## A TRUE SOLDIER

"Fighting Guy" Henry's  
Lifetime Army Record.

Born at a Frontier Post—Callant  
Service in the Civil War and  
Against Indians.

It was particularly fitting that a man like the late Gen. Guy V. Henry, destined to fill such a place in the Nation's history as a soldier should have had as his birthplace an Army post in the very heart of the Western frontier, Fort Smith, Indian Territory, and that his father, Major William Seaton Henry of the Third United States Infantry, should be engaged in a war with the savages at that time, March 9, 1839; and it is also appropriate that a man who was destined to become the Military and Civil Governor of a foreign territory won by the sword should be the grandson of one who was Vice-President of the United States and twice Governor of New York State, Daniel D. Tompkins, and also grandson of a former Secretary of the Navy and Judge of the Supreme Court, Smith Thompson.

Young Henry was fortunate enough to graduate from West Point at the very outbreak of the Civil war. He was assigned as a Second Lieutenant to the First United States Artillery and served with distinction in that regiment until he was made Colonel of the Fortieth Massachusetts Infantry in the fall of 1863. He continued throughout the war with that command, being present at many of the most important battles. At Cold Harbor he had two horses shot under him and received two body wounds, but never left the field until the fight was over and won. In 1870 General Henry was transferred to the cavalry, and during the following twenty years achieved an unequalled record as an Indian fighter.

When the Wounded Knee campaign occurred seven years ago General Henry, then a Major, was stationed at Fort Robinson. General Miles sent to him a dispatch advising him of the perilous and critical situation at Pine Ridge agency. Immediately on receipt of that dispatch Henry mounted the companies of the Ninth Cavalry and rode, without unsaddling, and in twenty-one hours, the distance of 104 miles to Miles' relief. As soon as he arrived Miles made known to him the dangerous position of the Seventh Cavalry at Wounded Knee, and Henry once more mounted his command and galloped off, arriving at Wounded Knee in time for battle. Save for his coming the Seventh Cavalry might have been annihilated, as were Custer and his men.

In the Spanish-American war Henry served with the rank of Major-General. Later he was appointed Governor-General of Porto Rico, which position ill health forced him to resign. As Governor-General he was very popular with the Porto Ricans. It was his custom to stand in the plaza at a certain hour of the day and through an interpreter address the natives on the duties of American citizenship. On Sundays, with Bible in hand, he personally conducted a Sunday-school service in the plaza.

General Henry's left hand was crippled by being frozen in an Indian campaign in North Dakota in 1874. Many honorable scars resulted from hard fought battles. At various times bullets made holes in each cheek, broke down the bridge of his nose and left one eye dull and colorless. But taken with the vigorous personality of the man these disfigurements contributed toward making him an impressive figure in or out of uniform and in any company.

### SACRIFICED THEIR LIVES.

DURBAN (Natal), Oct. 27.—An interesting incident in connection with the Elands Laagte fight is reported here. When the fire of the British guns became too hot eight Boers ran forward out of cover, and, standing together, coolly opened fire at the Imperial Light Horse, with the evident purpose of drawing the latter's fire while their comrades retreated. Seven out of the brave eight were killed. It is alleged that a number of sporting rifles and express bullets were found in the Boer camp at Elands Laagte, which has aroused indignation.

### BRITISH CASUALTIES.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The War Office returns show that the total British casualties since the beginning of hostilities reach 597, eighteen officers having been killed and fifty-five wounded and seventy-six men killed and 435 wounded. There are thirteen unaccounted for. This lot, however, does not include the squadron of the Eighteenth Hussars which went astray near Dundee and the officers of the Dublin Fusiliers.
