The Waialuku Bank.

Mr. W. H. Field has resigned the management of the Maui Hotel, and Mr. A. T. Hagancamp has been appointed to succeed him.

Mrs. C. H. Dickey and her daughter, Mrs. Harry Waterhouse, arrived on the "Claudine", and will spend a few months at Haiku.

A fire on Tuesday afternoon burned over about 30 acres of ripe cane at the Paia Plantation. The cane is being milled at once and the loss will be nominal.

Wm. Chauncey Wilder, who was stricken with apoplexy in Honolulu on Tuesday, died on Thursday evening at eight o'clock, and was buried yesterday afternoon at three o'clock.

Captain Wm. Keanu has been appointed captain of police at Lahaina to succeed Captain Moke Kauhaaha. Captain Keanu is a steady, upright young man and will doubtless give satisfaction.

Joseph Kowan, a Gallician boy about eight years old instantly killed at Camp 5, Spreckelsville, last Friday, by falling from a cane car which he was trying to board when in motion. He fell backward breaking his neck.

Several of the young men at Spreckelsville have secured the services of a wonderful Japanese juggler, and they will give a show in the Spreckelsville Hall this evening. Aside from this, there will be a One Act farce entitled "How Tim Flaherty Learned to Box." Admission 25 cents.

Attorney N. W. Aluli, son of the late John T. Aluli, has just graduated from the law department of the Ann Arbor University, and has located in Waialuku as a law partner of his uncle, Judge A. N. Kepoikai. He may possibly return to Ann Arbor for a post graduate course in September.

Yesterday afternoon a horse hitched to a brake in the yard at Judge Kepoikai's upset the brake and ran away. Officer Paresa and John do Rego followed the animal on horseback, and Officer Paresa's horse fell, throwing the rider, but doing no damage. John do Rego's horse also stumbled and fell, throwing his rider down the stone embankment on the Mill road and injuring him seriously about the head and shoulders, but not fatally.

Aloha Lodge, No. 3, of Waialuku has secured a 20 years' lease at a nominal rental from W. J. Lowrie of Spreckelsville, of a lot 100 ft. front by 75 ft. deep on Mill street, near the Waialuku depot, and will at once proceed to erect a lodge building at a cost of about \$3,000. The building will be two stories, the upper floor of which will be used for the lodge rooms, and the lower portion will be for rent. Aloha lodge is in a prosperous condition and is constantly increasing its membership.

Mr. Charles D. Lufkin returned from Honolulu on Wednesday's Claudine and expresses himself as much pleased with the outlook for the early establishment of a bank at Waialuku. It was his intention at first to establish a private bank, but after looking over the situation fully, he has arrived at the conclusion that it would be better to regularly incorporate a bank under the laws of the Territory. Consequently the bank will incorporate with a capital stock of \$200,000, on which 50 per cent must be paid, making the capital \$100,000 cash. This will probably be more than the bank will need at once, so that a considerable portion of the cash will be invested in 6 per cent bonds until needed in the business of the bank, and no further assessment will be called.

Among his heavy backers in Honolulu are Hon. H. P. Baldwin, Charles M. Cooke and Cecil Brown who are ready to take up at least half of the stock, if necessary. It is Mr. Lufkin's intention, however to place as much of the stock as possible on Maui, in small holdings of five to ten shares each, and since his arrival he has secured a number of subscriptions in Waialuku, ranging from \$500 to \$1000.

Mr. Lufkin states that it really is up to the people of Maui to establish the bank, for if they do not feel sufficient interest in the enterprise to subscribe liberally, it will have a tendency to discourage him in the undertaking.

There is no question but what there is a large banking business waiting on Maui to be developed, and Mr. Lufkin is the right man for the enterprise, because he is not only active and energetic, but he also has large experience in the business and is a man of sterling integrity, with such men as Cecil Brown and C. M. Cooke at his back.

There is no safer investment than that of bank stock, and while fabulous interest cannot be promised, still the stock of a bank in Waialuku should easily pay 10 percent per year and over. This is a safe investment, and as there is plenty of money on Maui, there is no reasonable doubt but that Mr. Lufkin will succeed in securing all needed subscriptions. As soon as the stock is subscribed, the enterprise will at once be put under way, and the people of Waialuku and Maui are to be congratulated on the bright prospects ahead of them for an early installation of a bank at Waialuku.

Polo at Makawao.

A very interesting event is on the cards for next Friday afternoon, July 19, it being the first championship game of polo to be played on Maui under the auspices of the Hawaiian Polo Association.

