STEADILY THE HORSES ARE PREPARING FOR RACE DAY

Horsemen Want Entries to Close Now---Why Not a Trotting Race?---Runners Are Being Let Down.

The most notable work at the track on Thursday morning was done by Lewis' green trotter Oak Grove, "Dutch Dave," whose given name is Charles David, was scoring with the animal when a shaft of the sulky broke and the driver was thrown out.

The animal ran away and circled the track at a high rate of speed, three times, before he came to a standstill. The sulky, of course, was almost irreparably damaged, but beyond a severe chafe behind, the horse was apparently unharmed, although he will feel the effects of his mad gallop for several days to come.

Oak Grove was until recently trained and driven by Alice Harris, whose leg was broken by a kick of a horse this week.

On Wednesday morning the best work of at least two of the harness division was done after the usual morning audience had driven homeward. Steamplough, working with Billy Lemps, put in a heat in 2:25 and Duchess went a couple of miles in 2:37½ and 2:36.

On Thursday morning bright and early several of the runners were at work. Burns tried Del Vista and Nulrah together at six furlongs, the sordid mare conceding the latter several pounds. It was a smashing good trial and was won handily by Nulrah, which is a mere pony but as shapely a piece of horseflesh as ever looked through a bridle. The time was 1:17½.

After the mares had worked, General Cronje was sent a mile in 1:47, finishing strong. With Weller, Socialist, Carter H. Harrison, Jr., and General Cronje in the Rosita challenge cup race, the event should be one of the most memorable in the history of the track record for a mile being out.

George Thomas gave Carter H. Harrison, Jr., a stiff six furlongs on Thursday in 1:18½.

Yesterday the runners did only easy work, Time Center and Socialist being given swimming exercise.

Albert M. and Tom King's Creohmare worked several slow heats yesterday.

Cyclone was jogged on the track but he was very lame and said good morning to everyone he met. The black pacer hit a foreleg about a month ago while at work and developed a spread tendon. The leg was fixed but the trouble seems to have grown worse instead of better and Quinn's horse may be marked down as a doubtful starter.

VETERANS LACKING

Healani Oarsmen Must Take a Brace.

KLEBAHN STROKE AGAIN ADOPTED

New English Shell Will Arrive About the Middle of June.

A. McDuffy would almost certainly make one of the crews if he would only get out and practice, but, like all large, powerful men, he is awkward and clumsy and needs a lot of work to get him into shape.

Harry Cobb and S. F. Chillingworth are two other men of good promise, who cannot expect to reach senior form unless they get in and work hard every night.

The new English shell will reach San Francisco early in June on the S. S. American, and will be reshipped from there on the S. S. Sierra or the City of Pekin, reaching Honolulu on the 17th or 18th of the same month, some three weeks before the race.

From watching the Healani crews in the water it is evident that it is the intention of the management to stick to the long swinging Klebahn stroke, and in this decision one cannot but commend their wise choice, as three championships out of four speak pretty well for the present system.

The crews as mentioned above are not settled upon at all, as the regular Senior and Junior crews, and unless some of the old men take a decided brace in their form they will probably be supplanted by others. Casper Whitney's remarks in the last issue of Outing, under the head of "Inter-collegiate Baseball Outlook," as to his doubts concerning veterans of any description, apply particularly well to the Healani crews at present. They will have much harder races to row this year than last, and from present indications will not be in as good shape to row them, simply because a few members do not turn out regularly.
