HANAIEI AGAIN IN COMMISSION ON COAST

Ten years ago a factor in the freight carrying trade between Honolulu and island ports, the former later-island steamer Hanaiei, which after leaving the shipyard remained in island waters...

Captain F. L. Hamma, who is well known as a veteran in island waters and who accompanied the Hanaiei when the vessel was sold by the Inter-Island company, retained command of the steamer until his promotion to the bridge of the steamer Arolino, news of which was received here yesterday.

Old Freighters to be Discard.

Operating a fleet of cargo carriers, several having visited Honolulu, bringing European cargoes and departing with shipments of preserved fishes destined for continental ports, the Harrison Direct Line is wedding out its older vessels, according to news received by Balfour, Guthrie & Co., agents for the line, and has disposed of its steamers Senator and Bariatier.

May Remove Danger of Collision.

Of interest to seafaring men in the Pacific are the series of experiments now being conducted by officers in the Canadian Northern steamer Royal George which recently sailed from Great Britain for Quebec.

It is also claimed for this apparatus that should the Royal George pick up a wireless distress signal she would be able to set her course toward its source, even though the distressed vessel were not able to indicate her position.

VESSELS TO AND FROM THE ISLANDS

Thursday, July 16. Seattle—Sailed, July 15, S. S. Montanan for Honolulu. San Francisco—Arrived, July 16, 9:30 a. m., S. S. Nile, from Honolulu July 9.

Aerograms. S. S. Manchuria will arrive from San Francisco tomorrow at 9 a. m., and probably sail for Yokohama tomorrow at 6 p. m. Has on board 162 cabin, 25 second, and 134 Asiatic passengers. Will take 500 tons coal at Honolulu.

S. S. Mongolia will arrive from Yokohama Saturday afternoon, and sail for San Francisco Sunday morning at 9 o'clock. Has 92 cabin, 54 second, and 375 Asiatic passengers on board. Has 217 tons cargo for Honolulu and wants 750 tons coal.

YACHT HELENE TO ENTER ISLAND TRADE

After remaining some time out of commission, the yacht Helene, once the pride of local yachtsmen, is to enter trade as a carrier of island products, according to present plans of a hui of local capitalists, including George Taft, H. L. White and T. Howell, who have been refitting the vessel preparatory to its departure for the island of Kauai.

The Helene is stated will be employed in the transportation of coconuts from several garden island ports to Honolulu.

The yacht has just left the local marine railway where it was given a cleaning, repainting and general overhauling.

POLITICAL NOTES

A meeting of Kuliou forces is to be held tonight at the prince's Waikiki home. Plans for the campaign will be discussed.

Henry Vierra, has issued an announcement of his candidacy for representative from the fifth district. He is a Republican.

George R. Carter, Progressive candidate for delegate, has gone to Kauai, accompanied by D. Kaluokalani, Sr. Carter will tour the Garden Island, organizing precinct clubs as he did on Hawaii.

William J. Sheldon, candidate for the Republican nomination for sheriff, will begin his active campaign shortly. He is going to start a speaking tour at Koolau and work around the outside precincts before coming into the city sections.

Palmer P. Woods, reported this morning to be about ready to come out for the Democratic nomination for delegate, laughs at the rumor. Mr. Woods' future plans, it is known, largely depend on whether or not he is appointed to territorial office by Governor Pinkham.

China's Chief Will Hunt Big Game. To seek big game and also try his hand at persuading the Finny tribe from California streams into a waiting hamper, Chief Engineer H. V. Barber, of the Pacific Mail liner China, who was missed from his post with the arrival of that vessel at Honolulu some days ago, will join the vessel on its return to San Francisco.

Shia Frigates Scuttled. The coal ship Iremore which recently, as reported, caught fire in four of her holds, was scuttled in the presence of Commander McIntyre, Mr. Muir, government surveyor of ships, and various other harbor and government officials at Penang. The vessel was sunk in 24 feet of water, which was sufficient to envelope the holds. This extreme measure, however, did not serve to extinguish the fires, which burned even more furiously during the night and were still burning the following day.

Preliminary arrangements are being made for the initial trip to Venezuela, probably in September next, of the Plandre, a new 11,000-ton steamer of the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique.

MEMBERSHIP OF Y. M. C. A. WAS 1425 JULY 1

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Young Men's Christian Association held at noon today, the constitution of the newly organized Korean association and with its approval by the central board, the Korean Y. M. C. A. is now officially launched.

Twenty-nine new members were elected upon recommendation of Ed Towse, chairman of the membership committee. This makes the total membership 1425 as of July 1.

Chairman Pratt of the improvement committee reported work found for 11 out of 20 men who applied at the central association. Six men were placed through the Korean branch and 94 by the Filipino employment bureau which is under the direction of the Y. M. C. A. employment committee.

A committee consisting of W. A. Love, H. G. Dillingham and Geo. C. Potter was appointed to study the matter of using the boys' field as a baseball ground to supplement the fields now available for amateur ball players. A. E. Larimer was appointed the Y. M. C. A. representative on the board of directors of the associated charities.

