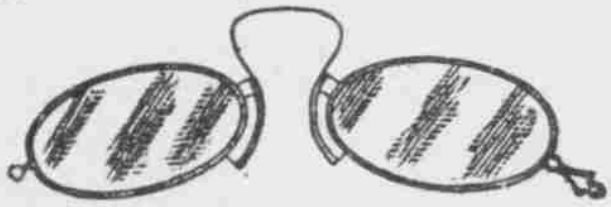

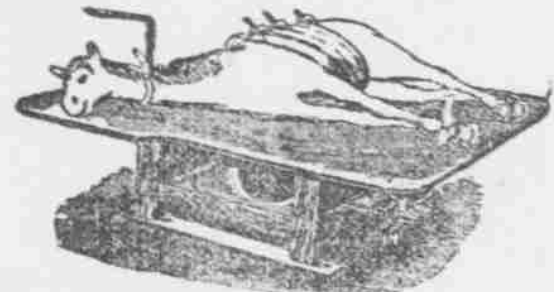

CO. "A" HIGH JINKS

The Re-Election of Capt. Paul Smith Celebrated.

Supper in the Drill Shed—Talks and
Music for the Boys—A
Legislator.

All of the 60 members of Company
A, N. G. H., were out on Saturday
night for a high jinks of that com-
mand. The celebration was held after
the reelection of Capt. Paul Smith to
be at the helm for another year. All
arrangements were made in advance,
for there was no opposition to the
popular and capable commander. Capt.
John Schaefer presided at the election
in accordance with orders from head-
quarters. The matter of nominating
and balloting occupied but a few min-
utes.

After the installation of Captain
Smith the company and a few invited
guests adjourned from the A armory
to the main hall of the Drill Shed.
Here had been spread a long table.
The supper was a good one and the
boys "fell to" with zest. After the
meal came the smoking and the liquid
refreshments. The good time lasted
till nearly midnight.

The first toast was to the President
and the Republic. Lieutenant Colonel
Soper, Adjutant General, responded
for the commander-in-chief and the
flag. The speaker referred to the close
relations which in the militia organi-
zation existed throughout the body and
on behalf of the President thanked
the boys for their strict attention to
duty and their fidelity at all times.

For the sentiment "The Health of
the White Regiment," Lieutenant Col-
onel McLeod answered. He com-
plimented Captain Smith and Lieutenants
Klemme and Fetter on the good show-
ing that Company A was able to make
at all times. He said the Regiment was
in a healthy, satisfied condition and
that this was largely due to coopera-
tion of all to the end that success
might be achieved. Lieutenant Colonel
McLeod said that there were under
consideration in headquarters a num-
ber of plans for the benefit of the ser-
vice.

There was present a member of the
Legislature and when the lawmakers
were toasted Representative Kaeo of
Kauai made an eloquent and spirited
address. The gentleman is chock full
of aggressive American ideas and is an
ardent annexationist. He hoped that
the union of the greater and lesser Re-
publics would be accomplished in time
for the First Regiment to have a
chance for some work. Mr. Kaeo said
"Remember the Maine," and expressed
the belief that the First Regiment, N.
G. H., would give a first-class account
of itself if given the opportunity for
action.

Those who came to the dinner late
and who were called upon for remarks
were Colonel Fisher, Captain Ashley
and G. A. Davis. Captain Smith made
a good talk to the boys and presided
during the evening. There was plenty
of quintette club music and chorus
singing.

Captain Smith now enters upon his
fifth term as commander of Company
A. He went into the military as a
private of this command in January,
1893, and consequently was through
boots the overthrow and '95 uprising.
In May '93, Captain Smith became a
corporal, in June was elected second
lieutenant, in March of the following
year first lieutenant and in May of '94
captain. For his commissions he had
passed creditable examinations and
has one of the best drilled companies
in the service. It has been the practice
with Company A to go into camp for
a few days once a year at its own ex-
pense. This training has been of much
value.

Police Court.

In the Police Court Saturday fore-
noon the case of Kan Ku for importing
opium was set for May 16th, and that
of a woman for profanity for the 18th.
Keawe was fined \$50 and costs for
assault and battery on Kealoha. This
was an aggravated case. In the evi-

then came out and the same treatment
was accorded him. After the case was
over Saturday, native like, the old
lady said: "I am so sorry for my
boy. I wish he had not been arrested."

FOREIGN NEWS NOTES.

The House of Representatives at
Washington has disposed of two im-
portant measures. The Alaskan land
bill extending the homestead laws
and providing for certain railway
rights of way in the district of Alaska,
as amended by the Senate and agreed
upon in conference, was passed. The
labor measure, providing for arbitra-
tion of disputes between employees and
certain common carriers, a bill which
has received very wide endorsement
by the labor organizations throughout
the country, received the approval of
the House.

MADRID, May 5.—At a Cabinet
council today over which the Queen
Regent presided the Premier, Senor
Sagasta, explained the war situation
and reported the arrival at Porto Rico
of the steamer Alfonso XIII., having
on board, it is said, reinforcements of
troops and a very valuable cargo in-
cluding ammunition and supplies. The
Premier also announced the opening
of the Cuban Parliament and the Queen
Regent signed the resources bill. The
Cabinet afterwards held another meet-
ing and deliberated upon the financial
situation and measures taken and con-
templated to preserve public order in
the localities where disturbances have
occurred.

Senor Dubose, secretary to Senor
Poilo, gave a lecture in Massey hall,
Toronto, on the Cuban question. There
was a large audience. He denied that
the Cuban people had been over taxed
or ill treated and said that the country
was very prosperous and taxation light
up to the time of the outbreak of the
rebellion. He appealed for sympathy
for the Queen Regent.

MADRID, May 5.—Considerable an-
xiety is expressed here as to the fate of
Porto Rico. It is feared that Admiral
Sampson's squadron has gone to seize
San Juan, the capital of that colony,
and the Spanish coal supply at that
port.

The Relai de Paris says negotiations
are pending which will result in Great
Britain favoring the United States if
the other nations favor Spain by at-
tempting to stop the war before the
United States has received satisfaction.
The United States, it is said, has prom-
ised in return to capture the Canary
Islands and cede them to Great Brit-
ain.

The schooner Crown, Captain Line-
han, has been lost off St. John's Nfld.,
and her crew of 11 drowned. The
cause of the wreck is not known.

A mob of about 8,000 striking miners
have made a tumultuous demonstra-
tion at Murira, capital of the Spanish
province of that name, 30 miles from
the port of Carthagena. They shouted
"Death to the thieves." "Down with
the taxes." A force of troops preven-
ted the rioters from moving on the port
of Carthagena. A number of men were
wounded.

It was announced in the Spanish
Cortes that there will shortly be pub-
lished a decree forbidding the export
of wheat.
