OLD CONFERENCE ON THE KAU DITCH

Another conference was held at the hotel yesterday between Governor and John T. McCrosson on the irrigation ditch proposal, the details of which were exclusively published in The Advertiser of September 28th.
No agreement has yet been reached between the Hawaiian Irrigation Commission and the government as to the basis of the contract that must exist between them before the gigantic enterprise can be commenced but no difficulty is expected by either of the parties.
This ditch is to conserve the surplus water from the streams of the Hahaione and Hilo districts on the windward side of Hawaii and convey them to the district. It will commence at an elevation of 3500 feet and be about 10 miles long.

GETTING AND THE AEROPLANE.
As aviation progresses, new and untried difficulties and dangers present themselves. The latest is that of construction from lightning. While balloons have been frequently struck, it has been supposed there was some special attraction in the displacement of the air by a lighter body, which attracted the electric current by furnishing a course of less resistance to its passage. This theory may have some force now that an aeroplane has been struck by lightning. Whatever the cause, the unpleasant fact remains that aeroplanes are not exempt and that striking rods to ground the current are practicable. Rural lines of passenger ships may some day offer as a special advantage that their decks are lightning zones free from thunder storms.

Reports from Hawaii and Maui are that showers have been frequent and that the sugar cane has been helped along materially.

George Brown and not George I. Brown was the best man at the wedding of Mrs. Emma Dreier and Henry N. Clark on Saturday evening.

Thomas Bewcastle, a native of England, yesterday filed notice in the Federal court of his intention to become a full-fledged citizen of Uncle Sam.

There will be a special meeting of Excelsior Lodge No. 1, I. O. O. F., and A. M., at its hall, Masonic Temple, this evening for work in the second degree.

Secretary Mott-Smith, president of the board of health, returned Sunday from Hilo where he looked into matters pertaining to the health department.

The Honolulu and Hoola Lahai Society will hold their regular monthly meeting on Wednesday morning at ten o'clock at the Kapiolani Maternity Home.

Maria Vasilevna, the Russian woman arrested for selling liquor illegally in Hilo Sunday, was fined \$100 in police court yesterday morning. The two men caught by officer Willis were discharged, the case against them not being sufficiently strong.

Judge Robinson yesterday issued a writ of mandamus at the request of Kuleana Link McCandless, ordering Marston Campbell as superintendent of public works, to appear in court and explain his reasons in refusing to connect up some of Link's boarding houses with the sewer.

Fifteen 30-ton flat cars have been completed in the shops for the Oahu Railroad Company, and twenty 30-ton cars will be completed in the near future. Work is shortly to be started on ten hopper-bottom freight cars for heavy bulk. In the course of time four handsome passenger coaches will be turned out.

PERSONALS.

Harry Clark, a Hawaiian singer, who went to Atlantic City for the summer engagement with the promotion committee exhibition, will return this week from the mainland.

A decree of the Governor has been published, changing the name of Geo. B. McClellan to George McKinley McClellan. This decree was issued on the petition of Mr. McClellan to permit him to assume as his middle name the maiden family name of his mother.

NO UNEMPLOYED SURPLUS IN JAPAN

The Kokumin denies the truth of the argument advanced in America that Japan will soon be suffering from a surplus of her population, and that she will be obliged to turn the tide of emigration, which was checked on the Pacific Coast, to the Korean Peninsula, and, further on, to the Russian dominions in the north, there to come into collision with Russia again. The Kokumin points out the fact that at present Japan has no unemployed population on her hands, and that the growth of her industries will soon find a deficiency of laborers. In its opinion the variation of populations in European countries finds a parallel in this country. The strong tendency to increase has been seen only since the restoration, owing perhaps to political, social and other causes. But this increase can not be constant as is proved in the history of other countries. On the contrary, the paper fears the future difficulty with Japan will be a gradual decrease rather than an increase of the population.

OUR CANDIDATES



Frank J. Kruger, better known as "Hanawaki," meaning watchmaker, the popular clockwork operator of Fort street, near Merchant, who is a regular candidate for the board of supervisors on the Republican ticket, was born in this city of Honolulu in the year 1866 and has resided here since except during that period when he went to the country of his ancestors, Germany, for the purpose of education and learning his trade.

After for a little while attending the old Fort street school in this city, Mr. Kruger went to Germany in 1872, at the tender age of six years. Returning to the Hawaiian Islands in 1887 he was old enough to cast his first vote for the reform party. Two years later he went into the watch-repairing business on Fort street, having been at that trade steadily ever since.

Mr. Kruger was a charter member of both the Healani and Leilani yacht and boat clubs and took an enthusiastic interest in the sport. He was a member of the old volunteer fire brigade, running with engine number 2, this department having disbanded in 1897.

During the rebellion against the Republic of Hawaii, Kruger, though most of his friends were royalists, was a member of the citizens guard, being in squad 2. He still retains his certificate of honorable service and discharge, signed by Sanford B. Dole, the president of the Republic.

Mr. Kruger married Miss Rose of Kaneohe whose father was manager of the Kaneohe sugar plantation. He is a member of Hawaiian Lodge, Masons, and a Royal Arch Mason.

SAMPLES PROVED TO BE FULL OF MAGGOTS

Meat Secured at the Fishmarket Presents Loathsome Appearance.

The seven samples of meat secured by Official Chemist E. B. Blanchard from the fishmarket have "hatched." Put into little glass jars as apparently perfectly good meat last Saturday afternoon, yesterday they were a mass of swarming maggots, ranging in size from the size of a pinhead to a half-inch long. Every solitary sample came up to expectations and predictions and became the home of such a mass of embryo flies (which is a better sounding and cleaner term for fastidious ears), that they quite concealed the meat from view. And the meat was bought in the ordinary manner for consumption, at that.

Blanchard agrees with Doctor Monseratt that the meat was not diseased. The maggots were strictly distinct, and it only took them one and a half days to hatch from flyeggs and eat up their late home.

There will be a meeting of the health committee of the board of supervisors this afternoon at half-past three and the matter will probably be brought up then. The seven jars of filth are expected to create quite a diversion.

No arrests will be made in these cases as no record was kept of the origin of the samples but other samples will be secured at once and wholesale arrests will follow after that. Blanchard stated yesterday that he believes 500 samples out of a thousand taken from the exposed meat at the fishmarket will result in an identical manner.

The meat was not diseased at the time it was inspected at the slaughterhouse, nor was it when it was placed on the counters at the market. After that, however, it is only several hours before it becomes infested with unatched maggots from flyeggs, and this is the reason Blanchard is endeavoring to get an ordinance to have all food stuffs covered for safe passed water cover.
