

TAXATION TABLES.

The more we look at Capt. Luce's Table, the more we are impressed with its importance and suggestiveness. In the line of political economy, which last is something that our powers that be should seriously take into consideration. And first, let us observe that, while there are 15,524 Hawaiians assessed as tax payers, this figure does not really represent so many able-bodied males, for it includes women, (who are proverbially vain of the distinction of being taxed) and those who are taxed for estates which they represent. On the other hand, the eleven thousand and four Chinese, who pay taxes to the amount of \$74,614, are all male adults. In regard to the other nationalities it appears that the Americans pay about two-sevenths of the taxes, the British one-seventh, the Germans and other nationalities one-seventh, leaving respectively, two-sevenths and one-seventh to the Hawaiians and the Chinese.

The remarks of the compiler, appended to the table, are worth reproducing:

The numbers of horses and dogs owned by the different nationalities are not exhibited, but a careful estimate would place three-quarters of the former and at least nine-tenths of the latter in possession of Hawaiians.

Estates are in each instance counted as individuals. In the Hawaiian assessment are a considerable number of females and estates. Chinese, Germans and Portuguese, except some estates, are exclusively males. Americans and British have a few females, as well as estates, included among them.

There are exempted from personal taxes in the District of Honolulu, either as soldiers or firemen, 485 Hawaiians and 210 foreigners.

In classifying the different nationalities the rule has been adopted that all persons born in this Kingdom of foreign parentage, should follow the nationality of the male parent. When the father is a foreigner and the mother of mixed or pure Hawaiian blood, the children are classed as Hawaiians.

THE brig Hazard, Capt. Miller, arrived at Kahului, on the 20th inst, 12 1/2 days from San Francisco, with a general cargo valued at \$16,863.02, and the following passengers: Mrs. and Miss Fuller, M. Watson, J. B. Redding, J. Murrin and 27 Chinese.

A correspondent at Hilo, writes: "The 3-masted schooner Excelsior, Capt. Piltz, arrived here on the 19th instant, 23 days from Port Townsend. She brings a cargo of coal and lumber to Messrs Shipman & Bridges. The has hauled alongside of the new wharf, and is discharging there. This is, I think, the first foreign vessel which has discharged cargo at a wharf outside of Honolulu. There is 20 feet of water at the end of the wharf."

LEGISLATIVE.

Saturday, June 24.—Mr. Widemann, from the Committee on Government Lands and Internal Improvements, reported on various petitions which had been referred to them.

A resolution offered by Mr. Pilipo, was adopted, for the appointment of a special committee to ascertain and report the quantity of opium imported during the past four years, and the quantity known to have been sold. The committee consists of the Minister of Finance, and Messrs. Pilipo, Kalua, Lahilahi and Rice.

Mr. Lahilahi offered a resolution to the effect that the Sergeant-at-arms be instructed to procure a copy of the Index of Land Claims, one for each member of the Assembly. After some discussion a resolution was adopted.

On motion of Mr. Aholo, the item of salary for Deputy Collector of Customs, which was before the House on the previous day, was reconsidered, when the Minister of the Interior moved that the sum be fixed at \$5000 for the biennial period.

The motion was strongly opposed by Mr. Nawahi, and was lost by a vote of 23 noes to 21 ayes.

Mr. Palohau offered the following—"Whereas a good many tins of opium were found yesterday in the Custom House; therefore resolved that the Attorney General is hereby instructed to sue the Collector General of Customs and all his subordinates." [This was probably another little gook.] The Minister of the Interior moved to amend, that Mr. Palohau be subpoenaed on the part of the prosecution. The resolution was indefinitely postponed.

The Taxation Bill was then taken up in committee of the whole. Having got as far as section 69, the committee rose, and the House adjourned.

Zamloch amused, instructed and bewildered a large audience on Saturday evening at the Music Hall. To-night, by special request, he will give, as a finale, "Zamloch's Trip to the Infernal Regions!"

By the Likelike yesterday we hear that Judge Hart's Sugar Mill, at Niulii, Kohala, narrowly escaped a conflagration on Tuesday evening last.

Kauai Items.

(From our own Correspondent.)

A restaurant has at last been started at Hanalei, supplying a much felt want. On visiting it I found that Mr. Webb, the English School Teacher, already a boarder and though, as I can vouch for, a good cook himself, is in ecstasy at "Bungo's" culinary powers. He has left Mrs. Johnson's house, and is now residing with the Rev. Mr. Paiki and his brother Kaupena. Tourists and others visiting that part of the island may now rest assured of being able to procure a first-class meal at a moderate figure, and be besides waited upon by one of the civillest of the notably civil Japanese, whose name, as before mentioned, is "Bungo."

Temperature, 72°, weather fine. Owing to the unavoidable absence of Judge Kakina, the cases Koelling vs. Kaupena and Molokai & Koelling vs. Cupper, have been postponed until the 26th.

The Chinamen are very busy getting in their rice crop, and to all appearance are having a splendid yield. It is rather an uncomfortable time for uninterested persons, as from early dawn till late in the evening the yelling, tom tomming, shooting, &c., is something frightful. One wakes up under the hallucination fostered by these discordant sounds during a semi-state of sleep, that something horrible is taking place, either a murder, a shipwreck, a fire or something equally agreeable.

The English School at Waioli, under the management of Mr. Webb, is progressing favorably, though laboring under many disadvantages; the attendance has slightly decreased lately, owing to the migration to other parts of quite a number of the families. When I visited the school a few days ago, there were 54 on the books and 46 in attendance. On this school I shall have something more to write after I have visited it again.

Tourists and valetudinarians would find a trip to this Island—especially to about Hanalei—conducive to their health after the oppressive heat of Honolulu. Here we have a temperature cooled by the N.E. trade wind and occasional showers—temperature seldom if ever of 80°.
