LOW VISIBLE SUPPLY AND LIGHT REPORTS BAD WEATHER FOR BEET CROP

WILLET & GRAY'S REPORT ON CONDITION OF SUGAR MARKET — JAVA SUGAR CONDITIONS.

Willet & Gray's circular for Sept. 7, reports as follows on the sugar market: RAW.—Since the issue of our last paper there have been no transactions in raw sugar reported and no business done either on the spot or for shipment, with exception of a balance of steamer cargo, 5,000 bags at 2 1/2 c. and f. for 95 deg. basis, equal to 3.89c for 96 deg. duty paid.

The "Labor Day" holiday may be partially responsible for this dullness, of which refiners have taken advantage by keeping out of the market and showing entire indifference to the course of events. Naturally under these conditions some holders who desired to realize have found it impracticable to do so, and it is an open question as to the prices to be paid in the next transactions.

Last week's quotations remain nominally in force at 4c. duty paid for 96 deg. test spot and 2 1/2 c. and f. 95 deg. test for shipment, but buyers' views, so far as inferences can be drawn, are at 3 1/2 c. duty paid spot and 2 1/2 c. and f. for 96 deg. test basis. New crop Cubas have been offered during the week at 2 1/2 c. and f. for 96 deg. test for February-March shipments, but buyers were not interested.

European beet sugar markets began the week at 8s. 8 1/2 d. f. o. b. Hamburg, rose to 8s. 10 1/2 d. and ended unchanged at 8s. 8 1/2 d. for prompt and 8s. 11 1/2 d. for October delivery. During the week the weather for the growing beet crop

is reported unfavorable by Mr. Licht, but caused only momentary improvement in markets.

Our special cable from Java reports the exports to U. E. 128,000 tons by steam and 3,000 tons by sail. The crop is estimated at 1,000,000 tons. No business is reported in Java sugars this week, holders being content to await developments. Quotations are now 10s. c. and f. for August-September and there is a rumor current that 25 to 30,000 tons of this shipment were sold some time ago at about this figure.

The corrected importers stock on September 1 is 57,003 tons, consisting of 21,000 tons Centrifugals, and balance of Hollands and other Muscovado and Molasses sugars. These figures do not include the 22,000 tons Cubas held for speculators account by agents of Federal Sugar Refining Company.

The receipts this week are 56,360 tons in excess of requirements for meltings of 40,000 tons which were reduced by the holiday closing. Total stocks are increased to 292,028 tons, against 185,665 tons last week and 125,685 tons at corresponding time last year.

The Cuba cable gives no receipts, 3,500 tons exports and 206,000 stock. With two centrals still grinding the visible crop production of date being 1,112,000 tons. The stock remaining in the island is now mostly in the strongest hands who may decide to hold steadily for some time yet rather than follow the market down.

VISIBLE SUPPLY.—Total stock of Europe and America, 1,293,028 tons, against 1,503,746 tons last year at the same uneven dates and 2,756,298 tons at the even date of Jan. 1st, 1905. The decrease of stock is 210,718 tons, against a decrease of 212,426 tons last week, and a decrease of 1,005,740 tons January 1st, 1905. Total stocks and floats, together, show a visible supply of 1,878,028 tons, against 1,900,746 tons last year.

DISMISSALS CAUSED BY LACK OF FUNDS

The report of the dismissal of Road Engineer of the Public Works Department Guy H. Gere of Hilo at the instance of Governor Carter and with the disapproval of Superintendent of Public Works C. S. Holloway, now in Hilo, seems to be somewhat twisted. Assistant Superintendent of Public Works Howland this forenoon gave the following story of the whole affair: "The road engineers of the department were employed to do work under the loan appropriation bill, it being understood at the time of their employment that they were to be paid out of the appropriation of this bill. When the Governor cut out all the special island items from the bill there was no work for them to do, at least not at the present time. There was furthermore no money from which to pay them as the items from which they should draw their pay had been cut out and as there is not enough of the current appropriations to pay them. As there was no money with which to pay the road engineers there was no other course open except to disperse with them.

"As soon as the Governor notified me that he had cut out the special island items, I notified Road Engineers Gere of Hawaii, Howell of Maui and Sweetser of Kauai by wireless that the department did no longer require their services. I notified Holloway in Hilo at the same time but I have not heard a word from him."

KAPAA LANDS ARE BEING DISCUSSED

The Governor, Secretary Atkinson, and Land Commissioner Pratt are at present busily engaged in matters connected with the opening of public lands. Yesterday these three gentlemen had a lengthy conference on the subject and today Atkinson paid a call on Pratt at his office in regard to the matter.

The opening of certain lands at Kapaa, which are at present leased for cane cultivation, but the lease on which will expire next year, is being especially treated, as was reported by the Bulletin some time ago would be the case.

LADIES TAKE NOTES OF MISS TRACEY'S COOKING LECTURE

Some three hundred women, from sweet sixteen to settled sixty, armed with pencils, pads and an appetite for knowledge and dainty samples, gathered in the large social hall of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel at 10 o'clock this morning to hear and see Miss Suzanne Tracey, cooking artist and expert, discourse and demonstrate.

On a platform at the mauka end of the hall Miss Tracey, flanked by a couple of Reliable gas ranges, a cabinet and an operating table and assisted by a Honolulu lady, juggled eggs, butter, flour and a host of other ingredients, talking the while and revealing many little mysteries which touched her gentle audience in the appropriate locality.

Among the lessons was a scientific revelation in the art of cooking peas. Miss Tracey announced that half or more of the pea flavor was in the pod and advised, when fresh peas were cooked, the boiling of the pods with the peas.

Pencils and pads were kept busy and a deep interest was manifested. A delicious little lunch, the result of the morning's demonstration, was served and the Honolulu Gas Co.'s seamer was voted a perfectly lovely affair.

ADMINISTRATION HAS NOT FILED ACCOUNTS FOR YEARS

Georgina Gomez Ferreira, nee Gomez, Maria Gomez Ferreira, nee Gomez, and Luí Gomez, residents of Honokaa, Hawaii, have filed a motion to show cause for accounting by administratrix and for distribution. Their petition shows that Jacintho Gomez died intestate at Honolulu, May 11, 1891, leaving an estate. On June 8, 1891, Virginia Gomez, the widow, was appointed administratrix of the estate.

It is shown that no inventory or account has been filed by the administratrix in regard to the administration of the property of the estate up to the present time. She has collected a large sum of money on accounts of rents of real estate belonging to the estate and also of a certain leasehold sold by her. Furthermore there is the sum of \$400 in the Postal Bank belonging to the estate. The petitioners show that they are the only heirs at law of Jacintho Gomez, subject to the dower right of Virginia Gomez. They ask that the administratrix be ordered to show cause why she should not file her accounts, and that she be commanded to turn into the court all the moneys belonging to the estate in order that distribution may be made.
