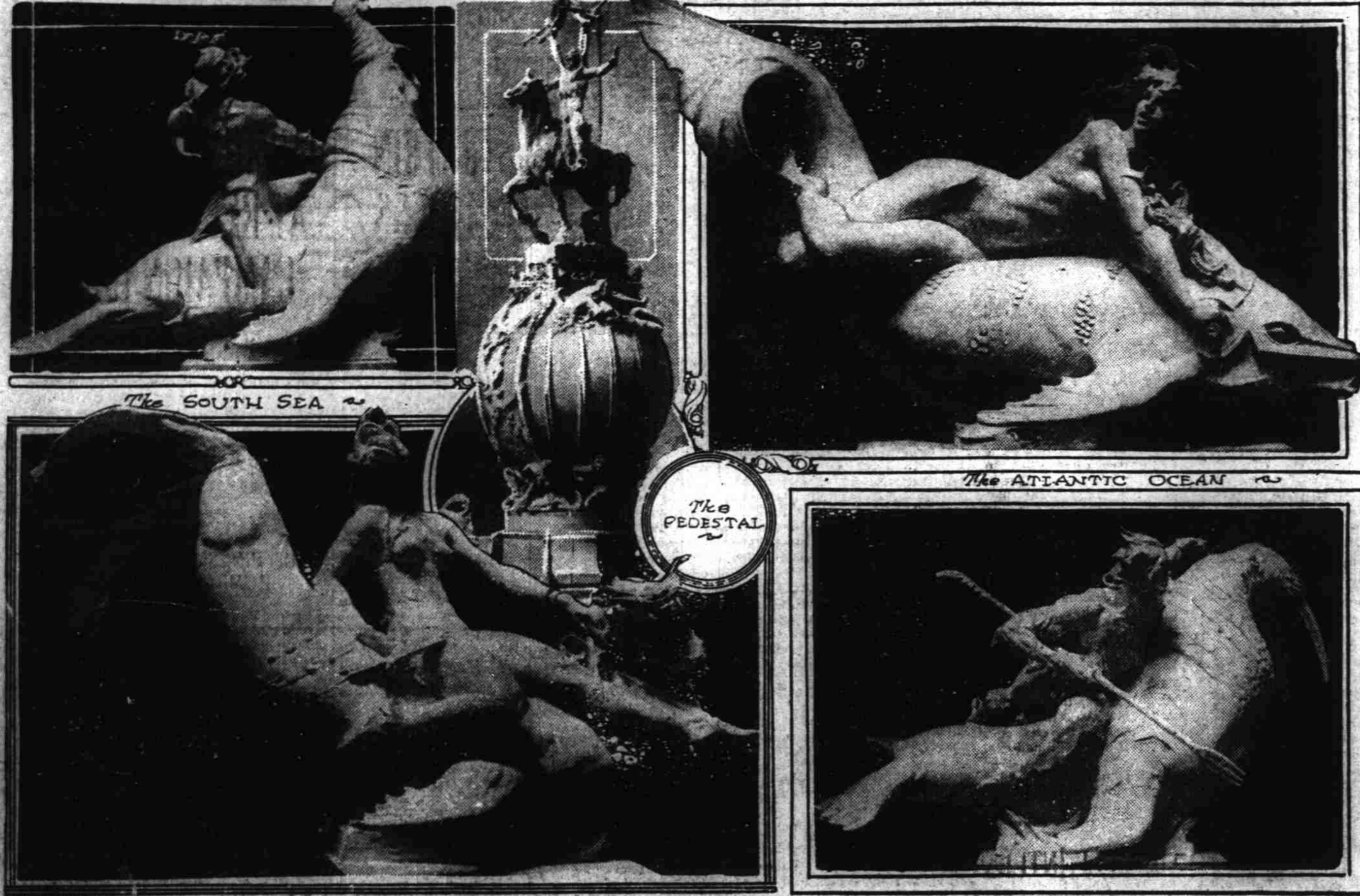


HUGE SCULPTURED GROUP CELEBRATES AMERICA'S PANAMA CANAL TRIUMPH



First Photographs of A. Stirling Calder's Striking Figures for His Fountain of Energy, Celebrating the Victory of Human Energy Over Earth and Ocean.

Mr. A. Stirling Calder, the sculptor, has just completed the scale models for his triumphal "Fountain of Energy," one of the most important sculptured groups at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition and first photographs of the figures are published on this page today.

