## SALVATION MEN CONFERENCE

Officers of Army  
Discuss Many  
Methods.

The largest attended conference in the annals of the Army in the Hawaiian Islands met today in the reception room of the Women's Home. There were two sessions, the morning one commencing at 10 o'clock and the afternoon at 2 o'clock. Major Wood called the meeting to order and after short devotional exercises introduced Colonel French, who proceeded to lay down the plans or lines upon which the conference would run, and these lines were: first, information; second, inspiration. It was not altogether as a legislative body that they were met, for laws were already made; the thing sought was how to better carry them out, how to direct efforts to better advantage. Each person present should endeavor to both receive and give information that would be mutually beneficial for the advancement of the war; and then he believed that this would be a means of inspiration to all.

Major Wood was called upon to report upon the year's progress. He pointed out for the encouragement of those present the advances which had been made. There had been increases on almost every line; the membership had gone up; the number of workers augmented; circulation of literature doubled, while the attendance at the Sunday schools had been more than trebled. The credit for all this he gave to the workers present, who by their self-denying, hard labor had made such a report possible.

Colonel French then took up several points of the Major's report, congratulating the command upon the progress made; he assured them of the great interest which was being taken in the work here by those in authority upon the Mainland. He very judiciously touched upon the matter of the health of the worker, pointing out the great necessity for as far as possible conserving the strength, and while between wearing out and rusting out he would always choose the former, he urged that every proper care of the health should be taken.

The conference adjourned at noon for luncheon; reassembling again at 2 p. m., it continued sitting until 4:30 p. m. The subject under discussion was that of the Sunday schools and Young People's work. In a very exhaustive address lasting an hour and a half Col. French dealt very thoroughly with this department. Asking the question, "What is the Junior work?" he replied by sketching its four sections. First, the company meeting where Bible truths are taught; second, the salvation meeting where these truths are applied to the child's every-day life; third, the Band of Love, taking in drills, games, trade schools, gymnastics, to meet the social and physical side; and fourth, the Corps Cadet Brigade for handling the children between the ages of 12 and 18. Secondly, he dealt with "Why it should be done," and lastly "How to successfully engage in it." In the course of his very able talk he pointed out that statistics proved that the majority of Christians were converted in early life and that after the age of 25 or 30 the chances became very slim of persons turning to God. An ounce of prevention was worth a pound of cure, and the best method to deal with the stream of drunkenness and sin was to go to the fountain head and save the children. A general discussion of the subject in which the majority of those present took part closed this session.

In the evening the Army divided its forces and held two street meetings—one held forth over in Palama, where a Maui delegate, Mr. Kiyota, gave a good talk in Japanese; the other open air was at the usual stand. Quite a number of men from the U. S. S. Petrel and the transport Thomas were present in the inside meeting. After the usual testimonies Col. French preached from the text, "Look unto me and be ye saved all ye ends of the earth." Two more sessions of the conference will be held today. At night a "Musical Cyclone" will be upon the boards.

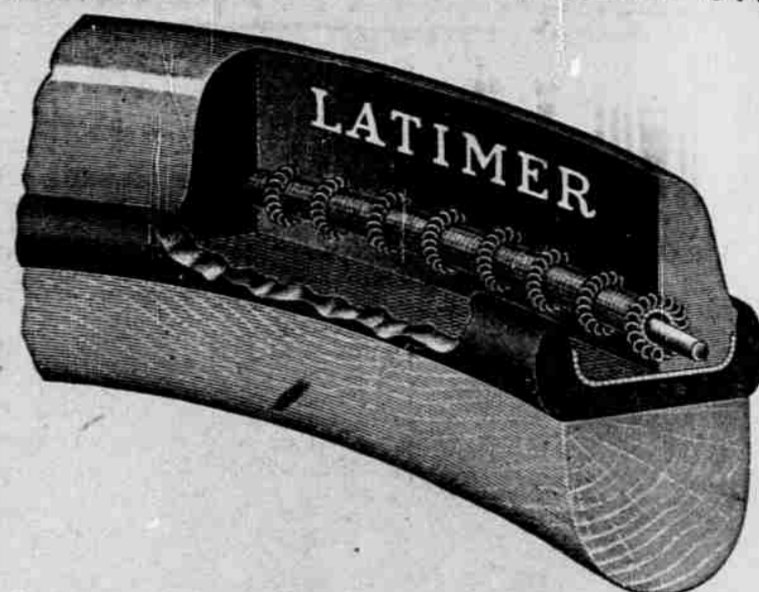
