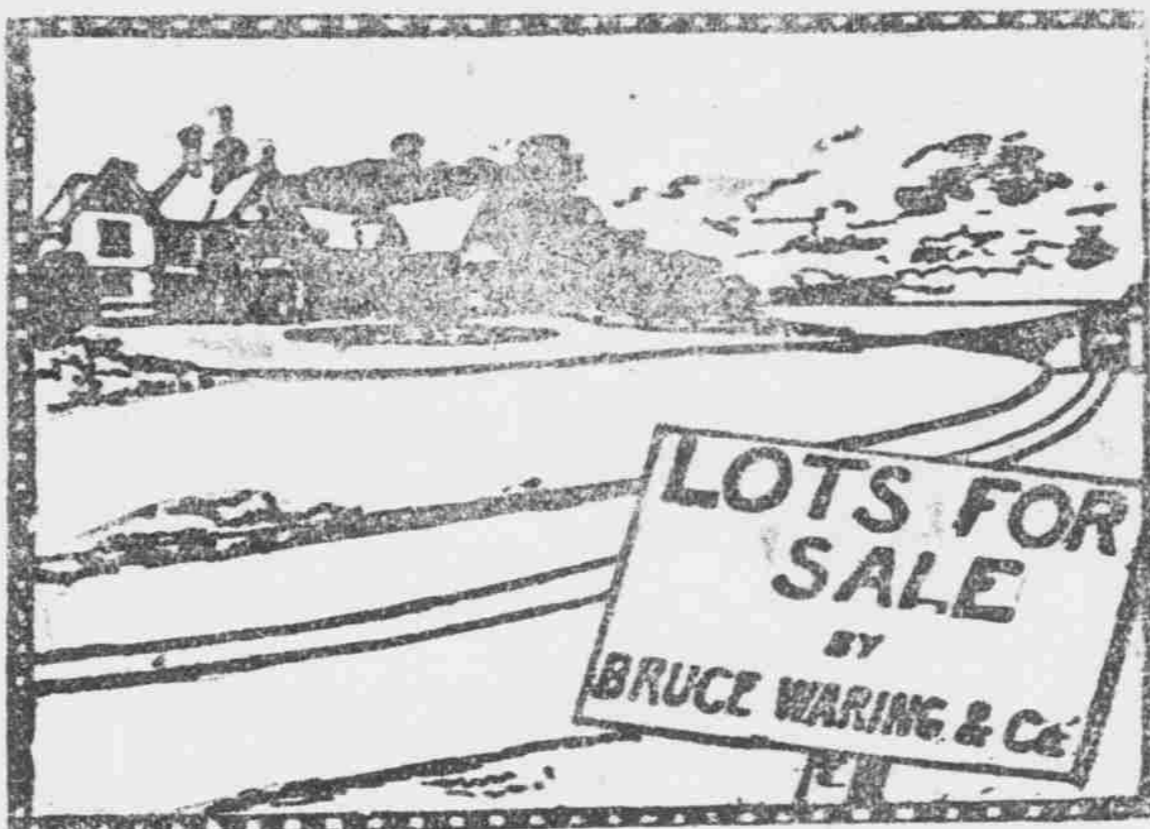
