## THE NEW VOLCANO.

The Whole Native Population is Excited.

About half-past ten o'clock this morning a number of native women were bathing in the vicinity of the bark Sumatra, now being dismantled. Among her stores are a number of life-buoys, to which are attached a gasoline apparatus which shows a light at sea for twelve hours or more. One of these is said to have been thrown overboard this morning to scare the aforesaid native women. A few seconds afterwards the whole business exploded, and general report now says that a new volcano has broken out. There are even those who say that on the first flash, which was some four feet in height, the picture of a new ruler was distinctly seen. Anyhow the whole native population is aroused over the matter, and the Nuuanu street wharf, the bark S. N. Castle and other ships in the vicinity are literally crowded with sight-seers. The kahunas have been quick to take advantage of the occurrence and prophesy that a new volcano will arise out of seven feet of the Pacific ocean, and that another monarch will ascend the throne of Hawaii before the eruption is over.

As a matter of fact there are periodical eruptions of steam, accompanied by occasional flashes of fire about every three minutes, the location being on the Ewa side of the bark Sumatra and only a few feet from it. The bark lies about midway between the Nuuanu street and the O. R. & L. Co.'s wharves.

There are as many rumors as to the cause of the curiosity as there were people watching it—every man had his opinion and he expressed it.

Lighthouse Keeper Williams says two Japanese had an argument as to the relative merits of a certain brand of matches; one of them contended that water would not effect them, and to prove it threw a box overboard and the sun's rays set them on fire. They were shown to be water-proof.

Another individual who declines publicity through the newspapers says it's an indication that the Lehua has found a cache of opium and the surprise was so great that the bed of the ocean was so affected that it shows its surprise by frequent outbursts of fire.

The captains of vessels in the harbor are inclined to the belief that by some supernatural means the "hoo doo" has gone from the Sumatra and lies at the bottom of the bay as a warning to other captains.

A physician from the other islands on a visit here says it is a new process of fumigation he is experimenting with and that he didn't know the thing was loaded. When it went off he threw it overboard.

The kahunas say it all comes from of their prayers and incantations against certain people in the government. The end is nigh and monarchy will be restored at 6 p. m. next week.

Another authority has it that Sereno Bishop and Doctor Rodgers were discussing a volume of the Hawaiian and the flashes of wit came at such a fast and furious rate that the water caught fire.

As a matter of fact the trouble was caused by throwing overboard a patent life preserver that had caught fire from spontaneous combustion in the hold of the bark Sumatra. The chemicals with which the life buoy is inflated are of a character that is not effected by water and will burn for some time.

## THE POLICE COURT.

### Judge Perry Occupied the Bench To-day.

As stated in yesterday's BULLETIN Judge Perry was about again. He got there this morning in time to open court just the same as if he had not been in bed with the grip for about ten days. Now when Judge Perry gets on the bench, most people know that he means business and he went at it this morning just as though he did not know the debilitating effect of the malady he had been suffering from.

J. F. Souza, is an individual who by the grace of the Hawaiian Government and the Attorney-General has had the charge against him reduced to the extent that it only reads: "Violating section 9 of chapter 9 of penal code," which in plain English means assaulting and battering Mrs. J. F. Souza. Whether the parties are related to the celebrated bandmaster or not, the reporter could not discover from the records and Professor Berger was not in sight.

Ah Loy is an individual who testified that he was agent for the company which leases the Chinese wash-houses near the King street bridge. Mr. Loy was testifying in the case of The Republic of Hawaii vs. Chun Wa and Ah Liu, and it was mainly on his statements that the defendants got thirty days each for running a wash-house without first interviewing the Minister of the Interior.

"Mendoza" was charged with vagrancy, but evidently had sense enough to keep his mouth shut. He is reported on the records of the Court as "standing mute" and he evidently did it in great shape, as the Court ordered a plea of not guilty entered in his behalf because he would not do it himself.
