BEST OF SEASON

Romeo and Juliet the Janet Waldorf Triumph.

Theater Crowded and Audience Enthusiastic—Excellence of Cast Members—Camille.

The Janet Waldorf company at a matinee on Saturday afternoon played Camille to a reasonably good audience. Miss Waldorf, although not up to her usual mark, nevertheless gave a very pleasing performance of Camille. The scene with Geo. Duval where Camille renounces his son, was strong and touchingly rendered. The death scene was very realistic and pathetic, but her face lacked the pallor of a dying consumptive and the hacking cough and hoarse voice which have made Modjeska famous, are wanting.

Mr. McVay's Geo. Duval and Mr. McGregor's Armand Duval were excellent. The critical people of Honolulu were evidently awaiting Romeo and Juliet, which was performed on Saturday evening, as the crucial test of Miss Waldorf's genius. The opera house was packed to standing room only in both floor and gallery by the flower of Honolulu.

Miss Janet Waldorf's Juliet was in all respects equal, excepting, perhaps, the balcony scene, to Julia Marlowe's rendering of the role. The flirting scene, at the dance, where she first sees Romeo, and the potion scene were reminiscent of the divine Neilson. No greater praise could be given.

The potion scene, where Juliet imagines what terrors might come should she awake before the time allotted, while in the tomb of her ancestors, is the most realistic thing she does. Applause greeted Miss Waldorf throughout and she was three times called to the curtain during the performance. So excellent was her performance of Juliet that on every hand was heard the comment that had Romeo and Juliet been the first performance, the success of the Waldorf company would have been the most brilliant in the annals of the opera house.

Mr. McVay's Mercutio is beyond criticism. The part of Mercutio requires good reading and this Mr. McVay did in the most finished style, keeping the audience in roars of laughter. His death scene (joking to the last) was applauded.

Mr. McGregor's Romeo was played with feeling and spirit and shows that the young man has great talent. The

duel scene was applauded to the echo. Mr. Hernandez Peter was very funny and brought down the house every time he yawned. Miss Boyer's Lady Capulet was dignified and well sustained. Mr. Boggs made a capital Friar Lawrence. F. H. A.

WEARS A MEDAL.

Musician Who Volunteered to Nurse Yellow Fever.

Frank Martinez, a member of the Thirteenth Infantry band, now on board the Senator, wears on his breast a handsome Tiffany medal. Martinez, although not an immune, volunteered as a nurse in the yellow fever hospital at Siboney during the Santiago campaign. He was placed in charge of a ward occupied by officers of the army and newspaper men who were at the front. About twenty-five of his patients who survived decided to reward the brave fellow. All contributed to the purchase of the pretty medal, which has been wrought out of solid gold. It is fashioned in a Maltese cross pendant from an engraved bar bearing the word "Santiago" in red enamel. A hospital red cross on the medal is wreathed with green leaves. The four arms of the cross are lettered with the following: "Siboney, Cuba, July, 1898."

GOLD IN MEXICO.

CHILPANCINGO, Mex., April 27.—William Nivin, the noted archaeologist of New York city, who has been making explorations in a remote region of the state of Guerrero, has discovered a gold region of fabulous richness. The vein is three feet wide and assays \$200 to \$5,000 to the ton. The region in which this discovery was made is covered with prehistoric ruins. According to tradition Montezuma's treasure was located about eighty

leagues southwest of the city of Mexico and as Professor Nivin's rich field is also that distance southwest of Mexico's capital, and as ruined villages are numerous there, it is not improbable that the famous treasure has been found.


