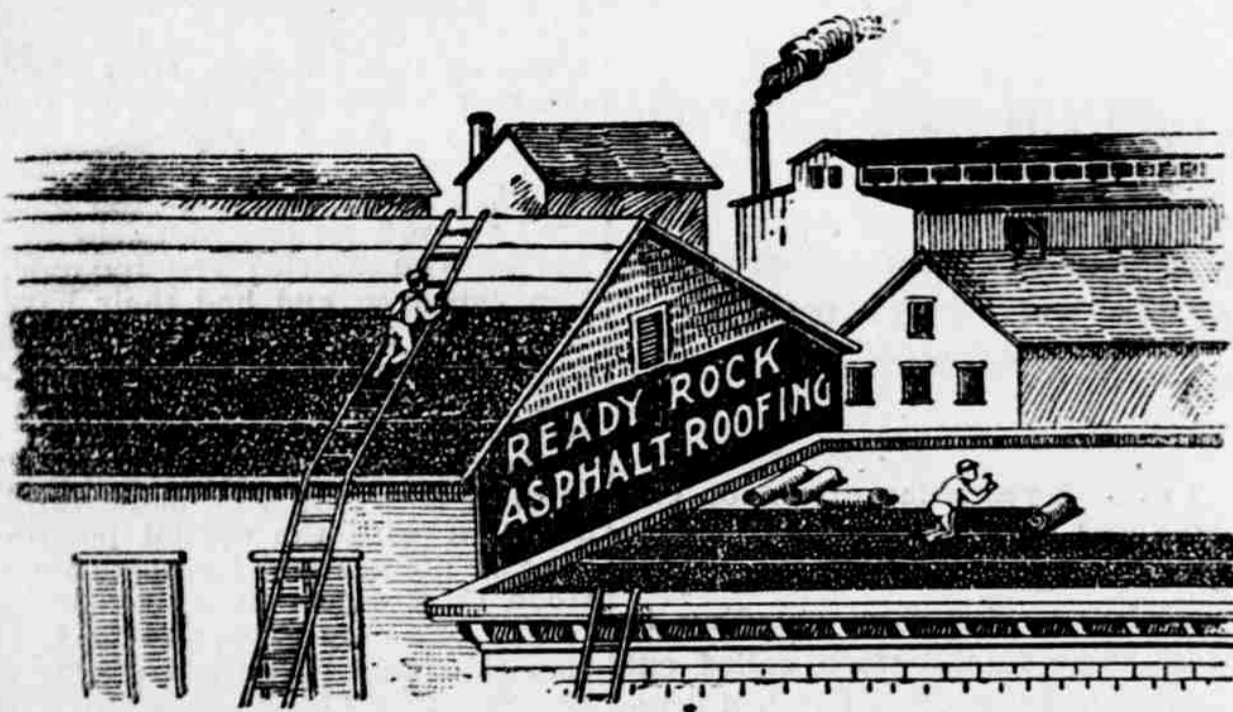

RUMORS CUT OFF NEW KIHEI PUMPS

Denial That President Dole Will Resign or be Removed.

MINISTER COUPER IS AUTHORITY

And Special Agent Sewall Denies That He Has Been Made President of Hawaii.

The rumor fiend is at large in this city again, and taking advantage of President Dole's absence from Hawaii, has circulated a story to the effect that the President of the Hawaiian Republic was to be summarily removed and Special Agent Sewall appointed in his place. This rumor was in circulation yesterday afternoon, and an Advertiser man at once started out with the purpose of running it down. Several parties were found who had heard the story some days previously and others only an hour or two before.

Special Agent Harold M. Sewall was one of the first seen. He said: "This is the second time today that I have been asked about the relations of the United States with the gentlemen at the head of the Hawaiian Government. I had thought that we had succeeded in killing off all these rumor fiends when annexation was accomplished, but it seems not. If you can trace this particular rumor to its fountain head you will oblige me by letting me know the name of the originator. You may state from me that I know absolutely nothing about the matter, and that up to this time I have not even heard it mentioned. I am surprised that such rumors should gain credence."

Attorney General Cooper was seen after his return from Kaneohe yesterday evening, and said:

"You can say that I have never heard of such a story and that the Hawaiian Government knows nothing of it. As far as the Government is concerned there is not an atom of truth in it. President Dole has not resigned and we have never received the slightest intimation that he intends to do so. If he has been removed by President McKinley there is no one at the Executive building who has received any intimation of it. There is nothing in the rumor."

CLAY CLEMENT COMPANY.

In "A Southern Gentleman" at the Opera House Tonight.

This evening at the Opera House Mr. Clement and his splendid company will appear in "A Southern Gentleman" of which the New Orleans States says: "Clay Clement as General Joseph Carroll is possessed of a magnetic attractiveness. First, the brave, dashing and chivalrous young officer of the Confederacy; and then, the courtly, unassuming, warm-hearted and generous Southern Gentleman of the old school, tender and gentle to women, brave and chivalrous to men, were parts carried by Mr. Clement with ease of one who was to the manor born. There is not the slightest still of stiffness about the types of the young and the old Southern manhood, which he portrayed, and when he appeared before the curtain to acknowledge the hearty appreciation accorded him, his manner was the same—the type was inherent in him. One of the chief charms of the play is the excellent balancing of characters, and the foils each afford the other. The sentiment was sweet, pure and good, and for that reason alone is worthy the approval of the playgoing world and the world at large. There is not the slightest indelicacy or anything savoring of it, and, the rest of the characters, taking their cue from that of General Carroll, follow the ideal type and carry it through the play. It is such a play from which but good results, from the seeing of which the heart grows tenderer and less trammelled and brings a sense of quiet and peace and contentment, which is the author and actor's chief triumph, for in this play Mr. Clement's ideals have been high and pure and noble, and he has ideally and nobly presented them."

To be in Operation by Next August.

The Kihei Plantation Company to Adopt the Latest Improvements in Pumping Machinery.

The Kihei Plantation Company have contracted with the Risdon Iron Works of San Francisco for the installation of their new pumping plant for the coming year.

A double compartment shaft will be sunk to a depth of 300 feet and at the bottom of same a large underground chamber will be constructed to receive the new pumping machinery. The boilers will be erected at the surface of the shaft and steam conveyed to the pumps at the bottom.

Short pipe lines on land will be required and it is estimated that the reduced coal consumption on account of the short pipes, will soon pay for the construction of the shaft.

The Risdon Iron Works has guaranteed to have the shaft constructed and this plant in operation by August 1st, 1900.
