## HERTZ IS GOOD.

The Famous Conjuror Gives a Pleasing Show. It was storming at theater traveling time last evening. There had been signs all day of bad weather. For these reasons Carl Hertz did not have a full house for the opening of his season of magic and diversion. The entertainment will draw to the capacity of the opera house when the weather is favorable.

Hertz comes to Hawaii with a world-wide reputation and quite comes up to the advance notices. He has been in the business many years. As a conjuror he is one of the greatest and besides has splendid ideas of what will entertain and hold the attention of the public. Card tricks on the stage are very usual, but Hertz shows some new ones, some good ones that are not in the books. As the opening he gave a card seance of twenty minutes or more and had the audience right with him all the time.

The illusions Noah's Ark and Stroubaika are both new here and Stroubaika is particularly remarkable and would bear presentation many times. Noah's Ark is novel and amusing. In plain sleight of hand work Hertz is a clever master. Moving pictures shown at Mr. Hertz' entertainment are far ahead of any seen here and provide a most satisfying feature of the program. Mr. Hertz has a heavy repertoire of pictures, many in colors, and will give new ones each evening.

Middle d'Alton is a capable and charming assistant to Mr. Hertz. She has a pretty voice and a fine stage presence and sings well, but might have the generosity to throw in a smile once in a while. A show will be given again tomorrow night.

## LINCOLN AND GRANT.

Two Magnificent Portraits Now Shown Here.

Those who call at the studio of Artist Wm. Cogswell in the new Love building now will be well repaid for the visit by being enabled to view grand portraits of Lincoln and Grant. The portrait of Abraham Lincoln is a reproduction of the full length one hanging in the White House at Washington and which was painted by Mr. Cogswell for this purpose and against competition in 1869. Robt. Lincoln said this was the best portrait of his father ever produced and critics and artists of all countries have commended the work. Congress voted \$3,000 for the picture at Washington.

The three-quarter length portrait of Gen. Grant is a reproduction of Cogswell's portrait of the great American. Gen. Grant was 58 when he sat for Mr. Cogswell in San Francisco. This artist now in Honolulu has painted Gen. Grant three times from life. Mr. Cogswell has since returning to Honolulu made a most faithful and attractive likeness of President McKinley. The Lincoln and Grant portraits now held here by Mr. Cogswell are to be sold in Honolulu, says the artist. He urges, and there are those who agree with him, that both these portraits should find places in some of the public institutions of the Island capital.

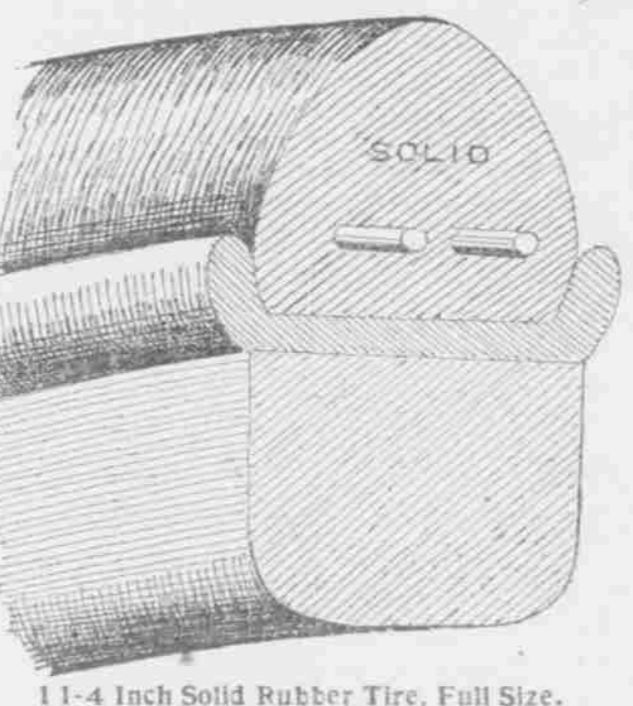

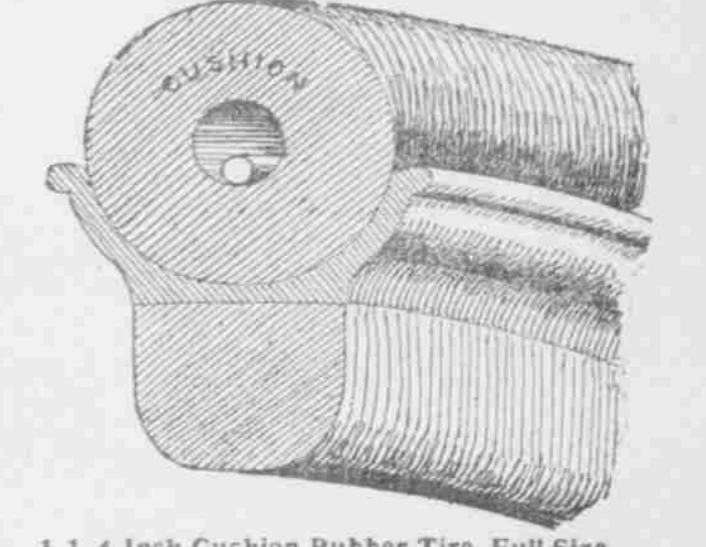