RELATIVE-IN-LAW BY FORMER MARRIAGE ON STAND IN DOYLE CASE

A search for a number of letters, alleged to have been written by the defendant to Mrs. Edna Ferguson Doyle when she was living in Seattle shortly after he had divorced her, caused a delay in the trial of Joseph A. Doyle in the federal court this afternoon. One of the letters was produced in court and read, but a thorough search for the others failed to disclose their whereabouts.

The attorney for the defense strenuously objected to the reading of the letter in court, declaring it to be immaterial. A mild debate between the attorney and Judge Clemons ensued, following which the objections were overruled. The letter was read and appeared to contain nothing of importance other than an invitation from Doyle to his former wife to visit Honolulu, he stating that he would pay all expenses. Mrs. Margaret Ferguson was called on the witness stand again this afternoon and examined by both the prosecution and the defense regarding the allegation that, after she and her daughter came to Honolulu at Doyle's request, they were forced to sell some of their clothes and jewels and borrow in order to obtain funds with which to return to the mainland.

Mrs. Viola Lukens Doyle, another of the defendant's former wives, also is being examined this afternoon.

BIG MARGIN BETWEEN HIGHEST AND LOWEST FAIR BUILDING BID

Hawaii's building at the San Francisco exposition of next year held the limelight at the meeting of the Hawaii fair commission this afternoon. A number of communications relative to the building, letting of the contract for its erection and the breaking of ground for the building, were read at the meeting by Chairman H. P. Wood.

C. W. Dickey, the architect who designed the Hawaii structure, wrote of the opening of bids, reporting the following tenders for the job: Lester H. Stock, \$29,500—secured the award; Boyd, Keer & McLean, \$30,000; Caldwell & Son, \$30,897; Dunnavant-Houghton-Van Sant, Inc., \$31,880; Foster Vogt, \$31,980; Peter Hamilton, \$32,000; Strehlow, Freeze & Peterson, \$32,750; Lange & Bergstrom, \$35,311; Pringle-Dunn & Co., \$35,447; J. O. Kuykendall, \$35,916; W. Mutch, \$37,388; A. T. Spence, \$37,500, and W. D. Henderson, \$38,375.

A. P. Taylor wrote, concerning the celebration at the ground-breaking, giving in detail the arrangements that already have been published in the Star-Bulletin.

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MAYOR FERN AND 4 SUPERVISORS ASK REELECTION

Mayor J. J. Fern followed up his announcement of his candidacy for reelection by launching last night his campaign with a speech at the fourth district municipal stables, where a number of Democrats were assembled to hear him. He was accompanied by Supervisors Lester Petrie, Wm. H. McClellan, John Markham and E. H. F. Wolter, all of whom announced their candidacy for reelection.

In two instances these announcements came as a surprise. It has been accepted as an established fact in municipal circles for the last few months that Markham would not run again. His announcement, therefore, came as a surprise. Wolter has hinted strongly in late weeks that he would become a candidate for mayor, but his announcement last night evidently shows he has thought better of this and will be out with the others on the board for reelection.

Mayor Fern's speech last night touched on both the political and the road situations. For the problems of both he offered a solution, the most picturesque one being for the roads. He proposed to have the city and county divided into 10 wards and divide the road money equally among these wards.

On the delegate race he expounded this theory: If Kuliou loses out in the primary, his support will go over to McCandless. If Rice loses out in the primary, his support will go over to McCandless. According to His Honor's theory, McCandless will win in either event.

In his own case he expressed modest confidence in being able to get enough votes at the primary to be declared elected.

BIG EMPRESSES CUT TIME TO MANILA

The fastest time in the Pacific is reported being made by the new Empress steamers in the Canadian Pacific service between Vancouver and Hongkong, according to officers in the Canadian-Australasian steamer Makura that called at Honolulu yesterday on the voyage to Suva, Auckland and Sydney. The three-funnelled Empresses will cut the time from Vancouver to Manila to 17 days. The fastest time on any transpacific schedule before has been 28 days from this side to Manila. The Russia and the Asia make the Pacific passage almost a week faster than any other transpacific steamers. There is no doubt that the Canadian Pacific Manila trade will be a rich one.

The new transpacific schedule calls for seven visits to Manila, the Philippine capital. Both the Empress of Asia and the Empress of Russia smashed existing speed records in the maiden voyage from the British Columbian coast to Japan.

Before the advent of the larger vessels the Empress of China, India and Japan were rated as fast passenger carriers.

HARBOR NOTES

General Freight Agent C. P. Morse today received advices that the American-Hawaiian freighter Montana with more than 1000 tons of cargo for Honolulu and the island ports, has sailed from Seattle. The Montana is the second steamer in the Magellan service to steam to the islands with New York freight.

Sheriff Charles Rose, acting in the capacity of coroner, will today hold an inquest over the death of Hamataki, a Japanese laborer at Pearl harbor who yesterday was fatally injured through a fall from a scaffold adjoining a new two-story building. It is stated that the man missed his footing and dropped to a distance of 30 feet, suffering internal injuries which caused his death at Queen's hospital late yesterday afternoon.
