The directors of the Oahu Sugar Co. this morning decided to continue the monthly 2 per cent. dividend into next year instead of paying extra dividends of 1-1/2 per cent. in October and December, as formerly planned.

A meeting of the Japanese Benevolent society will be held tonight in the Japanese school on Nuuanu street. The principal work of the meeting will be to elect officers for the ensuing year. Rev. G. Motokawa, who has been president for a long time, will be re-elected.

Kikapa, a Hawaiian boy, has been arrested and is said by the police to have confessed to have stolen a number of bicycles from various places. There has been a large number of wheels stolen during the past few weeks and the police are after the thieves.

Hu Yin and Len Kane, charged with having violated the Edmunds Act, were found not guilty by the jury which has heard the testimony in the case for the past four days. Eddie Douthitt for the defendants, as well as W. T. Rawlins, put up a hard fight, and the case was hotly contested.

OVER \$800 FOR MOVING PICTURES AT SETTLEMENT
