Mr. Irvin, a well known San Francisco illustrator, came down on the Alameda to take Mr. Yardley's place on the Advertiser. Mr. Yardley will return to the coast and then go east to study in a school of drawing and painting.

The Hawaiian Mission Children's Society will hold their annual meeting for hearing reports and for other business in the home of Mrs. J. B. Atherton, commencing at 7:30 this evening, May 16th. Members are earnestly requested to attend.

Judge Gilbert F. Little returned on the Alameda without his alias. The Judge is feeling as well as could be expected and has plenty of explanations for his mishap on the Governorship. He will return to Hilo on the next Kinau and reopen court.

Fifteen thousand bags of sugar stored at Keala warehouse on Makee plantation tumbled down Tuesday night, carrying along a portion of the building. The damage was not great and the sugar was replaced in the warehouse before it was affected by the exposure.

French Consul Vizgavona has a Martinique boy in his employ as cook, who came from St. Pierre, just destroyed by lava. Maru, the boy, told the consul that many years ago an aged negro appeared in the streets and proclaimed that the city would be destroyed by a volcanic eruption.

K. Imal, the Japanese sugar expert who is studying the methods in use at the Ewa Plantation, has received word that seed cane sent by him from Honolulu to Formosa was received in good order. Imal will make a tour of Maui and Kauai before his return to Formosa, and will remain in the Islands for a year.

The United States Experiment Station has been investigating the commercial possibilities of kukui oil. It was thought that the oil was of value to artists, but an inquiry to a prominent London firm dealing in artists' supplies brought the information yesterday that the oil had been experimented with and found to be of no value for that purpose.

Commissioner Wray Taylor has an exhibition at his office in the capitol building some of the finest rhubarb ever seen in the islands. It was grown on the Long farm at Waimea, and is over an inch thick and of much better quality than is usually shipped here from the coast. It is reported that arrangements are being made for the shipment of home grown products to Honolulu from both Waimea, Kauai and the Buchholtz place at Kona, Hawaii.

The Honolulu Engineering Association will meet on Monday, May 19th, at its rooms in the Y. M. C. A. building. Owing to the unavoidable absence of those who were to speak on the subject of indicator cards, that subject has been put over to June 2nd. This special meeting then will be marked by the beginning of the series of talks on the electrical matters, Mr. A. Garity being the first speaker. There will be as well discussion of points raised in the question box.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—Miss A. L. Fitzgerald, who has been the matron of the California State insane asylum at Agnews for the past three years, will take the superintendency of a hospital at Hilo. She will leave shortly for Hilo. Agnews is one of the biggest asylums in the country and has been the cause and scene of much political squabbling.

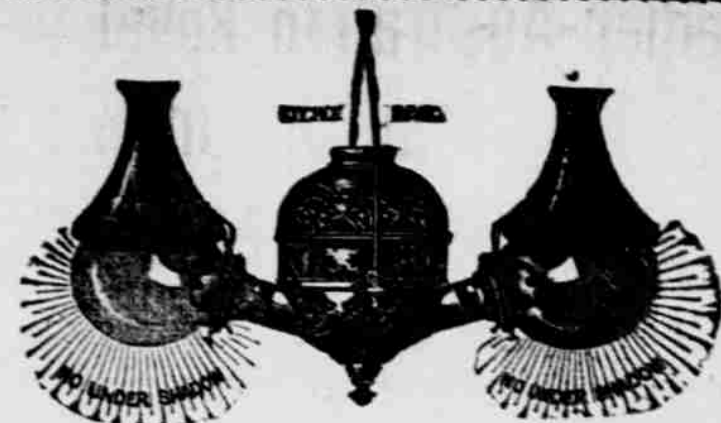