The theme of the sculptor's work is the triumph of human energy over earth and ocean in the building of the Panama canal. The essential feature of the work is the lightness of effect in portraying a theme which, when attempted in sculptured groups or figures, would ordinarily be expressed in too heavy a mood. The details of the fountain are done in a blithe creative spirit. The figures suggest folk lore and fairy tales. Such figures and sprites were never seen on sea or land.

The Fountain of Energy will prove one of the most striking groups of sculpture upon the exposition grounds. It will be outlined against the vast archway of the great Tower of Jewels through which the visitor will enter directly into the Court of the Universe upon passing through

the tropical South Gardens from the main gate of the exposition.

The fountain is unique in its conception. A great globe representing the earth is surmounted by an equestrian figure of "Energy, the Victor," a splendid male figure standing erect in a stance, with hands outstretched in gesture of command. From his shoulders spring two spirits of fame and glory who blow their magic trumpets about his head. Sprays of water describing intersecting curves with their interplay and motion and light reflection will convey the joyous spirit of the fountain.

In the fountain's main basin at the base of the pedestal are symbolic figures representing the earth's four great bodies of water—the North Sea, the South Sea, the Atlantic Ocean and the Pacific Ocean.

The spherical pedestal which the triumphal rider surmounts is modelled to represent the earth, crossed from north to south by a decorative band, following the path of the sun's travel through the heavens. This

band will be ornamented with symbolic figures of the earth's response to the quickening action of the sun. Surmounting the pedestal and at the base of the figure of Energy, growing out of the sphere as though a part of it, are two figures representing the eastern and western hemispheres.

The four figures of the four seas stand out from the pedestal in the basin and in the circular pool are two alternating lines with the figures of water sprites and demons mounted upon odd fishes, executed in a whimsical spirit.

No. 1. The North Sea, portrays an Esquimau peering over the back of a walrus intent on spearing his prey.

No. 2. The South Sea portrays a giant negro, fanned and tattooed, mounted on a prodigious sea elephant, survivor of prehistoric oceans. The great black is amusing himself with a wriggling octopus and he is as indolent and good natured as a young puppy. No more striking representation of Mr. Calder's genius could be given than in this picture.

No. 3. The Atlantic Ocean, a water sprite riding on a helmeted dolphin and grasping in her hand as a trident a flying fish and twisted sea serpent, representing submarine communications. Her head dress is hung with shells and corals. The helmet of the dolphin is symbolical of triumphant navies and armored merchantmen.

No. 4. The Pacific Ocean, representing the goddess of the Pacific, mounted upon a huge sea monster and rising easily over placid waters.

No. 5. Central pedestal surmounted by an equestrian statue, "Energy the Victor."

WEATHER DELAYS CONTRACTOR ON BREAKWATER JOB

Work on the preparations for starting the actual breakwater building is going ahead very slowly, owing to weather conditions. Reports from Waipio, where Contractor Marshall is constructing a small breakwater to protect the barges which he expects to load with rock to be hauled to the breakwater, has been slow. There has been so much rain that it has been impossible to go ahead with the job as expected.

Marshall is spending most of his time in Waipio and is arranging for

the quarrying. It is stated that during next month he will begin the long hauling of rocks from Waipio to the breakwater. Then will come the test of the practicability of his plan.

There are many who express the opinion that Marshall cannot carry out the contract he has undertaken in the way he is trying to do it, and that his plan to haul the rock in barges from Waipio to the breakwater is impracticable. The next two or three months will demonstrate whether it can be done or not. If it can, Marshall will probably make a big profit out of his contract, and if it cannot, he will have to "go broke," or start a new plan, and the breakwater will be delayed.

CENTRAL UNION PICNIC WILL BE A LARGE AFFAIR

One of the biggest events of its kind annually is the Central Union Bible school picnic, which comes off tomorrow at the peninsula. Following are the details.

Time—Special picnic train leaves depot at 8:50 sharp, returning arrives at depot at 4:15 p. m. The special picnic tickets are good only on this train.

Tickets—Special tickets must be presented by all children except Cradle Roll and Sunbeam departments. Tickets not required of adults of Central Union church constituency.

Supplies—All provisions, food and other supplies for the picnic must be delivered at the church before 8 o'clock or at the depot before 8:30.

Bathing—All persons who expect to go swimming must bring their own suits and towels. Dressing rooms, a safety committee, and other facilities for swimming will be provided.

Baseball—All boys who play baseball are requested to bring their own baseballs, bats and gloves. Indoor baseballs and bats will be provided.

Sports—The chief events will include swimming, launch rides, track events, novelty races, stunt baseball, indoor baseball and some special good games for girls and for little children.

Dinner—The picnic dinner will be served between 12 and 1 o'clock.
