HEAVY BAIL IN HABEAS CORPUS

Suekishi Tsuji, a Japanese refused admission to the United States at the immigrant station and who has sued out a writ of habeas corpus, had his bail fixed at \$2000 by U. S. Judge Clemons this morning. J. Lightfoot as his counsel asked that his bail be \$500, the same as the Department of Commerce and Labor allows on appeals from commissions of inquiry in cases of rejection of immigrants. District Attorney Breckons opposed the granting of any bail, but after argument the heavy bail mentioned was allowed.

KIDNAPING

Luey Chang and her husband, Ching Yang, were arrested this morning on a charge of kidnaping Martha Kealoha, an Hawaiian girl seventeen years old. They are alleged to have frightened the girl into going to Hawaii, there to marry another Chinaman. After living with her husband for a week the girl escaped to Honolulu and put her case in the hands of Lorrin Andrews.

NEW SUITS FILED

Kipahulu Sugar Company has brought suit to foreclose mortgage against Jona Kanae Nakila upon a piece of land containing fifty-three acres at Kipahulu, Maui, to secure a note for \$250 to A. N. Campbell, trustee.

Lahela Robertson and Hugh Robertson, a minor, bring suit against Lum Shee, alias Chung Lum, Annie Sing Yek and Samuel M. Damon and A. W. T. Bottomley, partners in Bishop & Co., to quiet title in a piece of land at Beretania street and Achi lane, Honolulu, which is alleged to belong to Hugh by inheritance from his paternal grandfather, Lai Say, deceased, the

THREE SENTENCES ON ONE MAN

Lee Yum Kwai, serving a six months' sentence for importing opium and with a charge of perjury in that case hovering over him, appeared with A. S. Humphreys as his counsel before Judge Clemons this morning and pleaded guilty to two other indictments for the same offense. After protracted discussion between the court and District Attorney Breckons and Mr. Humphreys, the court sentenced the defendant to imprisonment for fifteen days in each case, with payment of costs, each sentence to begin at the end of the preceding one. Lee Yum Kwai is one of the principals in an opium smuggling scheme of considerable extent.

DIVORCE CASES.

Judge Robinson granted a divorce to Lily Notley Heen against William H. Heen for non-support, giving her the custody of two minor children.

Deborah Kane sues Joseph Kane for divorce on the ground of excessive ill-treatment, the details of which are calling her vile names, threatening to kill her and violently abusing her.

DISTRICT COURT REVERSED.

Judge Whitney has granted judgment as prayed for in the suit of the M. V. Holmes estate against Manuel N. De Mello, with City and County Auditor Bicknell as garnishee, for \$113 balance on a merchandise bill. Plaintiff appealed from a nonsuit granted by former District Magistrate Lymer.

JOHN S. HARVEY, an attaché of the office of Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh, is at the Palace. Harvey makes the interesting statement that the Territory of Hawaii ranks thirteenth in the collection of customs. It is exceeded only by California, New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Florida, Louisiana, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Missouri and Washington. Last year Hawaii paid into the national treasury in duties and taxes \$1,772,869. Since the islands have been annexed to this country they have paid in customs duties alone nearly \$15,000,000. This is practically as much as the state of Washington has paid into the national treasury.—Examiner.

PRINCESS DAVID KAWANAKOHA has written that she is recuperating nicely from the operation she recently underwent, and according to present plans, she and her sister, Miss Beatrice Campbell, will be in San Francisco either the end of July or the first week in August. One of the reasons that impelled Princess David to accept the royal invitation to be present at the coronation was that she would also avail herself of the opportunity of the trip to employ the services of the noted specialists to perform the delicate operation on her knee. It was originally her plan to go to Heidelberg, the seat of the most famous surgical institution in the world, but instead she had the surgeons come to London.—Examiner.
