H. F. E. Whalley, performed the ceremony. Appropriate music was sung by the choir boys of Iolani College and played on the organ by Mr. Wray Taylor. The newly married couple, with other guests, were afterwards entertained at breakfast by Mr. and Mrs. T. R. Walker.

GONE HOME.
Rev. W. H. Barnes and bride departed for their home in Lahaina, by the steamer W. G. Hall this morning. The Bishop of Honolulu and Mrs. Willis, Mr. C. M. White, Mr. Churchill and a number of the English clergy were on the wharf to bid aloha to the bridal couple. The bride wore a plain traveling costume of dark gray material, with pretty garlands of flowers hanging becomingly about her neck.

TO-MORROW NIGHT'S PERFORMANCE.

THE ANGLICAN DIOCESAN SYNOD.
The Anglican Diocesan Synod opened the third day of its session yesterday. The following motion, proposed by the Rev. Alexander Mackintosh and seconded by Mr. T. R. Walker, carried: That all past actions of the Board of Trustees since the election of new members be and hereby are ratified and confirmed.

Mr. Walker moved that the following clause be added to the Constitution and numbered 33: On the application at any time of the majority of the clerical and a majority of the lay members of the Synod the Bishop shall forthwith by citation convene a session of the Synod to be held within four months of the date of citation. Agreed to.
Notice was given by the Rev. George Wallace to amend Article 15 of the Constitution.
The thanks of the Synod were presented to the clerical and lay secretaries for the way in which they had performed their labors during the session.
The Synod then adjourned subject to call.

Y. M. C. A. ANNUAL MEETING.
The annual meeting of the Y. M. C. A. was held in the Association parlors last evening, President W. A. Bowen in the Chair.
The monthly reports of the various committees showed a healthy growth in the several departments of work. The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$20.36 in the treasury, with no unpaid bills.
The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Mr. F. J. Lowry, President; Mr. T. R. Walker, Vice-President; Mr. R. W. Podmore, Recording Secretary; Mr. E. O. White, Treasurer; Messrs. W. O. Smith and T. G. Thrum, Directors.
Three new members were received. The collection taken amounted to \$14.50. The meeting adjourned to meet Thursday evening, April 28th, for the annual social, when the retiring president will deliver his address, and the annual reports of committees will be read, closing up with the proverbial ice cream and cake, to which all friends of the institution are cordially invited.

A novel sort of protective duty is being advocated in England, and it is stated that it may possibly be adopted. It is proposed to impose a tax of £5 a year upon all foreigners working in England. The Madras Case.

SUPREME COURT—APRIL TERM, 1887.
JUSTICE McCULLY, PRESIDING.
BEFORE A JURY.

John Chapman vs. the Hawaiian Government. Messrs. Dole and Thurston for plaintiff. Mr. Austin Whiting and Deputy Attorney-General Peterson for defendant.
In this case the owners of the British steamship Madras lay claim to the sum of \$35,150.39 for trespass, the particulars of which are fully set forth in the following declaration:—
DECLARATION.

Supreme Court of the Hawaiian Islands, April term, 1886. Trespass. John Chapman, Mountjoy Pearce, Jos. Morgan, Henry Gotto, George Y. Blair, Theodore C. Taylor and Herbert A. Harris vs. the Hawaiian Government.
To the Honorable A. Francis Judd, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court:
John Chapman, of London, England, owner of thirty-eight shares in the British steamship Madras herein mentioned; Mountjoy Pearce, of Stockton-Tees, England, owner of nine shares in the said Madras; Joseph W. Morgan, owner of eight shares in the said Madras; Henry Gotto, of said London, owner of three shares in said Madras; George Y. Blair, of said Stockton, owner of two shares in said Madras; Theodore C. Taylor, of York, England, owner of two shares in the said Madras; the said plaintiffs claim of the Hawaiian Government, the said defendant, \$35,150.39 with interest from the second day of March, 1886, for damages resulting to them for injury done to their property by the defendant, for that:
On or about the 10th of March, 1885, the said British steamship Madras of the gross burthen of 1681 22-100, the property of the plaintiffs in proportion as aforesaid, in charge and under command of W. H. Bradley as master, arrived at the port of Honolulu, of the Islands of Oahu, one of the said Hawaiian Islands, from Hongkong, China, bound for said Honolulu with about six hundred passengers for said Honolulu, and about one hundred and thirty-nine Chinese passengers en route for Victoria in British Columbia, and with the contagious disease of smallpox prevailing among the said passengers, of which disease the Board of Health of the said Hawaiian Government was duly informed by the said master, and due application was thereupon made on behalf of the said Madras that she might be entered at the Custom House of the said Hawaiian Government at the said port of Honolulu might be landed quarantine.

