Department Of Education Will Rush Work On New Structure With A View To Having It Completed By The Opening Of The Next School Year.

TEACHERS ASSIGNED--PEACE DAY--BIGGER GROUNDS

Together with the Superintendent of Public Works, Mr. Pope will get busy with plans and specifications as noted in the loan bill which provides among others, a new school building for Hanapepe, the same to be completed by the opening of the fall term.

THE MONTHLY SESSION

"Follow The Law!" Advises County Att'y. Kaeo In Speaking On Appropriations

APPROPRIATIONS MADE

Hanalei Asks For Homestead Road—Big Appropriations For Road Laborers.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Kauai, T. H., was held at the office of the Board in Lihue, on Wednesday, May 3rd, 1911, at 10:30 o'clock a. m.

Present: H. D. Wishard, chairman, W. D. McBryde, Francis Gay, Joe Rodrigues, J. K. Lota.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The chairman stated for the information of the Board that by Act 72 of the Session Laws of 1911, and from the legal Opinion of County Attorney Kaeo touching the same, the Board is now unable to spend any of the public moneys for the public work etc. of this County, without first appropriating moneys for such expenditures, and advised the Board to follow the law and the advise of the County Attorney.

A general discussion over the various items for which appropriation may be made was had until 12:30 o'clock p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

At 2:30 o'clock p. m., the Board again resumed its meeting.

Supervisor Mc Breyde offered a Resolution (Resolution 1, - P) for the appropriation of the sum of \$34,945.00, as follows:—

RESOLUTION

Making Appropriations for the various Services of the County of Kauai, Territory of Hawaii.

Be it resolved by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Kauai, Territory of Hawaii, that the following sums amounting to Thirty Four Thousand Nine Hundred And Forty Five Dollars (\$34,945) are hereby appropriated to be paid out of moneys in the General Fund of the Treasury of the County of Kauai, Territory of Hawaii, for Salaries fixed by law and other Salaries, wages of labor, maintenance of jails, prisoners, schools, and general expenses of the said County of Kauai for the period beginning with the First day of January, 1911, and ending with the Thirtieth day of June, 1911, said
