OUR AMERICAN LETTER.

There not being space in this issue for the whole of our very interesting San Francisco letter, some important matters left over are condensed below:

The Senate has passed the free silver coinage bill, making silver coin and certificates legal tender for all purposes, and making compulsory the purchase and mintage of \$4,500,000 dollars of silver billion monthly.

The respondent in the American Sugar Refinery case of Havemeyers vs. the Superior Court of California has given notice of motion for a new trial.

The steamer Australia has been placed under the American flag. News has been received from Capt. Dudd of the Hawaiian steamer Claudine, disabled on the voyage out. St. Vincent was reached May 15, and it was expected, the Claudine would put into Montevideo for coal and reach Honolulu in 56 days. She averages 210 miles a day on ten tons of coal.

The local demand for bananas is light, but the shipping demand brisk. The agency of the Pacific Mail Steamship Co. has been taken from Williams, Diamond & Co., and given to R. A. Johnson.

TERM CLOSING.

Interesting Proceedings at Oahu College - Tokens of Love to Retiring Preceptors.

The term of Oahu College closing to-night will be remembered in that institution as the last one of the incumbency of Rev. W. C. Merritt as Principal and his esteemed wife as one of the faculty.

Tuesday evening the post-graduates with the graduating class of this year, numbering twenty-two young ladies and gentlemen, waited on Mr. and Mrs. Merritt at Punahou and presented them with an elegant album, accompanied with a kindly farewell address read by Miss Lillian Lyman. The album is bound in koa and kou woods, with the work "Aloha" inlaid in sandal wood. It contains very clear groups of the former graduates and the present graduating class.

Yesterday at noon Mrs. L. D. Pinney's class left at her room gifts comprising a buckle with two bear's tusks, having a golden clasp engraved with a view of Diamond Head; a native calabash, and a set of tortoise shell salad spoons. A note of the warmest farewell sentiments accompanied the presents.

The rhetorical exercises were held yesterday afternoon in the large hall of the coral building. A large and distinguished audience was present. There were Hawaiian, United States and British flags draping the wall back of the platform. Profuse decorations of vines and flowers set off all the interior. The following programme was given in a manner to delight the assemblage throughout: Chorus - Elms of dear old Yale. School Declaration - The Battle of Ivey. Declaration - How We Hunted a Mouse. Harry Ryeroff Declaration - Dan Periton's Ride Down the Concomagh Valley. Frank Armstrong Song - Two Grenadiers. Schuman Ernest Lyman.

The discussion between Alexander Atherton and Hiram Bingham was composed by themselves. It was not only very learned, but had a cleverly inserted vein of humor. Just before the last number Rufus A. Lyman, Jr., came forward and read a farewell address to Mr. and Mrs. Merritt, introducing the present of a Waltham gold watch, suitably inscribed, to the Principal and an oil painting by Mr. Barnfield of a bunch of oblas to his spouse.

Prof. A. B. Lyons then went forward and said that pervading the work of the term closing there had been in the minds of the faculty a

sense of impending loss. They had naturally thought right to keep that feeling in the background, but now that the hour had come when the ties that had bound teacher and school and fellow-workers together must be severed, it was natural that expression should be given to their feelings. They had felt most profoundly the great loss that their school must sustain in the retiring of one who had been for so many years their energetic and efficient President. His strong personality had affected everything so much that his loss would be deeply felt. And Punahou without the inspiring presence of Mrs. Merritt, they did not like to mention it. He wished to express the perfect regard that the corps of the instructors of the college felt toward one who had been as one of them. Addressing Mrs. Pinney, he said he was commissioned to present her with the volume that he handed to her ("Indigenous Plants of the Hawaiian Islands"), as a slight testimonial of the warm appreciation of the faithfulness and efficiency of her labors. The article was small in intrinsic value but they asked her to accept it as a token of their esteem. They hoped when she turned its pages she would think of those who had been her associates there, and if she would take pleasure in thinking of this land of sunshine, they should be glad to be linked with that pleasure.

Mr. Merritt replied substantially as follows: This part of the programme has entirely unannounced me. I want to say, in regard to this token of love, that, if you can sincerely express sadness at parting, what can you think of us when we drop the cares and pleasures that have been ingrained into our lives these last seven years? I assure you that we shall have to begin life over again, with new experiences all to be lived over again. I want to thank the young people of the boarding department and of the school for these testimonials of their regard. I can only wish that the recollections of the time were more full of things as we should wish to have them. My one regret is that all the young people who have been led into the life of the school have not been led by given themselves to Christ. I am glad that some have come into the joys of that life. My greatest regret is that you have not all been born into the kingdom of the Lord Jesus Christ. I have no words to thank the young people of Oahu College and the Preparatory School. I had not given a passing thought about such a thing coming to pass, but for myself and Mrs. Merritt I kindly thank you. Punahou would not have been Punahou if it had not been for Mrs. Merritt. As to Mrs. Pinney, whatever she has given her hand to, she has done it with the utmost fidelity.

Mrs. Pinney said that at such a time emotion was too deep for words, and she would not attempt to say anything further than to thank the faculty for that token of kindness. She would wish to thank the scholars for the very choice gifts that they had placed in her room that noon. She should prize them because they were intended to remind one of these sunny islands, and for the note that accompanied them she wished to thank them.

At the close of the exercises the Royal Hawaiian Band gave a concert on the grounds, while the company sat on the verandas or strolled through the buildings to see the equipments of the College.
