The meeting according to the statement of the chair, was called for the purpose of passing upon certain demands, including Pay Rolls from Koloa for May, 1911, which were not received by the Board at its last regular monthly business meeting.  
The Board after having examined the demands presented, approved them to be paid out of the General Fund, chargeable to the following Appropriations, as follows:

Macadamizing, Koloa 777.85  
Oiling Roads, Koloa 10.00  
Roads & Bridges, Koloa 38.50  
Total \$ 851.35  
There not being any further business, the meeting upon motion of Supervisor McBryde seconded by Supervisor Loti, was adjourned, but subject to the call of the chair.

## LOCAL MAN MAKES AN AVIATION RECORD

### Series of Accidents At A Certain Point Sunday

WAHIAWA, June 18.—A motorcycle, a bicycle and a frightened horse, figured in three accidents at the foot of the hill here this afternoon, each occurring within half an hour of each other but being in no way connected.  
About four this afternoon, a Japanese was observed to apparently lose control of a bike which he was riding, and to dash down the hill at a terrific speed. He brought up near the foot of the hill with such a suddenness as to put his machine completely out of commission, and to send him sprawling. The rider was painfully bruised and considerably scratched.  
The second accident occurred shortly after, when Harold Morgan, teller of the Bank at Lihue, while attempting to ascend a hill in hopes of getting up speed for a climb up the next grade, felt something suddenly go wrong with his gearing and before he could apply the brake, he was given his first lesson in aviation. Not being able to choose his falling position, he landed simply "all over the road." He was not seriously injured but the motorcycle was damaged to such an extent as to cause him to order a car from Waimea to take him to Lihue. The drive chain jumping and becoming caught in the gearing was responsible for the accident.  
The third accident happened shortly after when a horse attached to a vegetable wagon being driven by a Filipino came tearing down the hill. There were three men in the wagon all of whom were too badly frightened to jump. On reaching the foot of the hill, the wagon took a swerve and went over the embankment, spilling the occupants in every direction. One man received serious injury, the two others being more frightened than hurt. The wagon was wrecked, while the horse was painfully bruised and considerably cut.

## PROMINENT CHURCH WORKER HERE AGAIN

### Writes An Interesting Letter On Work On Kauai

Lihue, Kauai, June 17, 1911.  
EDITOR GARDEN ISLAND  
Dear Sir:  
Twenty-one years ago next month I spent a few days on Kauai just before my removal from Hawaii nei. You ask me to give you some impressions of the island as I see it today as compared with my former visit. My first impression is of your splendid roads. Your enterprise in grading and macadamizing, what might be called your belt-line public highway, is to be highly commended. At the time of my first visit I traveled entirely on horseback, while now, by the kindness of my friend, Mr. W. H. Rice, Sr., I am carried everywhere in his beautiful motor car. Where I spent a day twenty-one years ago between points, he carries me in two or three hours. The auto had not arrived then, now it possesses the land. Another striking change is the extension of the cane fields. It is simply wonderful what has been done in this direction. At my first visit I was greatly interested in going over the mill at Kealia and studying the diffusion process there in use. I have often spoken of it. I return to find that it has been rejected and everywhere the maceration process is being used. In other words your up-to-dateness in these things is in striking evidence everywhere.
