DIAMOND HEADS FAST

Show Ball Qualities at Winter League's Opening.

A very satisfactory crowd attended the opening of the Winter Baseball League games at the senior league's ground yesterday afternoon, close on 400 being present. It was the same collection of fans that sweltered in the sun at Kapiolani Park last season and they seemed to greatly enjoy the change for the better.

The play was interesting if not particularly brilliant and the games went through with a snap which would be welcome at some of the exhibitions of the big league.

The games resulted in the Twilights defeating the Lusitanas, 13 to 9, and the Diamond Heads beating the Alohas, 16 to 5.

The nines looked very neat in their new suits. The colors of the Lusitanas are blue and white; the Twilights, gray and crimson; the Diamond Heads, maroon; and the Alohas, red.

Pat Gleason umpired and Nigel Jackson kept tally. It is probable that both men will fill these positions throughout the season and it would be hard to make an improvement in either case.

A glance at the nines will show that there has been something akin to a resurrection among the old-time players. All the mummies seem to have come out of their coffins and, in the majority of cases yesterday, the revivalists made distinctly good.

The Diamond Heads uncovered a strong nine which will want a lot of beating. Their team work is admirable and they play a hit-and-run game which is bound to keep the score accumulating. There are several eleven-second men in the line-up and the result is surprisingly fast work.

The Alohas, Twilights and Lusitanas appear to be very equally matched. How the Metropolitan stack up in this respect, next Sunday will reveal.

The Lusitanas-Twilights game was called first and the boys were cheered as they went on the diamond.

The Lusitanas did nothing in their first two attempts, whereas their opponents netted a single each time. An error by Martin let Nascimento in, and good stick work by Honan was responsible for the second run made by the Twilights, Honan scoring on a rap by Kuhlina, gingerly handled by Martin.

In the first of the third, M. R. Freitas three-bagged into right field. He scored on a wild throw to third and Madeiros followed him home.

Twilights came right back with a triple scoring. The fourth innings was drawn blank.

The next two innings produced two runs for each and in the seventh no less than ten fat ones were rung up. Twilights getting two the better of the deal.

The Lusitanas managed to fill the bases and when Peter Rodrigues came in he had lots of company, and only one hand gone. The big player got one that he liked and slammed it far over right for three stations. It was a timely hit and deservedly applauded. H. Rodrigues came in and with a nice hit to left scored Namesake Pete, making four runs this go and tying the score.

The dim, religious Twilights came to bat, determined to do or die—and they did, to the tune of six runs, winning the game right there. Pitcher Pete was very emphatically found in this spasm.

There were not so many hits but errors were plentiful. It was the first game of the season, however, and the players were unused to the ground, so let it go at that, and here's hoping it won't occur again.
