A REPORTER'S KICK.

Frank Hoogs Talks to the Board of Health.

In its report of the proceedings of the Board of Health a morning paper says:

A protest was read from Frank Hoogs, a reporter of the Advertiser. He cited that he was not allowed to go aboard the Gaelic and attend to his duties, although the ship was not in quarantine. Others being allowed the privilege, he thought favoritism was shown.

The full text of Mr. Hoogs's communication to the board is given below:

HONOLULU, May 8, 1895.

WILLIAM O. SMITH, Esq.,

President Board of Health,

City:

DEAR SIR:—On the arrival of the steamship Gaelic from China, some days since, I was not allowed to go on board of the vessel, although, I have reason to believe, the Port Physician declared her free from contagion. In my capacity as reporter on the Daily Advertiser I had business with the purser, which I was unable to transact owing to the action of one of the Board's officers.

The conductors of local newspapers feel that the Board of Health, along with other public bodies, should extend every courtesy possible to aid their reporters in gathering news for the benefit of the general public, and to gain the views of the Board of Health in this respect I submit the following proposition for action:

When a vessel arriving from China or any other foreign country is free from disease, and although it is considered necessary to keep a nominal quarantine, as in the case of the Gaelic, allow one reporter of each daily newspaper to board her and transact his business with the purser, it being understood that such reporters will not visit the steerage or mingle with the steerage passengers.

I do not think this is asking too much and if granted it will remove a very annoying thorn from the path of newspaper reporters.
