NEWS OF WORLD CONDENSED

Stanford will play football Christmas. SCir Arthur Sullivan left a large estate. Senator Clay of Georgia is opposing the subsidy bill. The contract for the Uganda railroad bridges has gone to America. The debate on the revenue bill opened in the House December 11. Charles Dickens, the new commander of the Oregon, is now in San Francisco. Sir Charles Warren has been nominated commander of the British troops in Canada. Advice from London state that England will probably reject the Nicaragua treaty. A provision has been made for the removal of Blossom Rock from San Francisco bay. Miss Amelia Bahrs, sister of Judge Bahrs of San Francisco, committed suicide December 10. Rev. Father M. Grosso was the victim of American swindlers, by which they profited \$50,000. Lord Roberts, with his wife and daughters, sailed for England December 11, on the Canada. The police report of the Paris exposition shows over 13,000 arrests. The poet, Kipling, has sailed for Cape Town under his doctor's orders. His lungs are said to be failing. General Ian Hamilton will receive a high appointment in the English War Office for his services in Africa. President McKinley has announced that he will visit California in the spring, accompanied by Mrs. McKinley. The Californian Press Association have adopted plans for an excursion to New Orleans in February for the Mardi Gras. Our consular service is to be reorganized, framed on business lines, and politics eliminated if Representative Aldrich's bill goes through. The supplementary estimates put before the House of Commons on the 11th instant, amounted to \$80,000,000 for the British army on account of the Boer war. A veteran of the civil war has become wealthy in his old age through a gold mine he discovered last March. He received on the 11th instant \$100,000 for it. Many children were injured in a wild panic in Chicago through a false cry of fire. Fifteen hundred little tots struggled madly and several may die of their injuries. Lieutenant Colonel Owen, Lieutenant Kirby and Surgeon Johnson have been cashiered by the English War Office as the result of hazing a lieutenant named Steed. Mrs. Garcia of Arizona was frightened to death by supposed danger. She was on a railroad bridge and heard a train whistle. She fainted and never regained consciousness. A watch meeting is to be held on the night of December 31st in 15,000 towns of the United States. The hymn "Old Hundred" to be sung simultaneously at midnight. Under date of December 8 a report from Washington states that the plan for a cable to Tatooish Island has been approved by Secretary Wilson of the Agricultural Department.

LONG VOYAGE ENDS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11.—The French bark Eugenie Frautrel arrived today from Swansea after a voyage of 356 days. The vessel had a most eventful voyage since she started for this port, almost a year ago. Severe storms were encountered in the Atlantic and on March 29 last the bark put into Buenos Ayres with her rudder broken and much damage to the rigging and hull. On April 2 the bark was surveyed and it was found that extended repairs were necessary. This work occupied several months and the Eugenie Frautrel did not resume her voyage until September 19. She put into Montevideo on September 23 and sailed again the same day. The Frautrel is consigned to Balfour, Guthrie & Co. Captain Combine is in command. The Russian barkentine Bering, which visits this port annually, was reported this afternoon bound in from Petropaulovski. The reinsurance on the ship Rath-corn, now out 68 days from Yokohama for Portland, went up from 65 per cent to 70 per cent today.

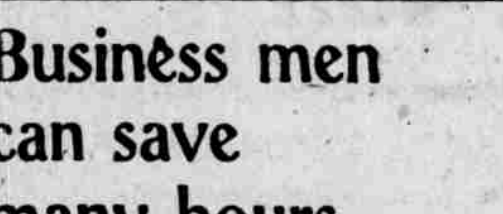
