WHARF AND WAVE.

DIAMOND HEAD SIGNAL STA-
 TION, May 16, 10 p. m.—The weather
 is clear; wind, light, N. E.
 The Planter will probably finish dis-
 charging her cargo today.
 The Western Monarch is back at the
 fishmarket wharf taking on sugar.
 The Carrier Dove will haul over to
 the railroad wharf today to load sug-
 ar.
 Some 350 tons of fertilizer will be
 shipped from the railroad wharf to-
 day.
 W. G. Hall for Kauai ports at 5 p. m.
 For Nawiliwili, passengers alone will
 be taken.
 The Esther Budine will soon haul
 over to the railroad wharf there to
 get a whole load of sugar.
 The steamer Mokolii sailed for Mo-
 lokai yesterday afternoon, laden with
 freight for the Molokai ranch.
 The Zealandia will have about 75
 steerage passengers today. A num-
 ber of men are leaving to enlist in the
 U. S. A.
 The Archer took on 8,500 bags of
 sugar at the railroad wharf yesterday.
 This finished her cargo. The Archer
 will sail for San Francisco this after-
 noon.
 The Emuna & Louisa will get away
 for San Diego on Thursday or Friday.
 Her cargo will consist of rice and
 thousands of bottles for the San Diego
 Brewing Co.
 The Mol Wahine with lumber, fer-
 tilizer and general merchandise for Ko-
 holalele and the Kaukeouli with
 coal, and lumber for the same place,
 will sail this forenoon.
 The O. & O. S. S. Gaelic, Finch com-
 mander, arrived off port at 10:30
 o'clock, 6 days and 9 hours from San
 Francisco. She anchored off port and
 will sail for China and Japan this
 afternoon some time. On the 12th
 inst., one of the Chinese passengers
 died aboard.

Want Thirty Days.

A member of the House of Represen-
 tatives said on Saturday night that the
 junior or lower branch of the Legisla-
 ture wanted an extension of session
 time and had to have it. "Unless we
 get 30 days additional," declared this
 member, "there will be two or three
 important appropriation bills and sev-
 eral other measures of considerable
 moment left on the table. We simply
 cannot get through in the 90 days regu-
 larly allotted. It is true that the
 House may have wasted some time,
 but on the other hand we have had an
 enormous amount of detail work to
 look after and it has consumed days
 and hours of genuine effort for which
 but few have given us any credit."

THE SIGHT AGAIN

Court of Inquiry in John
 Good Case Convenes.

Associate Counsel - Proposal to
 Shake Evidence on Which Con-
 viction Was Had.

The Court of Inquiry in the case of
 John Good, found guilty before a court
 martial in the Republic of Hawaii with
 conduct unbecoming an officer, etc.,
 met in military headquarters last
 night. The make-up of the Court has
 already been given. Attorney Robert-
 son introduced A. S. Hartwell as his
 associate representing John Good and
 then outlined briefly what points it
 would be sought to bring out during
 the sitting of the Court. Additional
 evidence of great weight and impor-
 tance had come to light, he said. Pri-
 or to the middle of May, he stated,
 1896, the sights were on all the guns
 in the shed. This would be proved
 by several witnesses. It would also
 be proven by some of these witnesses
 that they themselves worked on the
 sight. In regard to the breaking open
 of a locker where the sights were
 placed it would be proven that Ser-
 geant Weatherby himself did this
 work by drawing the staple. Wit-
 nesses were here called in to testify.
 Colonel Soper—I had H. J. Rhodes
 enlisted in the company commanded
 by Captain Good. This was at the
 President's request. He was put there
 for some special service and received
 orders from the President. Rhodes
 came to my house one evening, said
 that so far as the sight was concern-
 ed, that was all right. He had taken
 the sight and sent it to President Dole.
 Good knew nothing at all about it.
 I think he came to assure me how
 matters stood in regard to the sight.
 I understood that he reported. Think
 he told me himself. My impression is
 that it was before Captain Good's ar-
 rest that Rhodes came to me. It was
 also before the calling of the Court of
 Inquiry.
 J. W. Short—Was formerly in the
 N. G. H. Was there up to April 1st,
 1897. I ranked as private in Company
 E. Was promoted to corporal. Then
 went into Company D as sergeant.
 When Captain Good was placed under
 arrest I heard of the missing sight.
 Prior to this I had worked on the
 gun at the Waikiki end of the road.
 This was before the cholera epidemic.
 The sight was on the gun when I
 worked on it. Sergeant Middleton,
 Sprout, Gillis and another were with
 me at the time.
 J. W. Sprout was questioned on the
 subject of the sight. He was a mem-
 ber of the same squad as Short. He
 saw the gun being cleaned and saw
 the sight in the gun. He was not posi-
 tive as to dates.
 President Dole was questioned as to
 the employment of Rhodes. The same
 story told by Col. Soper was repeated
 by President Dole. In regard to the
 sight, he said it was sent to him first.
 He then handed it to Minister Cooper
 for investigation.
 The Court then adjourned as At-
 torney Robertson objected to the produc-
 tion of so much evidence without the
 presence of Captain Kenake who was
 forced, on account of the arrival of
 the Gaelic, to absent himself.
 The Court will meet again at 7:30
 o'clock this evening.
