

## Hana News.

The schooner Muriel arrived from Honoipua Friday noon, with a cargo of general merchandise for the plantation and the stores of the village. She will take on a cargo of sugar, leaving on Saturday, the 18th inst, for San Francisco. This finishes the Kaeleku Sugar Co's sugar crop of 1911. 4850 tons more or less.

Mr. Jorgensen, the man who built the Koolau ditch and its numerous trails, is once more in the District of Hana, possibly contemplating a scheme of building a ditch from Hana to Kaupo, and supplying water to that extreme part of Maui to further small farming and the fluming of chord wood from the mountains to the beach, where it will be taken by steamers to Honolulu and way ports.

Tapping has been going on for some time during the past few months, and a lot of the boys on the plantation have become quite expert with the collecting of the latex. Quite a number of the lads have collected as high as 5 lbs. of dry rubber before school time in the morning, this goes to show that it is one of the coming industries of the Islands, and the stockholders, it is to be hoped, will soon have the pleasure of enjoying an occasional dividend.
