LEGISLATIVE.

Tuesday, June 27.—On suspension of the rules, Mr. Kaunamano was permitted to introduce a petition from Hamakua, in regard to the surveys of certain lands in that district. Referred to the Minister of the Interior.

Mr. Gibson from the special committee in respect to the subject of hospitals, &c., laid before the House their report, which was accepted.

Mr. Kaunamano gave notice of intention to introduce a bill to provide a permanent settlement for A. P. Brickwood.

Mr. Lilikalani gave notice of intention to introduce a bill to amend the bill providing a permanent settlement for H. S. Swinton.

Mr. Palohau gave notice of a bill to license the sale of milk.

The House went into committee of the whole on the Appropriation Bill. The report of the committee on the items respecting the Board of Health expenditures, for the biennial period, amounting to \$100,000, was considered, discussed and adopted.

A number of minor matters were briefly discussed, and the Assembly went into committee of the whole on the Piece de Resistance—the Taxation Bill, which was finally passed on the second reading.
