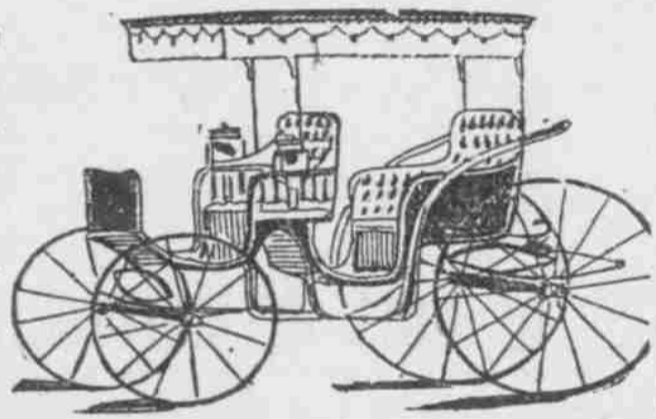

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## UMPIRE IS FINAL

Baseball Managers Come to Terms Speedily.

The Disputed Game—A Too-sweeping Opinion on Umpires—Betting. Last Call for Cyclomere.

TO HONOLULU

Managers Coyne for the Regiments and Willis for the Honolulu had a conference yesterday and settled the latest base ball dispute. It was decided by these two delegates that there was no such thing as an appeal board this season. The decision of the umpire is final. Hence Saturday's game goes to the Honolulu despite the fact that the Regiments played in the last inning under protest. At the same meeting, Capt. Coyne and Mr. Willis agreed to give out the statement that in their opinion the umpiring was unsatisfactory. It is assumed that this verdict covers the work of John Soper as well as that of Flint, though outsiders very generally resent the condemnation of Soper, who has done well enough and who knows a whole lot more about the game than some of the men who are criticising his judgment on balls and strikes. In the opinion of men qualified to have a say in the premises, Soper is and has been both quite correct and entirely impartial and is being treated unjustly by being classed with Flint. Flint, all who saw the game on Saturday will agree, made some very questionable decisions.

It is believed for the matches that Morris Keohokalole is the only man who will be agreeable to all the players and he will be urged to officiate for the rest of the series. There was not a little betting on the game of Saturday and some of the men who gambled and some of the stakeholders are expressing doubts. It can only be said on the authority of qualified men, that the decision of the umpire must be final. The game goes to the Honolulu. Capt. Coyne and Mr. Willis very properly refused to consider the betting in any way.

FATE OF CYCLOMERE.

The fate of Cyclomere hangs in the balance now in realistic fashion. The decision will come out in a fortnight. Walter C. Weedon, representing Bruce Waring & Co., sits as the Caliph. He is a bit biased, but must follow a true line. Unless by the 15th inst. a proposition to take over the Cycle Path for a definite period of some time is made, into the lake goes the track and down comes the grand stand and fence. This is positively final. No Patti farewell business about it.

This condition with regard to Cyclomere should appeal directly to the wheel enthusiasts, the wheel dealers and the sports patrons generally. Cyclomere sport has been from the first clean and pleasurable. If there is to be any more of it a stay of proceedings must be noted within fifteen days. Here is a chance for some philanthropist, for the Y. M. C. A., the H. A. A. C., an individual, a hui of patrons or the wheel houses in combination. This is the last call.

Officers' Club.

The Officers' Club has made extensive preparations for the Boys in Blue expected here in the near future on their way to the Philippines. About a week ago the two large club rooms in military headquarters that opened into one another by a large folding door were made one by the removal of this and a cutting away of a part of the partition. Now, the Waikiki part, the largest of the combined rooms, has been fitted up in fine style while the Ewa or smaller room has been reserved as a smoking room. In the former are pictures of the Maine, of President Dole, President McKinley and Admiral Dewey, while all about are Hawaiian and American flags. The two officers' rooms on the Waikiki side of the main staircase have also been fitted up for reception and entertainment rooms.

Mouth Sprinkling.

The law in regard to sprinkling clothes with the mouth went into effect on the 19th of this month and yesterday Officer W. Vida had the distinction of making the first arrests under the same. Ching Geung and Kaing were both arrested yesterday, having been caught right in the act of blowing water on clothes they were about to iron. The cases will come up in the Police Court this morning and, undoubtedly, they will be very interesting.

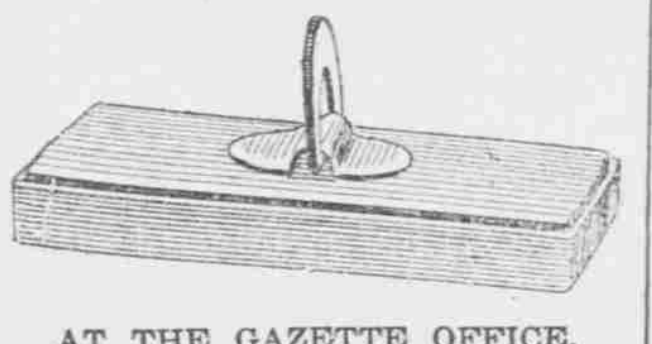
