Cashier of the New Bank Has Arrived.

First American Bank of Hawaii
Expects to be Ready on
August 15.

W. G. Cooper, who is to fill the position of cashier and chief accountant in the First American Bank, arrived by the Coptic yesterday afternoon. He brings with him all printed matter to be used by the bank, and will also arrange the details for building the vault. This will be constructed in the temporary quarters in the Campbell block and will be taken over by the owners of the building after the bank moves into its permanent quarters in the future.

Mr. Cooper will also have charge of the fitting up of the bank, the selection of its furniture, and all such minor arrangements which it is needless to say will be of the latest styles, embracing all the recent improvements for the saving of labor and adding to the comfort of patrons.

Colonel Macfarlane leaves today by the Kakaia for San Francisco. There he will join Mr. Liffenthal who expects to arrive on the coast about the 25th. Mr. Liffenthal has been busily engaged in the East with bank matters and his arrival in San Francisco was considerably delayed. Accompanied by Colonel Macfarlane he will come to Honolulu in the middle of next month. In the meantime the temporary officers, whose names have been published in the Advertiser, will carry on organization. The appointment of the president and manager will not be definitely settled until the arrival of Mr. Liffenthal in Honolulu. Colonel Macfarlane will take with him to the coast complete bound records of all the applications, allotments, assessment calls, etc.

Everything is shaping itself most satisfactorily to the promoters. So far there has not been a single hitch in completing all the numberless details incident to the organization of a large bank. Mr. Liffenthal has so arranged matters in New York and Washington that after the Hawaiian territorial bill is passed and the National Bank charter issued the business of the First American Bank can be transferred to the First National in a single day. The transition will be easy and simple.

The First American Bank will open its doors and begin business as near as possible to the 15th of August. Workmen have been engaged for some days past in moving out the goods stored in the room and by tonight it will be ready for the mechanics who are to transform what has heretofore been a warehouse for machinery and hardware into handsome bank premises.

Cashier Cooper is well qualified to fill the responsible position for which he has been chosen. He has been for fourteen years in the employ of the Anglo-California bank and of late has held a most responsible place in its management.

Architect Traphagen is drawing the necessary plans for the vaults and the contract for the construction of the same has already been awarded to Fred Harrison.

PROTECTED BY AMERICAN FLAG.

WASHINGTON, July 11.—An order has been issued by the President extending the protection and privileges of the American flag to the shipping of Porto Rico and the Philippines. All ships owned by residents of these islands at the time of the exchange of the ratifications of the treaty are included.

ANOTHER TRAIN HELD UP.

TRINIDAD, Col., July 12.—South-bound passenger train No. 1, on the Colorado & Southern railway, was robbed by four men at a point five miles south of Folsom, N. M.

After the train had been brought to a standstill and the crew had been intimidated by guns, the robbers used dynamite with good effect, blowing open the sides of the express car.

Superintendent Webb and the Wells-Fargo express agent, Glover, both state positively that nothing was secured by the robbers.
