**HEAVY RAINS ARE WELCOMED BY MAUI FOLKS**

Good Supply on Hand and Water Famine in Future Not Feared—Notes

[Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence]  
WAILUKU, Maui, Aug. 23.—Maui has been visited with splendid rains again this past week so that the Valley Isle is happy over the prospects of getting through the summer with unusually good rainfall, and good crops as a consequence. Kula got a heavy portion of the rain during the last few days with a result that the Kula roads are in better shape than they have been for several years past. On the homestead road the supervisors have had a gang of men at work for the last few weeks filling in the bad places and leveling up the road generally. They had just about finished their work when the downpour of Thursday packed the road in fine shape.

The Kula pipe line has been filling up the new Keokea reservoir and there are now some 450,000 gallons in it.

Some 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 gallons of water are being turned one side at the head of the supply for the Kula pipe line. This is certainly a novel condition of affairs for the pipe line, and shows not only that there has been a splendid supply of water recently, but also that the new water head for the Kula region is abundantly able to give Kula the water that is needed. Whereas last year the cost of maintaining this line was between \$600 and \$700 a month, the present cost averages somewhere about \$250 or \$260, and the sale of water is sufficient to meet this outlay. Not only are Kula, Ulupalakua and the Kanaio region now abundantly supplied with splendid mountain water, but Makawao and Paia have a better supply than ever before, and the county fathers are hoping to make the water resources ever more adequate than they are at present, so that there will never again be a water famine such as Maui experienced last year.

Professor and Mrs. Henry A. Mead of Chicago, who have been spending ten days at the J. B. Castle mountain home on Haleakala, returned to Wailuku today and will leave for Honolulu soon. They have very much enjoyed their visit to Maui, in spite of the fact that they arrived at the Castle house in a pouring Kona rain.

Rev. John Knox Bodel of Lahaina is supplying the Church of the Good Shepherd every Sunday morning for the present until the church succeeds in securing a new pastor from the coast.

Mrs. Earl G. Bartlett, accompanied by Mrs. Willard and three other lady friends, walked to the summit of Haleakala this past week. Donald Brown, son of E. Herrick Brown, acted as guide and with a mule packed the party's provision. The weather was perfect and the Craigielea rest house is reported to have been very much cleaned up, at least as far as the interior of the house is concerned.

Chester Livingston, who with his family has been on his Haiku homestead for the summer, returns to Honolulu this week. He will begin his duties shortly at the Kamehameha school.

Rev. A. Craig Bowditch held service last Sunday afternoon at Haiku. About fifty people attended. There was excellent singing and the service gave promise of large audiences in the future. It is expected that these services will be held often during the coming months.

The new Paia bank is rapidly nearing completion. The location of the new structure is just below the Maui dry goods branch store and is made of concrete with large windows and a good floor space. W. R. Patterson is putting the finishing touches on the building in placing the doors and preparing the building for occupancy.