But, the defendant with force and arms for a period of about fifty-three days from the said 10th of April, A. D. 1885, or thereabouts, to the 4th day of June, A. D. 1885, or thereabouts, prevented and detained the said Madras from coming to the port of Honolulu, from entering at the Custom House, from landing any of the passengers in quarantine or otherwise, and during this period of time neglected and refused to establish any quarantine to be performed by the said Madras though requested to do so by the representatives of the plaintiff; but the defendant compelled the said Madras to remain and detained her in the open roadstead of the said port during the said period of the damage of the plaintiffs as aforesaid according to the bill of particulars hereto annexed and made a part of this complaint, which the plaintiffs allege was done in contravention of their private rights under the laws.
Wherefore the plaintiffs ask that the defendant be cited to appear and answer the complaint before a jury of the country at the next term of this Court unless otherwise sooner disposed of by judicial authority.

The above document is signed by the parties named; by John Chapman, managing owner of the steamship Madras; by his attorney in fact, Theo. H. Davies; and was subscribed and sworn to on the 13th day of March, 1886, before Henry Smith, Deputy Clerk of the Supreme Court.

THE DOMINIS JUBILEE.
FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ARRIVAL OF MRS. DOMINIS.
To-morrow the 23rd April 1887, fifty years will have elapsed since Mrs. Dominis, mother of Lieutenant General John Dominis, landed on these shores. She came hither in the bark Jones, which vessel was commanded by her husband, Captain John O. Dominis. The family consisted of one daughter and one son. The former died when quite a child, while her only son John Owen, then a stripling of five years, is, or rather was, until a few days ago, still amongst us. Mrs. Dominis ship has for many years lived a comparatively quiet and retired life at the Dominis homestead on Beretania street, known as Washington Place. A few years after her arrival, she accompanied her husband on a voyage to China, with which exception, she has never left the Islands since her arrival. Washington House was built by her late husband, Captain Dominis. It is situated on a lot adjoining the Puna-hou Preparatory school, and stands back from the road. It is a large and beautiful mansion and from the day it was tenanted it has been famed for the genial hospitality and warm-heartedness that has at all times reigned within its walls, the "Governor" inheriting all of his father's good qualities, and at the same time being at all times supported in the elegant entertainments given, by his devoted spouse, Princess Lydia Liliuokalani. John O. Dominis Sr. did not long survive the completion of the Dominis mansion, he having sailed hence for China in the year 1848, and was never afterwards heard of. The brig Neilson, in which he was passenger at the time, is supposed to have foundered at sea with all hands. U. S. Commissioner Brown, a passenger by the same vessel, was also lost.

ECLIPSE.
To-morrow, a reception will be held between the hours of 2:30 p. m. and 4:30 p. m. during which time the Royal Hawaiian Band will be in attendance. The well-wishers of the old lady are legion, and no doubt the callers on this auspicious occasion will be numerous. It is somewhat a matter of regret that the Governor and his Royal lady, being absent, will not have an opportunity of assisting the venerable and aged mother in receiving her, and his many friends. Being a martyr to rheumatism, which, by the way, her son John would seem to have inherited, her she moves about but very little.
Since the Centennial year, 1876, Mrs. Dominis has never been outside the gates of her domain, and for a few months past, has not ventured outside of the house. An accident befell her a few weeks ago by which one of her legs was temporarily disabled, but no serious results are anticipated therefrom. Her health is remarkably good, considering her age, 85 years, and at the present day her voice, sight, hearing and mental faculties generally, have suffered but little by age.
About five months hence a silver wedding celebration will probably

take place within the same walls, provided the Governor returns in time from his European tour, he having married H. R. H. Princess Liliuokalani on the 16th September, 1862. The Aloha and congratulations of the BULLETIN are tendered to Mrs. Dominis Sr.
