GARDEN ISLAND PLEASURE TRIPS

A communication has been received by this office from Alexander Hume Ford of the Public Service Association, telling of the association's plans for the Inter-island excursion which includes a trip from Honolulu to one port on each island for the sum of \$25, the first class accommodations.

Excellent guides for mountaining and other inland trips will accompany these excursions, will add greatly to the pleasures of the trip.

In referring to the Kauai trip Mr. Ford says: "I wish we could get the Kauai people together to prepare a series of Kauai trips, with places to spend the night at and get food. Tourists do not ask for anything for nothing—simply fair rates. If tickets for a series of around and across Kauai auto tickets could be sold here in connection with the twenty-five dollar cruise ticket, it would be a good thing."

Mr. Dienert being possessed with a letter from the secretary of the Maui aggregation, it would seem that the above scores have an official ring.

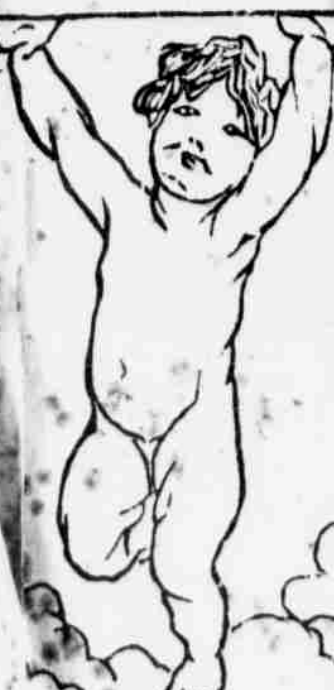
