Now as to the treatment of immigrants upon their arrival at Honolulu. The Chronicle of October 15th says (and it has obtained all its information from the anonymous or disreputable parties whom it has hunted down): "They (the immigrants) are driven from the ship at 'Honolulu in droves, precisely as the cattle 'landed at Hunter's Point are driven to the 'stables in Butcher Town; and again like 'cattle, all enclosed in a pen until they can 'be numbered and sent to their owners.'"

Perhaps the Chronicle might have suggested conducting the immigrants singly to one of the hotels, or recommended turning them loose, strangers in a strange land, to provide for themselves. The voluntary immigrants who arrive at Castle Garden, New York City, are penned, for the time being, the coolies who arrive in San Francisco, are penned for the time being, and subjected to a rigid personal examination, which is always humiliating, and sometimes brutal.

Why not look near home for a sensation. We can imagine the startling headlines greeting the astonished eyes of its readers some fine morning: "Horrible Treatment of Christians at the hands of Brutal Monopolists." "Men Women and Children locked in pens." "Driven in droves like cattle on to boats, and compelled to stand in railway carriages." "Inefficient accommodations." "Thousands of lives in peril." "And all for the greed of gold!"

There would be as much reason in the one incendiary, clap-net, newspaper hullabaloo as in the other. The best people in the land are there pained with the worst, and in pens that are by no means inviting. They are locked in and detained until the boat arrives and then there is a rush and a tumult, such as would not flatter the cattle that arrive at Hunter's Point and depart thence to the stables of Butcher Town.

We have neither space nor patience to pursue the subject this week, but we hope to return to it and trust that in the end, calm reason, coupled with cold facts and figures will prove that if there is anything rotten in Denmark, our men go to the Chronicle office to inhale the effluvia.
