Having ridden over every mile of the Hilo railroad, and after having explored every crevice and crack, not only on the lava floor of Kilauea, but also in Kilauea-Iki and the newly discovered lava tube, D company, 1st infantry, with Lieut. got it. When we arrived in Hilo, we found not only a special train waiting for us, but also that Mr. Thurston was to come with us and tell us all about the trip. We found also that perfect arrangements had been made for us at nights, and that besides going over the usual lines, we were to be taken down to Kulu Bay, to see the breakwater and the new wharf. As a final thing the special train was even run right onto the baseball ground when the company played Hilo.

"Before I close I would like to say a special word of praise for Dick Young, the special representative of the Hilo Railroad, who was sent with us throughout the trip. There was nothing we wanted that he did not get for us and in nine cases out of ten he anticipated those wishes. He hiked with us throughout and there is not a man in the company who has not a good word to say for him."
Speaking for the men, Sergeant-Major Carey stated that they were pleased with every part of the trip. "I have been in the service for a good many years," he said, "but I do not know of any trip that I have ever enjoyed so much. Every one of the boys has come back a big booster for the trip and I think before we are through that we will have every regiment wanting to make it. For myself and the men I would like to especially thank the Hilo railroad for the fine trip they gave us."
Details of the Trip.

The command left Honolulu last Wednesday on the Mauna Kea, and on arrival at Hilo was taken in charge by the Hilo railroad. The train which was to take them to Hilo was fitted with a special observation car so that the boys were able to get a good view of the fine scenery along the trip. They had their lunch out at Paoulo and on their return to Hilo at half past two o'clock were given full liberty for the night. (The Hilo boys soon made themselves acquainted and very soon the town was alive and busy.)

The next morning at 7:20 a. m. they boarded their special cars again and were taken out to the Olan mill. From there they went right through to Kapaeha and hiked over to the Green Lake. Following this they stripped off and splashed about in the warm springs until they were good and ready to get along with the journey. On the road back to Hilo they turned off at the Pahoa junction and ran up to Pahoa where the big lumber mill is. The officers were entertained by Colonel Sam Johnson and the men were shown over the mill.
Returning from here the special was run down to Kulu Bay where an inspection of the new wharf and the big

breakwater was made. The boys spent the night at Hilo and spent the following morning sight seeing around Hilo. In the afternoon the company nine went up against a Hilo aggregation but the local boys proved too strong for the visitors and it will now be up to the next company making trip to recapture the goat the returning one lost.

At the conclusion of the game the men were taken up to Glenwood, arriving there about half past six o'clock and camping in the big shed there for the night.
Make Fast Hike.
Now comes a part of the trip of which the whole company is justly proud and it will give the next bunch something to get busy on. Leaving Glenwood at half past five o'clock the next morning for the hike to the Volcano House, nine miles away and 2,000 feet above them, the boys set a goat that brought them there two hours and twenty minutes later. Included in this time were two halts of ten minutes each so that the actual speed was four and a half miles an hour on a stiff up hill grade.

Camp was pitched adjacent to the Volcano House, the guests of the hotel turning out en masse to witness what was a very smart piece of work.
As soon as things were straightened out and the final arrangements made the command left for the crater, taking the trail across the lava. They burnt cards in the sulphur cracks and explored the region generally but Madam Pele would not show herself. During the day the men covered approximately seventeen miles and as most of it was strenuous going they were glad to turn in early that night.

On Monday morning they were off good and early for the craters of Kilauea-Iki. They spent most of the morning there exploring the Twin Craters and also the new lava tube recently discovered and made accessible.
Returning to the Volcano House camp was struck and they hiked off for Glenwood again where the special picked them up and landed them right on the wharf in plenty of time to catch the boat. This morning they boarded the Lilehua train and returned to their post tired but happy.
