Short letters, it is safe to say, would be read by ten persons to every one who wades through their habitually long contributions.

People in this country, who may have been disturbed by the cry of "Wolf!" on different sides, might find salutary exercise in looking abroad. "Medical councils have been summoned in the distressed provinces of Russia. Scurvy and typhus are raging in the wake of famine." The despatch conveying these distressful words goes on to state that famine prevails in thirteen governments of the country, and 14,-000,000 people are in urgent need of succor. With our prospects here being no worse than some diminution in the influx of money from the sugar market, carrying a necessity for increased public and private economy, it is as hame to whine about "hard times" in the future while

so many millions of the race are

starving for bread in the present.

## A STILL CROWING INDUSTRY.

A notable event of to-day, in the midst of all the preaching of a coming cataclysm of ruin to the main industry of the country, is the starting of the first-class new sugar mill at Ewa on this island. It will probably be some considerable time before this great new undertaking will repay anything on the investment. With, however, the more economical production of sugar as compared with former days, due to the great improvements in sugar-making machinery, there used be no fear that this and contemporaneous large ventures will not in due time be lucrative investments. Cane sugar going to hold its own against beet sugar, according to the opinion of the highest experts, and Hawaii, even if she has to pay more for labor than other countries, has possessed certain negative advantages, such as immunity from disastrous hurricanes and devastating cane diseases which if continued will enable her to rival any competitor. Germany is discontinuing the system of supporting her beet sugar industry by bounties. Although the United States has taken up this system when other countries are throwing it aside, its tenure there must be very uncertain, while its success beyond the initial boom is not at all assured. There is great opposition to bounties on principle in that country, and sugar men themselves realize that the present favor to them marks them more than ever as objects of invidious jealousy. A turn in political affairs is liable to upset the whole system, when the sugar producers would be in a worse state than if they bad been left to work out their own salvation. There is the additional uncertainty of the farmers long agreeing with the refiners for whom they raise the beets on the question of price. This very thing has wrecked beet sugar enterprises elsewhere after they had made an auspicious beginning. While our planters are undoubtedly face to face with a necessity of attaining cheaper production than ever, their complaints after all have to be discounted considerably. In their very best years they have never let up on the cry, "Give, give, more cheap labor and cheaper labor than before!"
