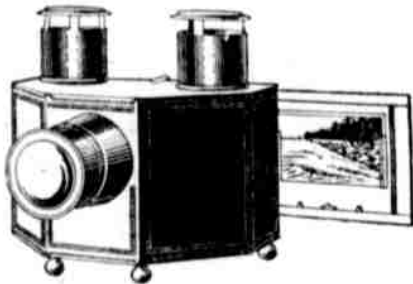

**Program of Hilo Sports on July 4**

As usual at about this time in the year a large bunch of sports are beginning to feel restless and look longingly towards Hilo, where the Fourth is always kept up in such good style. Some of the lucky ones are going up to the rainy city on the Mauna Kea today, and they will have time to get into form so as to greet the rest of the bunch who are leaving on Saturday afternoon. And what a greeting it will be too, and how many questions will be asked at the men who saw the first day's racing, as to how and what has won the events that were run on Saturday. It is unfortunate that the crowd which is going on Saturday's boat will miss one day's racing, but that cannot be helped, and anyhow the big Merchants' Stakes is run on Monday.

Nigel Jackson, Dal Fahy and Kao (the Waihua Horse) are leaving on the Mauna Kea and they are feeling very confident that the race from Nine Miles, Oloa, to Hilo, will result in the Honolulu trio finishing one, two, three in the race.

As yet also goes forward on the Mauna Kea, and as he has been training hard for the walking race it will take a good man to head him over any distance at the heel and toe game.

The horse racing portion of the program for the Fourth is a very good one and the amount of prize money provided is remarkable for a town the size of Hilo. Most interest is taken in the Merchants' Stakes and there are four entries for the race. Banonica, Waring, Major Collier and Webber are the horses that will run, and Banonica should have no trouble in winning.

The soccer football team is making the trip also, and as they have practiced hard lately, there should be a most interesting game on the race track on Monday.
