TO HEAR MARTHA

Indications are for Another Triumph.

First Appearance Here of Miss Andrews—Much Notable Music—Argument of Opera

Every indication points to a full-capacity house for the opera this evening. The promise of "Martha" and the debut of Miss Nellie Andrews, the grand opera prima donna, have created an interest which is causing a strong demand for seats. The lovers of the higher and more classical melodies should not miss this treat; musical students especially should be on hand, and if they are in possession of scores of the opera it would be advisable to carry them along to the performance and make marginal notes for future reference in the singing of the numbers. This is done quite frequently during the New York opera season and a great deal of benefit is derived. The "Martha" music appeals to all classes. Musical gems abound in richest plenty, amongst which may be mentioned "The Last Rose of Summer," the "Good-Night" quartette, the tenor solo "Martha, Martha," "The Spinning Wheel" quartette, the "Drinking Song," and a number of ensembles that are world-famous. The following is the scenario of the opera.

Lady Harriet wearied of society and the dull monotony of her life, hears the servants singing and laughing on their way to the hilling fair. She decides to join them by way of amusement, so she and her maid and Lord Tristan disguise themselves as peasants and go to the fair. While there Plunkett and Lionel in search of servants, see them and want to engage them,— they laugh at them and question them. Plunkett offers them money to bind the bargain which they accept in fun, whereupon the young men tell them to come with them. They refuse and the sheriff reminds them that having accepted money they are bound to serve for one year. The farmers take them home, try to teach them to spin and tend the house. At last they retire after the men have gone to rest. Lord Tristan comes in a carriage and takes the ladies away. Lionel falls desperately in love with Lady Harriet, who is masquerading as Martha and seeks everywhere for her. He finds her at last in the palace grounds and she pretends not to know him, for fear it would disgrace her when her little escapade be known to the Queen. Lionel, wild with anger and crazed with love, starts to tell all when he is arrested. He loses his reason. Then Plunkett tells Lady Harriet of the ring his father left. This she takes to the Queen, who then knows that Lionel is the son of the Earl of Derby, who was banished but not proved guilty. The Queen restores him to his title and at her request gives him Lady Harriet in marriage. This he will not accept but spurns her as she did him. Then it is that Plunkett advises her to don her peasant dress which she does. All the old love comes back to Lionel when he sees her again as the charming peasant girl. He regains his reason and all ends well.

PROGRESS OF THE CAMPAIGN.

Movements of the Columns of General Young and Colonel Hayes.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—A cable to the Sun from Manila says: Filipino women and children, the wives and families of Filipino officers who accompanied the Spanish Commission that went to see Aguinaldo about the release of prisoners, as far back as Angeles, received permission today to come to Manila.

Six troops of the Fourth Cavalry forded the Rio Grande de la Pampanga today. Four troops under Colonel Hayes moved on Talavera, which is about eight miles north of Cabanatuan, while two troops under Major Parker went northwest to Alaga. The Macabebes are taking part in this movement. General Young has arrived from Santa Rosa.

The gunboat Laguna de Bay remains stuck on the bar below Santa Rosa. Tugs with hawsers are trying to pull her off, but so far have been unsuccessful. The river is very shallow just now, and it will require a heavy rain-storm to float the vessel. Our scouts today captured a casco containing rails and ties used in repairing bridges.

Supplies for troops have been delayed and the houses of Santa Rosa were searched today for food. A quantity of rice and a number of chickens and geese were found, and they were turned over to the commissary department. Supplies are now going forward rapidly. General Bates will sail for Jolo to-day.