The game will be played on the grounds of the Maui Polo Club near Maunaloa Seminary and will doubtless be a "hot" game. The Maui Club recently went to Honolulu and lost a game to the Oahu Club, but hope for better results on their native health.

The teams will probably line up about as follows:

Maui Club: F. E. Baldwin, George Bailey, David Fleming, Harry Copp, Sam Kulama. Club colors, Black & Orange.

Oahu Club: Charles Judd, Ed. Damon, "Kauka" Judd, Henry Damon. Club colors, Blue & White.

The ponies for the Oahu Club came over on Wednesday's Claudine, and are being housed and exercised at the Maui Club. A cosy club house has recently been erected at the grounds, thanks to the kindly generosity of Hon. H. P. Baldwin, and on next Friday afternoon, the ladies will serve refreshments during game, at the club house.

Visitors from Waialuku, Kahului and Spreckelsville can visit the game by going up on the 1.30 train to Paia where carriages can be procured. The game will not be concluded in time to catch the 4.30 return train, but a special train will be provided to bring the visitors from Paia later in the afternoon. A cordial invitation to the general public is extended by the Maui Club.

Death of Mrs. John M. Horner.

News was received at Lahaina on Sunday of the death of Mrs. John M. Horner on Sunday evening, at her home on Rancho Hamakua, Hawaii. She had been received of her illness, but her immediate death was somewhat unexpected.

NEW LAHAINA.

Lahaina, sleepy but beautiful Lahaina, has at length waked up, and is developing into a bright, bustling little American town. Rich in natural advantages, it is singular that it had not begun to develop before it did. In the last year, a number of shanties have been torn down and replaced with large handsome business blocks on the main street. All the stores are occupied, and all seem to be doing a good business.

The deep hole in front of the business portion of the town is being filled up, and will be occupied by a large two story store built expressly for the Plantation. A large hotel and a newspaper are being talked of. The former is really needed, the only difficulty being to secure a suitable site. However, when the right man comes along with money in his pocket and offers to build his own hotel without calling on a stock company to put up funds for him, it will not be very difficult to find a lovely site on the beach near the business portion of the town. The same is true of a newspaper. It is evident that a stock company paper would not be a paying investment but by and by, when the time is ripe, a man with money of his own will come along and start a paying little paper in Lahaina.

The people of Lahaina have a strong Aloha for their town, and insist that it should be the metropolis of the Island. It is to be regretted that the proposition of water works for Lahaina was not pushed to completion when the matter was taken in hand last summer. There will be a quiet fight however between the plantation and the people before water is brought into the town.

They are a kindly and hospitable folk at the city under the palms, and after spending a day or so with them, it is with a feeling of sadness that one bids them farewell and turns his face toward the county seat.

Japanese Suicide.

A Japanese by the name of Sentara Nisida committed suicide in the Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Company's mill early Sunday morning by tying a handkerchief around his neck and strangling himself to death.

He was a cook on board the British ship "Ant" "ge" now in the Kahului Harbor, but had run away. Early Sunday morning he came in the Post office and stated that the tossing of the ship made him sick, and that he did not want to return. He said he was afraid he would be arrested and taken aboard again.

A High Jumper.

Eugene McCann of Lahaina, who recently distinguished himself as a pupil of St. Louis College, is something of an athlete, having brought home a gold medal for having won the championship at pole vaulting, having broken the college record and scored 9 ft. 7 in. Eugene will take one year's post graduate course at St. Louis, during which time he hopes to capture the Island record for pole vaulting, after which he will matriculate at Berkeley and look after the world's record.

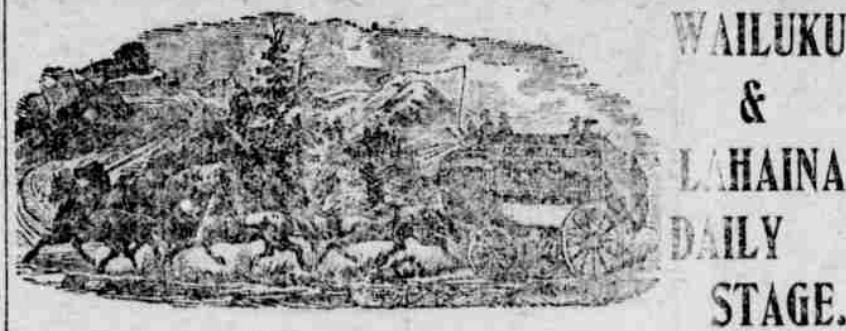
