**THOUSANDS OF EYES WILL  
BE STARGAZING FOR MARS**

**All Honolulu Will Focus Optics at Telescope  
Angle to See Aeroplane at Half-Past  
Two o'Clock Today.**

The population of Honolulu, including the suburban sections, is fifty-one thousand. That makes one hundred and two thousand eyes that will be focused this afternoon at half past two o'clock on an atmospheric sphere bounded by the confines of Moanalua field, or the Damon estate, and extending as far up as the rays of human vision will carry scanning the transparency like so many range finders to detect a tiny speck on the sky, and if Bird Mars was one of the feathered species, he might be spotted by the concentrated gaze and become transfixed in the heavens to twinkle in the horoscope initiated by the planet Mars.

**Grip on the Air.**

Of course it's going to be a delightful day, for father Neptune poured out all the moisture yesterday that was in store, and what little moisture there is left in the atmosphere will go to make the flying easier, by affording a grip on the heavy air. The biplane with which Mars will give his exhibition was tested and found in perfect order yesterday afternoon, and when the mechanism was turned loose the tent which holds the flying machine was nearly blown away by the hurricane the propeller of the biplane kicked up.

**MUST GO EARLY TO  
EXHIBITION FLIGHTS**

**Public Will Have to Distribute It-  
self to Accommodate Facil-  
ities for Transportation.**

The transportation problem, that of getting all the people out to Moanalua field in time to witness the exhibition flights today, tomorrow and Monday, is one that only the public can solve by distributing itself over considerable time and to do this a thousand or so will have to start early to avoid the rush. C. G. Ballentyne, general superintendent of the Rapid Transit company, gave Ed Lewis a jolt with the announcement that the street cars would land three hundred passengers every ten minutes at the end of the line, from one o'clock until three, each afternoon of the flights. Lewis has the contract to convey the crowds who go by trolley as far as they can out to the polo grounds and he figured it out that he could only handle about 525 an hour while the cars will run on a schedule to handle 1800 an hour during the rush time. This leaves a discrepancy of 1275 every six minutes, and the only way out of the dilemma is for as many as possible to go before the rush hours and while away the intervening moments inspecting the flying machines until the time arrives for the flights to begin.
