NAVY DOCK BUILDERS HERE HAWAII'S APPROPRIATION BEAT THEM ALL

Start Things Moving On Pearl Harbor Work

Mr. Parke and Mr. Burrell, who have charge of the construction of the dock, left early this afternoon for Pearl Harbor in the naval launch, in charge of Postswain Kenney, for the purpose of making a preliminary survey of the ground.

Civil Engineer C. B. Parke, and his assistant, Burrell, with a party of about a dozen, arrived this morning on the Siberia, the engineers coming under orders to go to work at once on the Pearl Harbor improvements. On the Aorangi, Saturday, arrived Architect L. C. Woodman, from Seattle, who joins the Parke party here to work on the drafting part of the job. Mr. Parke, with Mr. Burrell went at once to the Naval Station, where they were busy this morning looking over the place, and getting settled.

"Yes, I am here on the Pearl Harbor work," said Mr. Parke this morning. "I am to report to the Chief

HAWAII GOT MORE THAN ANY CITY OF UNITED STATES

Washington, D. C., May 29. Editor Evening Bulletin: No success that has been achieved for Hawaii since I have been in Congress has been more gratifying to me than that of securing \$850,000 for a Federal building in Honolulu. The work for Pearl Harbor, although complicated, had the support of national considerations; but a Federal building is a local proposition, and to secure adequate appropriations in that line is generally considered one of the most difficult things in a Congressman's career.

As the bill passed the House on Friday last, Hawaii has the happy distinction of having the largest item allowed in this bill to any city in the entire country, the next largest item being \$750,000 for a new postoffice site in Chicago.

Fleet Will Not Buy Supplies At Honolulu

Honolulu will not supply the Fleet with beef or other provisions. The discouraging news to this effect was contained in a letter from Delegate Kalaniana'ole in answer to the request of the commercial organizations and the ranchers that he do all in his power to induce the Navy Department to let Honolulu get a show at supplying beef and other supplies for the Fleet.

The Delegate writes that he complied with the request, but was not able to bring about a favorable result. The Bureau of Supplies officials stated that contracts for supplies for the Fleet had long since been entered for every particle of supplies needed by the Fleet for the first four months after its departure from San Francisco. It gave as reasons for this step the statement that supplies could be bought cheaper on

Spectators Of Fight May Be Prosecuted

Prosecutions will follow the prize fight at the Orpheum. This statement was reiterated this morning by Mr. Thwing, but how far these prosecutions will be carried or why what means they will be pursued is still being kept dark.

"Yes, prosecutions will be instigated," said Thwing. "It may be through the Civic Federation, or the Ministerial Union or by individuals. I cannot say at present how they will be started, but you may be sure that the matter will not be dropped."

"Will you have the spectators arrested as well as the principals?" asked the reporter.

"I cannot say at present," answered Thwing. "We have a pretty complete list of those who were present."

The Ministerial Union held a meeting this forenoon at which the prize fight was very thoroughly discussed. The ministers were, however, exceedingly shy about giving any information about the matter, though they denied very strenuously the insinuation that it had been a star chamber meeting. They stated that they were absolutely against prize fighting, but that the Union was not ready to act as yet. A special meeting might be called at any time to take it up. This morning all that was done apparently was the authorizing of another letter to District Attorney Breckons calling on him to enforce the law.

To Divide Our Fleet

Admiral Sperry in command of the Atlantic Fleet with eight battleships will arrive off Honolulu on July 16. This is the message conveyed to the Governor through the Interior Department in response to the query sent some time ago in order to gain accurate information as to the itinerary of the Fleet.

It indicates that Honolulu will obtain only half the Fleet and the other half will presumably coal off Kaunakakai or Lahaina.

The official dates are given as follows: The Fleet will sail from San Francisco on July 7, arrive at Honolulu Tuesday July 16, and leave this port July 23.

The division of the Fleet is the new phase of the situation although it has been rumored for some days.
