BOMBARDMENT IS BAD.

Bert Willison Made Acquaintance of Shells in 1890.

Willison, the circus man and Mrs. Willison were spending their honeymoon at Buenos Ayres when that place was bombarded by rebels in 1890. Frank Saunders, Willison's outside man, was there also. Saunders went out for a look when the trouble began. He was picked up by the insurgents, handed a gun and was in the fighting for six days. The Willison party had 48 hours notice to leave and all excepting the proprietor and his wife and Saunders went down to Montevideo. Willison and Saunders thought Buenos Ayres would be all right. The President of the country had been invited to resign. He declined and ordered out his army, which was promptly engaged by the rebels, who had several warships with them and all of the civil guard or militia. Willison says shells from the ships killed people and demolished property at a fearful rate. Every day or two a truce of a couple of hours would be declared to permit gathering up of the dead from the street. Some most terrible scenes were witnessed. Mrs. Willison tells of the child of a friend of hers being killed in the arms of its father by a wild bullet. Willison saw a man struck dead by a shell fragment. Mr. and Mrs. Willison joined the Red Cross corps and did all they could to aid the wounded and assist distressed people. Food was very scarce and the only opportunity to lay in supplies was when firing ceased to allow picking up the dead. In Buenos Ayres they have one of the most extensive tram systems of any city of the world. Early in the revolution a regiment of loyal troops were brought from a distance in cars of the tram company. This train was set upon by the rebels and the whole regiment wiped out in the streets. The insurgents had built forts hurriedly and seemed to have things their own way. Finally the President announced that to stop bloodshed he would give up his office and as well pardon all offenders. The insurgents believed this offer honestly made and laid down their arms. The President was fearfully dishonest and securing control again had hundreds of the rebels shot down. The only satisfaction the defeated men could get was to kill policemen at night and they kept up at the rate of a dozen victims or more a week till a heavy military patrol was instituted.

THEY ARE UNFIT.

Reported Deficiencies in Spain's Equipment.

NEW YORK, April 28.—A World special from Madrid says: The Spanish people are almost paralyzed with disappointment tonight that the combined squadrons at the Cape Verde Islands sailed today for a destination which was not made public. Everybody believed that the fleet was nearly across the Atlantic and was about to attack United States ports. It was announced officially today that the fleet had left for America. Afterwards Admiral Bermejo, Minister of Marine, told the public that the fleet was far away over the ocean.

The Government's deception of the people is resented bitterly. The official announcement says that the fleet which sailed was composed of the first-class armored cruisers Cristobal Colon, Infanta Maria Teresa, Almirante, Oquendo and Vizcaya, torpedo boat destroyers Furor, Terror and Pluton and transport City of Cadiz. It was added that the torpedo boats Ariete, Rayo and Azor would return to Cadiz. If the small, unseaworthy torpedo boats are left behind to come home, it is presumed that the others intend to cross the sea.

Public indignation at being trifled with in reference to the Cape Verde fleet, of which great things are expected, was intensified by the news that the battleship Pellayo only left Cartagena last Monday, and reached Cadiz today. It was supposed that the Pellayo and another battleship, the Emperador Carlos V., were on the other side of the ocean by this time, and perhaps preparing to bombard New York. The same deception and dilatoriness have been discovered in the fitting out of other vessels of war at navy yards, due partly to a scandalous deficiency of equipment and supplies at the royal arsenals.

Spaniards are extremely angry with their Government. If the navy fails to come up to their extravagant expectations, or meets with serious reverses, there will be an uprising of the people which will be irresistible.

The disengaged tonnage at San Francisco is smaller than it has been for years. It is a question as to whether, since San Francisco has been a port of any size, there have ever been so few idle vessels in the harbor. The large grain crop of last year cleared the port of deep-sea ships, and the gold discoveries in Alaska and the consequent rush to the north have provided occupation for all available vessels.

CYCLOMERE ECHOES.

One More Effort Will Be Made to Have the Sport.

Everybody seemed sorry yesterday to learn that the town was really to lose Cyclomere. A number of men of means who favor such sport as the place has seen, expressed willingness to contribute money to continuance of racing for a year or so. However, no one appears to care to assume the burden of management of Cyclomere. The track is probably doomed. It is not expected that interest in cycling will abate to any great extent, it is certain that the wheel interest will lose that zest which racing has given it everywhere. The New York World is authority for the statement that 1898 will be the greatest cycling year the United States has yet seen. New tracks for middle distance racing are being built at a number of centers of population. Michael, the phenomenal pace follower, is to receive \$15,000 for riding seven times in June and July. Nearly all the best California men have been called East for the season. Bilmartin has gone to New York.

It was learned at a late hour last night that a young man who is prominent in amateur sporting circles and who has both the means and ability to carry out the project would endeavor today to secure Cyclomere for a limited time. In case this man gets the lease he will give a meet, beginning Saturday night of this week. The cooperation of the riders is already assured. A good program will be offered and all that will remain will be for the public to extend patronage. This will in all likelihood be the very last effort made to hold the beautiful track. It is evident that baseball is not going to amount to as much this year as last and aside from cycling there will be little amateur sport.

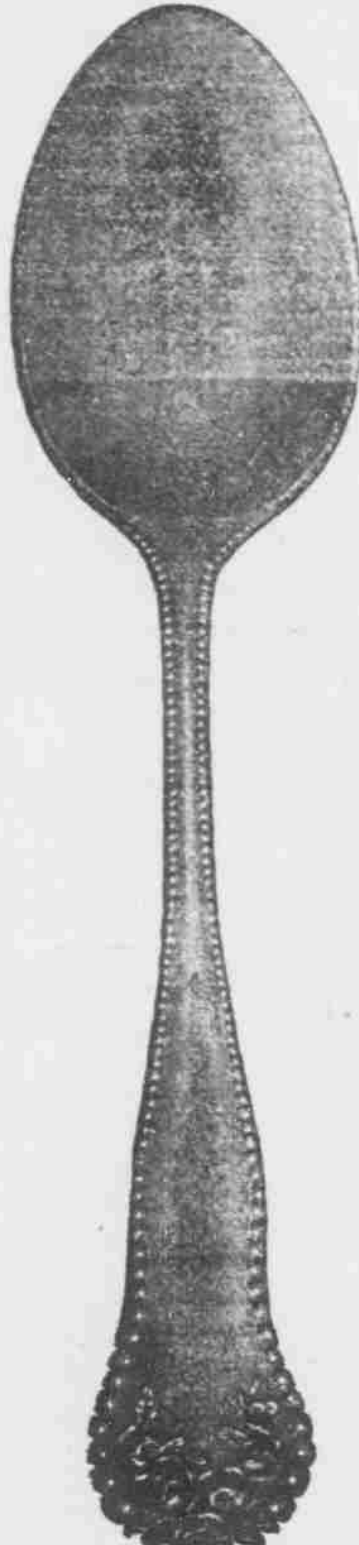
