## RESOLVE FOR LOCAL MEN FOR FEDERAL OFFICES MILITIA BILLS PASSED BY HOUSE

### GOVERNOR WILL SIGN ENABLING ACT

**Fear Intimates That He Will Approve of Amended Bill Providing for the Payment of Both Mayor's and Supervisors' Road Department Appointees.**

The Enabling Act, providing for the payment, not only of the road laborers who did work but of the Mayor's appointees who only loafed and waited for something to turn up, will pass both Houses with amendment and will be signed by the Governor. That is the latest, and the statement is made as the result of a conference held this morning between Representative Douthitt and Governor Frear.

Mr. Douthitt told the Governor that the House did not want to intend to concur in the Senate amendments which include the Mayor's appointees in the list of those who are to be made beneficiaries of the measure unless there was some good reason to think that the bill would be signed by His Excellency.

Of course, Governor Frear made no direct statement or compromise. He never does, retaining still in the Executive Chamber the judicial attitude and manner which characterized him as a jurist. But he suggested that the Legislature obtain from the Mayor a certified statement that his appointees were actually on hand early every morning ready to go to work if they got the chance.

It was also agreed that the long list of employes appended by the Senate to the measure be eliminated and a clause substituted stating that the list of those to benefit by the measure can be found in the office of the County Auditor. This will greatly reduce the volume bulk of the House and Senate Journals, as there are about thirty pages of names in the Senate's amendment to the bill.

As soon as the certificate from the Mayor can be obtained, it is probable that the bill will be trotted out again, shoving through both Houses with the new amendments, and sent up to the Governor for his signature.

### SESSION OF HOUSE WAS BELLIGERENT

**Kaniho's Wrath Aroused By Two Warlike Measures**

### BUT HIS ORATORY FAILS TO KILL MILITIA BILLS

**All 1909 Records for Inane Speech Broken by the Ubiquitous Cannon Ball from Kohala**

### HOUSE

**30th Day—Morning Session**

It was a warlike session that the House held this morning—belligerent in more ways than one. Also, the highest tide of the session in the flood of inanity and senseless speech was reached, Kaniho, the breezy statesman from Kohala, being the particular bright and shining light of the occasion. He exceeded even his own previous efforts in the way of forgicous foolishness, which, if they go abroad, will do more to hurt Hawaii and the reputation of her legislators than anything else that has occurred this session.

The two bills over which the debate occurred were both measures relating to the militia, one providing for militia enrollment, the other amending the militia laws of the Territory with a view to putting Hawaii on the same basis as the other States and Territories.

Kaniho considered it an insult to the United States Government for Hawaii to have any militia at all,—a seeming lack of confidence in the power of the Federal Government to protect these islands in the event of war. Also, he discerned in the introduction of the bills a nefarious scheme on the part of Adjutant General Jones to line his own pockets at the expense of the taxpayers, and a scheme on the part of some of his fellow legislators to insure their reelection by securing the vote of the National Guard in return for their support of the bill.

These brilliant ideas he proceeded to expound with much pounding of his desk, wild waving of his arms, frantic bellowing with his great voice that made the windows rattle and the walls of the legislative chamber shake. But his eloquence failed to convince a majority of the House and the two bills were passed, though with strong opposition.

**Militia Enrollment.**

The militia enrollment bill, H. B. 85, providing that the tax assessor of each taxation division shall, when required to do so by the Governor, prepare a roll containing the names of those in his division subject to military duty, was one of the seven on the order of the day for third reading. This bill was tabled once, but the Administration got busy with the Military Commission bill.

### AGED SCIENTIST ANSWERS SUMMONS

**Dr. Sereno Bishop Is Called Hence By Death**

### BIS LIFE WAS RICH IN ACCOMPLISHMENTS

**Venerable Minister Passed Most of His Days in Ministering to the People of the Islands of His Birth**

Shortly after 8 o'clock last night, Rev. Sereno E. Bishop passed away. For nearly sixty years the veteran minister was a leading figure in the fields of religious and scientific research, and death brought to a close a life rich in the deeds that count.

Dr. Bishop was 82 years old his last birthday, and death resulted from a general breaking-down caused by advancing years.

Though, during the greater part of his life, Dr. Bishop practiced his calling as a minister of the Gospel in these Islands, it is as a scientist that his name has become most known to fame. In September, 1883, he discovered the corona caused by the Krakatoa eruption, since known in Europe as "Circle de Bishop." In 1884 he received the third Warner

**Chillingworth Fathered Resolution In Senate**

### SOLONS WILL VISIT DIAMOND HEAD WORKS

**Upper Chamber Gallops Through the Session, Passing Many Bills on Second Reading—Opium Law Is Tabled**

### SENATE

**Thirtieth Day—Morning Session.**

Senator Chillingworth this morning introduced a resolution into the Senate, opposing the appointment of any mainlander, either as Federal Judge, United States District Attorney, or to any other Federal office in this Territory.

In his resolution, Chillingworth enumerates the reasons why Hawaiians should be chosen to fill office in Hawaii, calling attention that, in most matters, the Federal Government is more and more adopting the policy of treating the Islands as the States of the Union are treated, rather than as Territories.

He also calls attention to the fact that, for many years prior to annexation, both during the time of the monarchy and of the provisional government, Hawaii had a complete legal system modeled on the systems of England and America. He therefore asks that the President and Attorney General, as well as Congress, be memorialized against appointing any but a citizen of this Territory to Federal office here.

As the resolution seemed very comprehensive in its scope, it was referred to the Judiciary Committee for consideration before being passed up to the Senate for voting.

**No Barricades.**

House Bill No. 134, forbidding the erection of any form of barricade in places where gambling equipment is displayed, and making it a misdemeanor for any person to be present in a barricaded place where gambling paraphernalia is on exhibition, passed third reading without any opposition.

Senator Coelho's resolution, calling for the appointment of a commission to investigate and report upon all unpatented and unawarded lands in the Territory, passed second reading.

Though introduced by the Maul Senator, the resolution was really drawn up by the Judiciary Committee of the Senate, after consultation with the Governor, as a substitute for a bill of more general character introduced by Coelho.

**To Right Wrongs.**

The resolution sets forth that, at the time of the Grand Mahoe of lands, certain properties were intended to go into the possession of certain persons, and, in fact, did go into such possession.

### PINEAPPLE CROP MOVING RAPIDLY

Every freight steamer that leaves the port is carrying a steadily increasing cargo of Hawaiian pineapples.

The crop is beginning to move under the impetus of the advertising campaign carried on by the association of pineapple growers and the general reduction of price that enables the retailer to put his product before the consumer at twenty-five cents a tin.

A considerable quantity of last year's pack is still in the warehouse but the movement of the last few weeks is a very good sign of the times and makes the grower and the canner look forward to the coming season with some degree of confidence.

How well sustained the present movement will be it is, of course, impossible to predict. The stocks in jobbers' hands has been very low ever since the days of the panic. The middlemen have been carrying just enough for immediate demands. They seem to be taking on heavier stocks although the extent and full significance of the present demand cannot be determined until more complete reports are received.

### COOLLY WALKS OUT OF DURANCE VILE

Emory Harris, the negro prisoner who escaped from the police station yesterday, has not yet been re-arrested. According to Deputy Sheriff Rose, the man must have broken prison at 3 o'clock, when the watch is changed. Up till that time, Harris had been sitting with a trusty and had shortly before been treated by the police surgeon for an injury to his eye, which was badly hurt during his encounter with Parlier, the man he is alleged to have shot.
